Three of our more famous Pi Phis have been in the news recently.

Marilyn Horne, California Gamma, the internationally

acclaimed mezzo-soprano, was listed in the New York *Times* (October, 1983) as one of the twelve greatest voices of all time, and was the only one on the list still living. The list was compiled by the *Times*' cultural correspondent, Harold Schonberg. Marilyn has also been described by *Opera News* as "probably the greatest singer in the world."

Her autobiography, "Marilyn Horne: My Life," written with Jane Scovell, was released in November.

Nancy Kulp, Florida Beta, who makes her home in Pennsylvania, hopes to be headed for Washington, D.C. soon. She has decided to challenge incumbent Republican Congressman E. G. "Bud" Shuster, who is seeking a seventh term in office from the rural, central Pennsylvania 9th District. Nancy was unopposed on the Democratic ballot in the April primary. Fans will remember Nancy as Miss Jane Hathaway on TV's "The Beverly Hillbillies," a role she played for ten years. She has been active in Democratic politics for thirty years, and has appeared in more than 600 television shows, including "Love Boat" and "Fantasy Island." Before she joined "Hillbillies," she was a regular on "The Bob Cummings Show."

Patricia Neal, Illinois Epsilon, was honored in February at a Centennial Anniversary celebration at Flushing Hospital in Queens, New York. She received a "Flame of Healing Award" for her work with stroke victims. She has made a dramatic recovery from the stroke she suffered in 1965, and, in making the award, Max Kupferberg, chairman of the hospital board, said, "Her courage and fortitude in confronting enormous physical and emotional challenges has inspired us all."

Patricia also helped dedicate the Center for Independent Living at St. Anthony's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. The Center is designed to assist the elderly and trauma victims in re-establishing an independent lifestyle.

A great deal of Patricia's time is devoted to the Patricia Neal Rehabilitation Center in her hometown, Knoxville, Tenn.

Elaine "Cissy" Musselman, managing director of Harris & Company, Louisville, has been elected vice president of the Committee of 200, an organization of the country's preeminent women business owners and executives.

Cissy was the Convention initiate into Kentucky Alpha at the Louisville Convention last summer.



250 mile trail ride celebrates anniversary

To celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies, a 250 mile ride was undertaken from Banff to Jasper in September, 1983. Among the fifteen veteran trail riders chosen to represent the past and the present membership were: Lois Badgley Laycraft, Pi Phi's Canadian Philanthropy Chairman from Paddockwood, Saskatchewan; Dorothy Livingstone Lomas, Kappa Alpha Theta from Calgary, Alberta; and Jane Allman Wetzel, Kappa Kappa Gamma from Dallas, Texas. In conversation high on a mountain pass one day the three discovered a bond beyond mountain tiding—that of their fraternity memberships. Lois and Dorothy both attended the University of Alberta, then met years later on a trail ride. Jane's mother, Margaret Deavours Allman of Dallas, is a Pi Phi and a close friend is Sally MacKenzie, the 1981 Convention chairman!


In retrospect, the sixteen day journey was wonderful. On a day-to-day basis it was often arduous. Mother Nature provided great variety in weather and the group rode through rain, sleet and heavy snow. Because they were scheduled to meet another group riding from Jasper toward Banff at the Kootenay Plains where two hundred other members and dignitaries would meet for a traditional "Pow-Wow," there could be no delays. The difficult trails were made hazardous by the ice and snow. More than once the horses had to be led down steep, rocky inclines or jumped over deadfall. They forded many creeks and rivers already edged with ice, slogged through boggy alpine meadows, and faced bitter winds. One high desolate pass was so cold and bleak Lois says she would not have been surprised to come upon the Great Wall of China.

Although experienced outfitters and guides accompanied the rides, everyone was expected to help with the horses, set up tents, and assist with meals. It did not take long to become accustomed to such chores and as the group melded into harmonious friendship, even kneeling in the moonlight to wash dishes seemed like fun. Setting up tents in the snow became routine and by ten o'clock at night little could be heard in camp but the forest sounds and contented snores.

Only one accident required the care of three doctors and three nurses in the group. A "MASH" unit was set up in a matter of minutes and even the patient seemed to enjoy being sewn back together.

On the last day, descending from Shovel Pass and riding toward the Jasper Park Lodge stable, winter changed dramatically into autumn. The falling snow gave way to golden aspen leaves drifting to the earth and the usual shouts and laughter quieted as this epic journey concluded and goodbyes were said. But friendships formed under such circumstances are deep and long-lasting. Already plans are underway for a reunion and perhaps another autumn adventure in the high country. And there will surely be another meeting of a Kappa and a Theta and a Pi Phi and their husbands, all of whom love each other's company!

