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California Alpha Scholarships

Mrs. Madigan, secretary of the fund says: "This year because we have had such a great response to our scholarship program we are limiting the scholarship to upperclassmen. The freshmen who have applied have been very needy, but with less than one year in college, they cannot compare in either fraternity service and loyalty, or activity participation. Therefore, only girls who will be *upperclassmen* in the fall are to apply.

The personal letter to be sent with application will now cover need, fraternity service and loyalty, activity participation, scholarship, and future plans for use of education.

This personal letter is to be accompanied by *two* recommending letters this year, one letter from the advisory board of the chapter, and one letter from the Dean of Women. We feel it will be easier to judge the girls if we know how much weight to give each letter. Often the girls have friends write seconding letters, but we are never exactly sure how much weight to give these letters.

We will, of course, send out the usual letters to each chapter with the new information on it, but every year several girls write for an application blank. There is no application blank for this scholarship. The three letters are all that are required."

GRAND COUNCIL, CONVENTION 1956

Here are highlights of

THE 40TH CONVENTION

Seen through the eyes of the Daily Editor

→ "DROP A COIN in the fountain and you'll come back to Rome," so goes the old saying. Surely some foresighted Pi Phis must have emptied the entire contents of their piggy banks into the azure pool of the Huntington Sheraton Hotel way back in 1929—and perhaps again in 1940—for they definitely *came back!* They returned for the 1956 Convention of Pi Beta Phi, bringing with them enough other Pi Phis to swell the attendance to the unequalled number of 1,318. This amazing registration made the 40th Convention the largest in the history of our fraternity.

This Convention, held in the land of sunshine and hospitality, was indeed an enchanted week that produced many splendored things.

If you've read your September ARROW you know

of the constructive work completed during those six days in Pasadena, but no printed words can possibly bring to you the beauty of the setting, the variety of the activities, or the work of those who made it all possible.

Perhaps I am the last person who should be attempting to tell you of the social side of Convention for I saw much of it only through sleep-weary eyes. As the editor of the *Convention Daily* there were times when I rushed to the printer on the heels of a galloping deadline, looking for all the world as though Simon Legree were on my trail. But as I now look back on that week I realize that my work was immeasurably lightened by four people in particular. First there was Adele Alford, my beloved "boss," whose blue pencil has a velvet point and

whose appreciation of the problems makes those problems seem trite after three months. Then there was Janet Patton, Director of Central Office, the Ceil Chapman model with a brain. She has the disposition of a saint. As my angelic roommate she slept through my 3 a.m. typing. It was for her the mockingbird sang in our window all night long. Isabel Cramer, clever, efficient, and as quick as a flash, did dozens of things beyond the call of her office—Business Manager of the *Daily*. Elsa Davison, my assistant, was as pretty as she was willing, and as efficient as she was delightful. And of course the staff was a joy!

the news of Convention but reflect the spirit of it. The fun really began when I boarded the *Sante Fe Special* at Chicago to spend the next few days with province officers and committee chairmen. The work began in earnest on the bus which took us all from San Bernardino to the Huntington Sheraton. Isabel Cramer had written me to keep my brief case handy since we'd be working en route. From that moment on it was *real* work—and *real* fun!

From the dignified and deeply impressive memorial service which followed the reading of greetings and the introductions at the opening meeting, to the final flicker of the last candle on the ex-

To me this 40th Convention meant trying to do the job of editing the *Convention Daily* for the eighth time so that the printed word would not only give

Looking back is like strolling leisurely along the corridors of an art gallery with plenty of time to study and appreciate each picture. Some of the scenes and portraits will always be framed in fragile gold leaf; others, as ethereal as a water color or a pastel, deserve a dainty frame. There were people and incidents as finely contrived as etchings, and quick sketches in soft pencil as fleeting as the moments they depicted. There were even a few examples of sturdy, folk-type art.

If you'll come with me we'll stroll through that gallery and pause while I tell you of those pictures still bright in memory.

The one on my right shows great activity. It is fairly alive with motion. The background is the newly decorated lobby of the Huntington Sheraton where registration is in full swing. There's color

and light and much less confusion than anyone would believe possible. No jumbling of the masses here. Surely the Registration Chairman, Dorothy Thomas, who is the central figure and the artist of this canvas, has the hand of a fine technician. How else could she handle so efficiently the registering of over thirteen hundred Pi Phis?

The one in the gold leaf frame shows more than a hundred of these same Pi Phis each solemnly placing a wine carnation in a silver vase. The last one rounds out a gorgeous bouquet—symbolizing the passing of members of the Fraternity during the interim of Convention.

Near it is an equally impressive canvas entitled "Golden Arrow Luncheon." We have only to look on the faces of our Golden Girls to know the truth of the saying that one does not grow *old* in Pi Beta Phi. One just GROWS. That magnificent picture just in front of you, the one in gold and white with the special lighting, is of our Grand President, Marianne Reid Wild. She is performing the model initiation of Helene Higgins Bauer of St. Louis. This picture is the one every Pi Phi will carry in her memory as long as there are pearls in her arrow. Two more attractive women

Since Virginia Brackett Green, Chairman of the Settlement School Committee, painted it, there's much laughter and joy depicted. And yet there is much that is long-enduring in it too. The two that were shown before the exhibit was open to the Pi Phi public were especially appreciated by Grand Council and the province officers. The former will long remember the fairy-like picture of an exquisite dinner where gauzy butterflies, crystal epergnes filled with pale pink carnations, and lighted tapers gave a charming setting for the pre-convention affair. The latter will not soon forget the patio supper with its shell decor and lobster Parisienne!

But we must move on for there is much to see.

That picture with the homespun mat and the hand carved frame must be "Arrowcraft Shop" for I see Elizabeth Rue and Marion Mueller presiding over tables of place mats and bags, stoles and aprons, jewelry and woodcarvings.

There are many really fine portraits in the gallery. Certainly the one that draws the largest crowds is of our Historian, Marian Keck Simmons. This picture is not simply photographic. Like all good portraits it brings out much of the character of the model. Surely we can be justly proud of Marian's fund of knowledge of the Fraternity history and her unsurpassed way of presenting her findings on Historical Night.

Another portrait that commands attention is of Sarah Pomeroy Rugg, Convention Guest, former Editor of the *Arrow*. In a way she seems to represent all the former members of Grand Council who have attended conventions as special guests since their retirement. We admire her stately bearing, enjoy her fascinating anecdotes, and marvel at the history she so obligingly recounts.

There's a really remarkable charcoal sketch of a nimble singer. It should be labeled "Perpetual Mo-

tion," but it's really Dorothy Kissinger directing the singing of Convention. It had to be drawn quickly as Dorothy never stops long enough for posing. We all hope she wasn't serious about resigning as Music Chairman.

In another room the walls are splattered with thousands of thumbnail sketches as though pencilled in a great hurry. These are the pictures of the hundreds of little gatherings where old friends met and new friendships were born. There's one of Isabel Cramer rushing frantically from one province get-together to another trying to locate the pretty active who posed with the magazine chairman. We all remembered her face but forgot to get her name for the underlines. There's one of the editor on Luau night gasping as she at last looks into the face of Luan Harkness and recognizes her from the picture! Another sketch shows the Proutys, Lolita, Chairman of Chapter House Corporations,

There's a delicate pastel sketch of Katherine Devine Kennedy, New York Delta, Convention Initiate of 1950. The artist has caught a bit of the twinkle of her eyes and some of the same force we remember so vividly that she used in delivering her speech at the formal banquet at Jasper.

Our attention is drawn to an empty frame. It was meant to contain the likeness of Sally Wild Gordon, Convention Guide. However I'm told the artist is still looking for her. Sally was such a busy person at Convention she never remained long in any spot. If and when her portrait is painted we'll title it "Sally the Superwoman."

Two large canvases command attention. Each depicts seven women. They are our Grand Council members. The one at the top shows each woman smilingly composed. We remember them as gracious greeters, as efficient presiders, as capable administrators. We also remember them chatty and relaxed as they sat with various groups at mealtime, and remarkably poised as they conducted the business of the Fraternity.