Vermont Beta earns highest campus honors

"Everyone here kindly step to the rear and let a Pi Phi lead the way . . . "rang true on March 10, when Vermont Beta won three of the highest honors in the Greek system at the University of Vermont.

Greek Formals, an event which honors the fraternities and sororities, is a night of dining, dancing, and excitement. There was excitement, indeed, for the intelligent angels were presented a trophy for having the highest grade point average among sororities for fall semester, 1983.

Shelley Poulsen was honored as Most Outstanding Greek Woman, with selection based on scholastic achievement, community service, and campus involvement. Shelley was awarded a plaque engraved with her name, which will be displayed in the chapter house until next year's ceremonies.

Finally, Vermont Beta earned the highest honor to be had among the sororities, the Lambda Cup, The Lambda Cup signifies the most outstanding sorority on campus, based on community service, extra-curricular activities, and academic achievement. Vermont Beta was the first sorority to win the Lambda Cup for three consecutive years; winning was an honor in itself.

It is the diversity, loyalty, and quality of the sisters that helps the tightly-knit Vermont Beta chapter win such awards.



Are you familiar with the above logo? Blue lettering is emblazoned across a gold chain, which encircles the white folder containing Pi Beta Phi's Alcohol Awareness Program, "Friend to Friend." Both the linked chain and the title are reminders that we are bound together in friendship, with the purpose of helping each other. Now, friend to friend, we are directing our attention to the special area of alcohol use and abuse.

Because problems associated with alcohol are severe on most college campuses, as well as in society at large, the need for education and guidance has been apparent to Grand Council for some time. Although several men's fraternities and other college-oriented organizations have developed alcohol awareness programs, little material has been directed specifically towards fraternity women. "Friend to Friend" is a complete program created to fill that need. It was developed by Kate Gilbert Phifer, Director of Pledge Development.

"Friend to Friend" is an educational tool designed to help Pi Phis accomplish three goals:

- 1) to increase awareness of the effects of alcohol,
- to promote understanding of the difference between sensible use and abuse of alcohol,
- to cultivate responsible decision-making by Pi Beta Phi members, both individually and collectively, in the areas of alcohol consumption, behavior, and attitude.

The trifold cover opens to reveal three pockets labeled "Background," "Workshops," and "Supplements." The background information includes the Pi Beta Phi Alcohol Policy, legal information on civil liability, criminal liability, and right to privacy, and general instructions on presenting the entire program.

The "Workshops" pocket, meat of the program, contains materials for three workshops. The first, "What Do You Think?", is an alcohol awareness game designed to teach facts about the effects of alcohol. It also includes nutrition tips, facts about drinking and driving, and about alcoholism.

The second workshop, "How Do You Feel?", is a series of role plays designed to encourage discussion on behavior and attitude. The third workshop, "Are You Ready To Party?", is based on practical pointers and includes "tip sheets" covering such subjects as "How to Prevent Alcohol Abuse From Wrecking A Party" and "How To Detect A Drinking Problem and Help A Friend." The "Supplements" pocket contains charts and flyers colorcoordinated to go with the different workshops. For example, there is an "Alcohol and Calories" chart for display with the first workshop. This pocket also has additional suggestions for other programs.

In February, copies of "Friend to Friend" were sent to chapter presidents, and province and national officers. The initial response has been exciting! Within the first week Florida Beta offered it as a resource at FSU's Greek Council Leadership Conference, and "Friend to Friend" was incorporated into the conference program. Maryland Beta invited all Greek presidents to an alcohol awareness seminar based on "Friend to Friend" materials. At several of the Regional Seminars, held shortly after "Friend to Friend" distribution, workshops were quickly inserted into the agenda, and actives responded with great enthusiasm.

Although initial production of "Friend to Friend" has been geared to chapter use, it is hoped that alumnae will find it of value also.

Pi Phis are encouraged to share this program with other groups—chapters with their Panhellenic Councils and alumnae clubs with high school or church groups. A limited supply of the complete portfolios are available from Central Office at \$6.00 each, but the pocket inserts can be photocopied for sharing with others.

In the future the Fraternity hopes to add more workshops and supplements, including material specifically directed to alumnae. All Pi Phis are encouraged to contribute ideas on how to improve and expand "Friend to Friend." Alumnae should send suggestions to the Grand Vice President of Alumnae, and collegians can send their suggestions to the Director of Pledge Development.

This program belongs to all of us, so . . . friend to friend . . . let's make it worthwhile!



Olympic games involve Pi Phis in many ways

One cannot help but feel it in Los Angeles. It is all around, displayed on sweatshirts, key chains, and billboards, through city improvement, and special interest groups. The Pi Phis at UCLA and USC are not immune from it either. What is this fever? It is OLYMPIC FEVER III! Everywhere one turns at USC and UCLA, the gala of the Los Angeles Olympiad is felt.

Whether the California Pi Phis will be in Los Angeles or in their respective home towns in the summer, their eyes will be on fellow students who will be on the United States team.

One area of importance will be the women's track team, where Cal Delta Pi Phi Polly Plummer is to put in a grand effort for the U.S.

The campuses of the two Pi Phi chapters will play major roles in the 1984 Summer Olympic Games, to be held from July 28-August 12.

UCLA, home of California Delta, will host the gymnastics competition and the exhibition tennis matches. USC, home of California Gamma, will host the swimming and diving competitions. There will also be two Olympic Villages, one at UCLA and another at USC, which will house all of the athletes in the campus student residences.

Pauley Pavilion at UCLA will host gymnastics competition from July 29-August 5, and August 9-August 11. The building was introduced to the campus at the Commencement Exercises in June, 1965, and has been the center of activity on the UCLA campus ever since. It was named for University of California Regent Edwin W. Pauley. Its seating capacity is 12,713.

Tennis will be featured in the new Los Angeles Tennis Center, built at UCLA for the Olympics.

Swimming and diving competitions will take place at McDonald Swim Stadium, newly built at USC. It will hold 11,000 spectators.

The Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC) has been working closely with both campuses to make sure everything will be ready by opening ceremonies on July 28. Various renovation and upgrading projects have been taking place all year long on both campuses. LAOOC and UCLA announced in 1982 that the Olympic Analytical Laboratory will be located at the UCLA Center for the Health Sciences. It will be operated by the UCLA Medical School and Department of Pharmacology. The facility will provide drug testing for athletes.


Olympic Villages at UCLA and USC, along with satellite housing at the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB), will accomodate 9,000 athletes and 3,000 National Olympic Committee officials.

Housing facilities at UCLA consist of four residence halls and two residential suites. At USC, Olympic Village will be two residence halls, suites, and apartment complexes. All are currently occupied by UCLA and USC students.

UCLA will also help host the Olympic Arts Festival June 1-August 12. The festival will consist of presentations by many artists in various forms of art: music, dance, theater, film, and visual arts. The Olympic Arts Festival will offer a wide variety of artistic talent, including theatrical performances from more than twelve countries in several languages. Over eighty dance companies from eighteen countries will perform in the Festival. There will be film festivals, more than twenty exhibitions by various artists, and musical performances of opera, jazz, blues, classical, chamber, rock, country, and folk music. UCLA's Royce, Schoenberg, and MacGowan Halls will be the site of several Festival events.

Pi Phi chapter houses at UCLA and USC will also be involved in the Olympics. The Pi Phi house at UCLA will be occupied by Adidas employees, who will live in the house during the Games, and set up computers and telexes in the house. USC's chapter house will be occupied by employees of Puma.

All UCLA and USC students have the chance to participate in the 1984 Olympics by working at the Games or by volunteering their talents in unpaid positions.



New business is exciting venture

"It was a difficult decision for me to leave a large firm where I had a very successful position. However, I have always wanted to work on my own and I am very excited about this new venture."

Dawn Sheeler Ford has taken the big step and is working on her own now—as president of her own firm, Consumer Awareness Management. She has been preparing for the move for about two years. It was the training she received in her former position with the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) and the contacts she made across the country that allowed her to make the big move.

Dawn lives in Knoxville, Tenn., and is current Kappa Province President. A graduate of the University of Maryland, where she was president of Maryland Beta, Dawn was a member of Tennessee Gamma's Alumnae Advisory Committee for five years preceding her election as province president.

In forming her own company, Dawn will specialize in working with other companies to improve their consumer programs and train employees who work directly with the public.

With TVA, she was Chief of the Citizen Action Office, the Authority's first consumer affairs office. She was responsible for the Agency's toll-free telephone service, which received an average of 10,000 calls a month; management of the organization's public participation program including over 400 public meetings; development of a continuing outreach program serving consumer organizations; and publishing a consumer newsletter and other publications. She also spent two years as a TVA information officer handling media tours, speeches, news releases, and editing the TVA Annual Report; was the administrative assistant to the Chairman of the Board, and served as Chief Information Officer for Land Between the Lakes, TVA's outdoor recreation and environmental education center.