The other picture is of the same seven dedicated women. But this shows them behind the scenes: one arising at dawn to read the copy of the banquet story, another snatching a few valuable minutes from her precious hours of sleep to press a frock, and all meeting in the wee small hours to perfect some part of their work in order that we might gain the last full measure of their time. Indiana University Internships offer an opportunity for professional experience in guidance under the direction of a staff trained in the personnel field. Graduate study may be pursued with a major in Personnel and Guidance, or in Education, Psychology, Recreation, Sociology, or other fields.

Stipends which cover room, board, and basic fees are granted for half-time service in the Women's Residence Halls. In addition to the personnel responsibilities in the halls, the counselors carry a part time academic program limited to a maximum of ten hours each semester. The Master's degree may be completed under this plan in four semesters, either with or without a thesis. During one semester of the second year, Counselors may gain further experience by supervised employment in University offices dealing with student personnel administration. The training and experience received in the combined program of work and study in personnel may lead to careers in education, government, industry, or social agencies.

"Whither the Changing Fraternity?"

→ DR. G. HERBERT SMITH, President of Willamette University, Salem, Oregon, was the principal speaker at the Thursday luncheon held in the main dining room. Dr. Smith's speech titled, "Whither the Changing Fraternity?" was timely and of much interest to all in attendance.

During the course of his speech Dr. Smith stated, "The American College Fraternity, as represented by the Greek Letter social organizations for men and women on the college campuses of the United

States and Canada, has been remarkably resilient. During the century and a quarter of its life, the Fraternity has adjusted to changing educational demands and environments and has survived when many other student organizations have passed from the academic scene.

"The College Fraternity has some basic qualities which have endeared it to its members, enabling it not only to survive but to multiply and grow. In a society which encourages young people of divergent social heritages, mental capacities, and educational interests to go to college and universities in large numbers, the college fraternity has provided an opportunity for small homogeneous groups made up of individuals of like tastes and interests to work and live together. This has been possible because

of the fraternity system of selection of members as is practiced by the Greek letter organizations. In many instances, the loyalties which have resulted more nearly resemble family loyalties than any other relationship.

"Throughout the nation we must anticipate college enrollment totals by 1970 that will double the 1954 figures. The college fraternity must decide if it is to maintain its approximate present size, and thus represent an even smaller minority of the total, or if it will expand and keep pace with collegiate growth and run the risk of losing its value by so doing.

"The problems faced by fraternities today are the result of their position as a definite minority group. Pressures from those who would destroy the fraternity system will increase if the American College fraternity becomes more and more representative of a smaller and smaller segment of the college population. Conversely to attempt to expand with the times could present problems which may not have a satisfactory solution. To expand means either more chapters on a given campus or larger chapters. If existing groups are doubled in size, the fraternity could lose so much of its value as to jeopardize a real reason for continuing existence."

Dr. Smith stated that several years ago, Dr. George Starr Lasher of Theta Chi advocated existing fraternities on some of the large university campuses consider the possibility of establishing a second chapter on the same campus. At the time it was taken largely as a joke. Under present conditions, however, it appears much less a joke and more a possible solution.

Dr. Smith concluded his speech by stating, "It is a happy conclusion that the college fraternity of the future must be even more constructive than in the past. The greatest hope for the future is found in a return to the basic ideals, principles, and goals on which your fraternity was founded."

Dorothy Deemer Houghton Has Nansen Medal



Accepting the Nansen Medal for 1956 is Dorothy D. Houghton, Iowa T. Shown in the council chamber of the Palais des Nations in Geneva with Mrs. Houghton are Dr. Odd Nansen, son of Dr. Fridtjof Nansen for whom this medal is named, Dr. James M. Read, Deputy United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Mr. Georges Palthey, who read the message from the Secretary-General of the United Nations, and Mr. Charles Jordan.