After receiving her B.S. in journalism, she spent two years in Europe working for Army Special Services.

And most have continued involvement with the Fraternity at either the collegiate or alumnae level.

Susanna Baker McBee perhaps sums up best the feeling of the others as she writes, ''I speak out often for the Greek system in general and Pi Phi in particular, feeling so proud of my affiliation with an organization that cares enough about the development of its members to provide financial programs such as the RGC scholarship and the graduate Fellowship.''

A criteria in selecting Fellowship winners is the development of character and a resultant ability to represent the Fraternity in a worthy manner. The Fellowship recipients surveyed appear to have done so superbly.

Colorado Alpha to hold centennial birthday fest

Colorado Alpha at the University of Colorado will be 100 years old in October, 1984. A centennial committee has been working for months planning a big birthday celebration for the University's Homecoming weekend, October 12–14, and it will be a very special event!

In the west, 100 years covers a lot of territory. When the C.U. chapter was chartered in 1884, the University consisted of one building, Old Main, built in 1876, the year Colorado became a state. University Hill was bare of trees and buildings, a stark contrast to the beautiful campus of today.

The new Pi Beta Phi chapter met in a third floor room of Old Main, the only sorority to do so. Delta Tau Delta fraternity met in the basement.

In 1907 the girls planned and had built a three-story brick house on a hill. The house was grand and stood all alone.

Not satisfied with being the first national Fraternity for women and the first one at Colorado University, pioneering Pi Phis, with the help of some unaffiliates, originated the idea of Mortar Board on campus in 1908 and Hesperia in 1912, both of which spread nationwide. C.U. Pi Phis were the first local presidents of these honoraries for senior and junior women.

As Boulder grew, and the Pi Phi house became hemmed in by buildings, the girls looked for a new location. In 1927 the magnificent structure at 890 11th Street was built on a site up the hill. The new house may not have been as convenient to the campus, but it is said that Pi Phis owe their shapely legs to that long climb! When the move was made in 1927, initiates from that year recall that they did most of the clean-up and moving work. But they were very proud of the beautiful English Tudor (now doubled in size due to an addition built in 1955) which has now been home to C.U. Pi Phis for 57 years. Although the original oriental rugs are no longer there, the fine Baldwin grand piano, which was often lent to the University for concerts, still graces the music room.

The Colorado Alpha chapter has over 1,600 living alumnae in good standing. An effort is being made to contact all of them about the centennial reunion. So far, nearly 300 have expressed an interest in returning to Boulder for the celebration. Plans call for house and campus tours, lunch before and open house after the Homecoming game, and a banquet at the University Memorial Center to close the festivities on Sunday, October 14.

Many accomplished women are alumnae of the chapter, including former Miss America Marilyn VanDerbur Atler, who was gently pushed into the contest by her sorority sisters. Thumbnail sketches of alums who plan to return run the gamut from former Quiz Kids and TV personalities to university administrators, artists, physicians, corporation board members, appointed and elected civil servants, community volunteers, and the wives of a governor (Wyoming), a French diplomat in the Caribbean, and professional golfer Hale Irwin. They also include the two female directors of the Boulder Chamber of Commerce. Apparently Pi Phis haven't lost their touch! Many wrote to say they are happy housewives and proud mothers and grandmothers.

Whatever their status, all Colorado Alphas are urged to

attend and renew old friendships. Any who have not received notice or have failed to return it are encouraged to write immediately to P.O. Box 12042, Boulder, CO 80303, so that they may be included. Any correspondence should show full maiden name and initiation year as well as current name, address, and zip code.

Those who have not seen the house, the campus, or the city of Boulder recently will be amazed at the changes. Only the beautiful Flatirons and Flagstaff mountain remain unchanged. The large and excellent active chapter is eager to welcome and entertain the returning alumnae, and the centennial committee, composed of members spanning the decades, is compiling a complete history of the chapter, expanding on that written by Halle Collins forty years ago. Special C.U. Pi Phis who will attend include the three granddaughters and great-granddaughter of Evalyn Barney Snell, first initiate of the chapter in 1884, representing four generations of Colorado Alphas, including the late Lolita Snell Prouty, Grand Treasurer for 25 years. The 1912 initiate who accompanied former Grand President Amy B. Onken on her travels will attend as will the daughter of architect Glen H. Huntington who planned the present house and its addition. Two granddaughters of Fraternity Founders live in the area and will be invited to attend.