Mrs. Houghton became the second American in history to be awarded the Nansen Medal. This world-wide recognition for Mrs. Houghton's distinguished service to refugees was the occasion for a moving ceremony in Geneva.

In the words on the scroll presented with the medal the committee charged with making this award, cited Mrs. Houghton as follows: "Appreciating the deep humanitarian concern of Mrs. Dorothy D. Houghton with the problems of refugees, and her untiring efforts to promote their interests in the many private and voluntary organizations in which she has always played a prominent part; recognizing the leading role played by her as Deputy Director for Refugees, Migration and Voluntary Assistance of the United States Foreign Operations Administration, in the implementation of the United States Escapee Program, and in promoting the admission of refugees into the United States."

The medal, named for the great Norwegian humanitarian, Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, was presented to Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in 1954, and to Queen Juliana of Holland in 1955.

Pi Beta Phi Rotary Fellowship Winner

Karina Hagman, Indiana B, of Kokomo, Indiana, a member of Pi Beta Phi, will attend the University of Grenoble, France, as a Rotary Foundation Fellow during the 1956-57 academic year. One of 126 young men and women from 33 countries to receive a

grant this year from the world-wide service club organization, she will study French literature and history in preparation for a career as a teacher of foreign languages. The Rotary Club of Kokomo recommended her for the Fellowship.

The Rotary Foundation Fellowships program was inaugurated in 1947, as one of Rotary's contributions toward the promotion of international understanding, good will, and peace. To date, 831 young men and women from 61 countries have been awarded Rotary Fellowships for a year of graduate study in 40 countries. Total grants since 1947 are in excess of \$2,000,000.

Clare Brown Williams, N. Y. A, Wins Top GOP Post in Florida

Mrs. Frank E. Williams, the former Clare Irene Brown, New York A, 1931, won a hotly contested election on May 29 for the post of Republican National Committeewoman in Florida. While living in St. Louis Mrs. Williams was active in the large St. Louis Alumnae Club of Pi Beta Phi and served as its President. She then became Epsilon Province President and served for three years. When Mr. Williams retired from his law practice in 1948 they moved to Florida and now live in St. Petersburg. Mrs. Williams is active in such organizations

as the D.A.R., the Women's Club, Pi Beta Phi Alumnae Club, as well as in Republican politics. She is President of the Women's Republican Club of St. Petersburg, the largest political organization in the South, and is the State Committeewoman from her County and the State Committee Vice-Chairman for the First Congressional District which elected William C. Cramer to Congress in 1954 as the only Republican south of North Carolina. She has also served on the Executive Committee of the Florida Federation of Republican Women.

Golden Arrow Twins

Every club, too, is proud of its Golden Arrow members, as is Chicago West Suburban of its 5 living members. The club bases its claim to distinction, however, on having the only Golden Arrow twins. And twins that have been Pi Beta Phis for over 64 years!

Mary and Susan Lewis were initiated into Michigan Beta in 1892. They have been interested and loyal Pi Phis all these years, and are today devoted members of the Chicago suburban club and regular attendants at its meetings.

In this age of families being frequently trans-

ferred and moving about, they have a rare and enviable record of being unusually deeply rooted, for they lived for 70 years in the house in which they were born, in Hyde Park in Chicago (5605 Dorchester Avenue) and then moved to an apartment only a block away where they lived for another 10 years! (5718 Dorchester Ave.)

For the past 54 years, since 1902, they have spent their summers at the lovely summer resort at Ephraim in beautiful Door County, Wisconsin. In 1917 their father built their own family cottage there which they have occupied every summer since. It was, by happy coincidence, through neighbors of many years' acquaintance in Ephraim that they later became affiliated with the Chicago suburban club.

They attended the University of Michigan for the two years of 1891-'93, and then went on to graduate from the University of Chicago in 1895, where they also made Phi Beta Kappa. Miss Mary taught in Bowen High School in Chicago for 41 years. Miss Susan taught in the Starrett School for Girls for almost that long.