The banquet on Sunday will be open to all Pi Phis, and Grand President Jean Scott and area Pi Phis from other chapters will be present. So, for a wonderful weekend of nostalgia and fun, all C.U. Pi Phis are urged to Remember Old Main and Rush to the Rockies, Fly to the Foothills, Flee to the Flatirons, Float up to Flagstaff, and Rise to the Occasion. It won't be complete without you! The committee sums it up with a closing verse:

Century of living bas "Ring Ching" memories

One hundred years she takes in stride . . . Warmth and love in her abide.

Nellie Heyd, Minnesota Alpha '06, celebrated her one hundredth birthday December 11, 1983, at the Wilder Residence in St. Paul where she lives. After being honored by her living community, Nellie was at home for her sisters in the wine and blue who came to celebrate and sing Pi Phi songs.

"Ring Ching Ching was as popular seventy years ago as now," says Nellie.

A freshman at the University of Minnesota in 1902, Nellie commuted to campus by street car. In 1904 she joined a local sorority which became Pi Beta Phi her senior year. Meetings were held in members' homes.

Her studies included math, French, Spanish, and Latin. Upon graduating she was hired to teach math and French in St. Paul's Central High School. As a young teacher she spent two summers traveling through France to improve her vocabulary. She taught for 42 years.

One of Nellie's prize possessions is a letter written by Horace Greeley, the man who coined the battle cry of the westward movement: "Go West, young man!" This letter came to her via her father, Leonard J. Heyd, who worked two years for Greeley on his *New York Tribune*. Leonard Heyd came to St. Paul with his bride by steamboat from St. Louis in 1883, when Nellie was about to be born.

A younger friend of Nellie's, Pi Phi Hilda Stern Perkins, Iowa Gamma '13, also resides at Wilder. Hilda says if she has difficulty figuring her accounts or tax statement, she goes to Nellie for help.

In Azpitia, Peru (6 miles south of Lima), Linda Lukens was foreman of a construction team. She helped construct a cement block building which was to become the site of a health training school for local people. Her accommodations were far from first class—sleeping with mats on a concrete floor and bathing in a river—but her special experience there made it all worthwhile.

Sophomore Jennifer Vaughn served within the U.S. Jennifer volunteered for Habitat for Humanity in Americus, Ga., by constructing housing for the poor. Mixing mortar, laying foundations, hanging doors, and laying linoleum were some of her projects during the eight hour work day. However, her construction team did receive a well-deserved break, for they had an opportunity to spend two days skiing in North Carolina at the end of their trip.


The heat of Bogota, Columbia, did not stop Debbie Durgan from working hard on a construction team there. Her fortymember group reconstructed housing for the poor elderly.

Conference representatives voice views of interior design students at the national convention and throughout the year. They also make sure that interior design students get the most benefits from ASID.






Winning design commissioned by Fairfield.

Sapphire Valley development commissions Wilson hanging

Last fall Arrowcraft Shop was approached by a representative from Fairfield Communities, who asked us to submit a design for a dyptich—two complementary wall hangings—to be used in their time-share units in Sapphire Valley, North Carolina. Two hangings were developed by Frances Wilson, based on her own design and in accordance with the size/color requirements specified by Fairfield. The two pieces were reviewed by the company and accepted.

Arrowcraft has never done commercial commissions before, so the entire process of submitting the original design, competing with other craftsmen, and setting up the project once accepted has been an exciting experience for all concerned. Blanche Huskey, a forty year weaver for Arrowcraft, is doing the woven sections. Frances Wilson is doing the assembling, quilting, and finishing work. One of the maintenance men prepared the strips of wood to which the hangings are attached.

Mixed media exhibition features eighteen artists

"Surface Enrichment: Color and Pattern," an invitational mixed media exhibition, was sponsored by Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts March 2–April 21. This exhibition focused on works of eighteen artists exemplifying current trends in the use of color and pattern in clay, fabric, fiber, leather, metal, paper and wood.

The translation of color and pattern varied from structured rows of layered handmade paper by Joan Sterrenburg to depthfilled screen printed fabric by Nancy Swickard. Swickard used illusion of winding ribbons that seemed to float and penetrate open window space.