They consider one of the great highlights of their lives a round-robin letter which has flourished actively for over 62 years! All the participants were members of their Pi Phi chapter back at Ann Arbor. They were 35 strong in the beginning in that summer of 1893 when the chapter circle first began to part. Now there are but 5 left, though the letter continues to be as active and cherished, and perhaps more so, as it was at the start. Two lifetime friends, whose outstanding careers have influenced the lives of many young men and women in Michigan, will receive honorary degrees in Michigan State University's spring commencement exercises Sunday (June 10).

The two are Miss Marie Dye, retiring dean of the College of Home Economics at M.S.U., and Miss Sarah Van Hoosen Jones, who retired in December after 12 years as a member of the State Board of Agriculture, governing body of M.S.U. They will be among six prominent persons to receive honorary doctoral degrees at the university's 98th annual commencement Sunday at 4 P.M. in Macklin stadium.

The honorary Doctor of Laws degrees the two friends will receive will be added to doctoral degrees both earned earlier in life. Miss Dye received the Ph.D. in 1922 at the University of Chicago and Miss Jones the Ph.D. in 1921 at the University of Wisconsin.

Their friendship, which has continued for more than four decades, "began when we met in the fifth grade at the University of Chicago elementary school," Miss Jones recalled recently. "We were classmates through the grades, high school and college." Miss Jones gives partial credit for her early

education to Miss Dye when she explains, "She was a great help to me in mathematics."

In 1914 they were graduated together from the University of Chicago. And it was during their college years, says Miss Dye, "that Sarah always said I would be a teacher."

It was also in 1914 that the two friends made decisions which not only separated them, but determined their future careers.

Miss Dye chose to continue her studies at the University of Chicago and received the Ph.D. there in 1922. She then began to teach.

Miss Jones, however, chose to enter "a man's world." At 22 she announced to her unsuspecting family that she wanted to operate the farm which had been owned by the family since 1823. Her family agreed, but with the advice to first "learn what you need to know to run the farm."

Following this advice Miss Jones received the master's degree in animal husbandry at the University of Wisconsin in 1916 and completed the Ph.D. there in genetics in 1921. Before starting her 365-day-a-year job on the farm, however, she toured the Orient with her mother and aunt.

The paths of the two friends crossed again when Miss Jones returned to the 400-acre family farm near Rochester, Mich., in 1923, and later came to

Miss Dye became dean of Home Economics in 1930. Miss Jones was first elected to the State Board of Agriculture in 1943.

Now that both have reached retirement, they plan to do things they previously had been too busy to do.

Miss Jones, who has just returned from a trip around the world, explains: "Now I want to spend time doing something I have always loved—keeping house."

Miss Dye, whose responsibilities at M.S.U. end this summer, plans to "travel, rest and visit friends and home economics alumnae."

The Why of It

When Texas Christian invited and welcomed fraternities and sororities to the campus, Dr. Thomas F. Richardson, Dean of Students, named six specific benefits that the university expected from these fraternities. These factors were based on the investigation the administrators had made at other universities where the fraternity system was already established.

"First," he said, "we believe that group and individual competition will raise the scholastic achievement average of the university. We are already seeing the interest and encouragement of fellow members in the study habits of student pledges.

"Second, we believe that with these groups organized and functioning as democratic bodies there will be many opportunities for leadership, leadership training, individual and group responsibility, and other benefits in growth toward citizenship.

"Third, we believe that with each group setting high moral and ethical standards our entire college community will be raised to a higher standard.

"Fourth, we believe that social experiences in our sororities will tend to give poise, high social standards and dignity to the many participating members.

"Fifth, we believe that through a program of worthwhile, well chosen, group projects, our students will get the real sense of concern for others and a great training for civic, social and community responsibility.

"Sixth, we believe that through training and experience in group loyalty there will develop a deeper loyalty to the university and its ideals and objectives."

DOROTHY COFFIN HICKEY, *Pennsylvania A* AND ESTHER WIER, *The Answer Book on Naval Social Customs*, Military Service Publishing Co., 122 pp.

For most of us our social problems are easily solved by Emily Post, but for those whose life is lived largely in either Army or Navy circles, there are special customs to learn and observe. This presented comparatively little difficulty prior to World War II when practically all officers were either West Point or Annapolis trained and, therefore, well drilled in tradition long before being commissioned.

Today, however, many reserve officers have no long Navy or Army background, and their wives have less with the result that they not only do not understand the special social customs of the services but also often resent them.

For young persons in the Navy, at least, reading this book will make life much easier and pleasanter. Not only will they learn what the customs are, but also they will find that these customs, in most instances, have good reasons for their existence and are not merely arbitrary rules.

From a physical standpoint the book is extremely attractive, being very well laid out for easy reference, and the illustrations by Grace Harrison, the wife of Commander Arthur G. Harrison, show a delightful sense of humor which can be appreciated both in and out of the Navy.

There could scarcely be a more useful gift for the bride who is to be a Navy wife, and every Navy family should certainly add it to its own personal library.

AUTHOR INTEREST: Dorothy Hickey, the Pi Phi co-author of this handbook, has many sorority ties. She is from the Pennsylvania Alpha chapter, and has a daughter from New Mexico Alpha as well as two sisters from Iowa Beta and Gamma respectively. For the past five years Mrs. Hickey, who has her B.S. in Library Science from Simmons College in Boston, has been a Navy Librarian stationed at three different California posts where she grew increasingly aware of the need for a book like this. Her co-author has been a Navy wife for twenty-two years, and together they have performed an admirable task.

MARION AND BEN FERRIER, *God's River Country*, Prentice-Hall, Inc., 212 pp.

Even in this era of man-made marvels there remain a few areas in North America where man can look upon his surroundings with the eyes of a pioneer and see the world still much as it must have been in the beginning. Doing this was the comparatively recent experience of a group of teen-age boys and young men guided to the God's River country of Canada by explorer Ben Ferrier.

His wife, the first white woman to make the trip down God's River by canoe, is the author of this volume about their once-in-a-lifetime journey into the wilderness to which Mr. Ferrier contributed the photographic illustrations. Thanks to this narrative other adventure-minded young people can share the experiences of Franklin Dunbaugh, William K. Kellogg III, Adlai E. Stevenson III, and their companions into this sub-arctic region where winter crowds the other three seasons into such a brief time that violets and goldenrod bloom together.

So rugged were their experiences in portaging canoes and negotiating rapids that they returned to their departure point physically matured to the extent that the city-bred clothing they had left behind for the boat trip home looked as if it belonged to younger brothers. The changes went deeper, however, and the experiences of a summer provided lifetime enrichment.

For persons in search of a teen-ager Christmas gift, this would be an excellent choice.

AUTHOR INTEREST: Marion Zilley Ferrier, a Wisconsin Beta Pi Phi, has with her husband explored most of the untamed wilderness of this continent, and her book is one of the Lodestar Series being recommended for teen-agers. Ben Ferrier, a member of the Explorers Club, has had a Canadian island named for him.

Sororities are reproached for taking too much time, and I myself sometimes have misgivings on that point. But the fact remains that year after year, when all the grades are averaged, the total sorority score is *higher than the campus average*, and *higher than the all-women's average*. I attribute their high scholarship to the pressure brought by the older girls and the alumnae advisors. Perhaps also to the *emotional security* which comes from belonging, of acceptance, and which creates a climate favorable to achievement.

The sororities are reproached for their emphasis upon social skills. But the technique of social life is not frivolous; it is basic and essential. Many a woman has lost out in her business career because she lacked it; many a man has been denied a big job because his wife was socially inept.

What finishing schools used to do for a girl, the sorority does now. What her mother and I would like to do, her contemporaries succeed in doing. They are the ones who can give her polish and poise, improve her manners and appearance, push her out into sports, dramatics and the "Y," arrange dates for her, and stand guard while she studies. All this she will accept from her chapter at a time when she is becoming restive under the authority of her elders.

Last Saturday I was having lunch with a group

of women who have met at intervals ever since our college days.

"What shall I say about sororities?" I asked.

"Say that we are together today because we joined a sorority. Say that it gives us friendships."

So that is what I shall say.