Curtis and Suzan Benzle created porcelain vessels by using inlaid colored clays that simulated a patchwork quilt-like pattern of translucency. This simulation of patchwork pattern was also evident in the work of Hiroko and Gene Pijanowski, Lisa D'Agostino, Jan Brooks Loyd, and Nancy Albertson. The Pijanowski's used mokume-gane techniques in their brooches and pendants made of gold, ivory and plexiglass. D'Agostino's metal pins utilized marriage of metal techniques incorporating sterling, brass, copper and nickel. The fabricated steel work of Loyd displayed the patchwork quality through forged and etching processes and selective bluing and browning. Albertson's creations were collaged pattern using dyed handmade paper.

The other three clay artists invited showed distinct variations in style. Susan Icove's shiny earthenware vessels were dramatically contrasted with the velvety surface of Rick Foris' raku vessels. Karen Koblitz' brightly colored low-fire wall reliefs utilized slip-cast fish and cup saucer and spoon in her still-life settings.


Varied fiber techniques were evident in the work of Diane Itter, Patti Lechman and Nancy Shaw Cramer. Itter used knotted, colorful linen in her cross-like series of fiber works. Knotting techniques were also used in Lechman's baskets. Her three dimensional creations incorporated crocheted interiors. Cramer's patterned wool and linen rugs were so well-crafted that both sides deserved viewing.

The remaining artists in this fascinating exhibit included Terrie Hancock Mangat, Gaza Bowen, and William Patrick. Fabric artist Mangat created huge pieced quilts utilizing applique, embroidery, and beading. Gaza Bowen's leather pieces incorporated inlay and overlay techniques in her brightly colored shoe and belt series. By using laminated and band-sawed wood, William Patrick was able to turn his wooden plates on the lathe and transform them into landscapes through use of light and dark coloration of wood.

This Arrowmont exhibition truly reflected the current color and pattern concepts being developed by artists across the country.

With the approval of the Board of Governors in the fall of 1983, a storage area in the building has been transformed into a year round studio space for Clare's creative work in the designing and screen-printing of fabric. The addition of an exhaust fan, screen/fabric racks and a large sink to the space allows Clare to do all of her artwork in a private area as she prepares for exhibitions.

Fascination with airborne objects directed Clare to the design and construction of decorative "skyrunners"... a name she uses to distinguish her kite forms from those commercially made. She has been exploring and making "skyrunners" for about five years, using screen-printed cotton fabric, pieced and stitched together, and combined with rivets, wood dowels, metallic tape and vinyl tubing. Color and pattern are Clare's primary concerns in creating her pieces.

Clare's "skyrunners" were included in exhibitions in 1984 at Maryville College, Maryville, TN (February); Georgia State University, Atlanta, GA (March-April); and in New Morning Gallery, Asheville, NC (May-July); and the G. Corcoran Gallery, Muskegon, MI (September-October).

New works are added to school's permanent collection

During the past year several new works were added to the Arrowmont permanent collection. Two and three dimensional objects, donated by or purchased from faculty and/or staff assistants, were displayed in the main gallery January and February. New acquisitions were featured in the lower level gallery during the March and April workshop sessions.

New acquisitions include color and black and white photographs from summer school photography teachers James Sahlstrand, Roslyn, WA, and Earl Iverson, Lawrence, KS; an enamel wall relief from summer school enameling teacher Jamie Bennett, Boston, MA; handmade paper reliefs from spring and summer faculty members Jean Thickens Francis, Tupelo, MS and Margaret Sahlstrand, Roslyn, WA; and a clay sculptural form from spring faculty member Yosuke Haruta, Hanover, MI.

An Arrowmont purchase award was given to Joe Johnson, Fort Worth, TX, for his painting, "Fear of Being the Same", from the exhibition, "The Figure: New Form, New Function".

Pieces for the permanent collection are purchased through special fund raising activities at the school. With increased awareness of this collection and the quality of its pieces, it is hoped that a touring exhibition to museums in the United States might be planned.

Woodworking facilities grow

Expansion of the woodworking studio took place during the winter with approval of the Board of Governors. It was completed in time to welcome Canadian wood sculptor Stephen Hogbin and his large woodturning class during the 1984 spring workshops. This new 560 square foot addition to the woodshop becomes the lathe studio which houses the six lathes which were purchased through generous donations over the past several years. Arrowmont's goal is to have ten lathes in its permanent facility.

Woodturning has increased in popularity at Arrowmont in recent years. This was the first time woodturning was offered during spring because facilities were not large enough to accommodate the woodworkers inside during the often cold March weather.

The studio addition was erected by a local construction company and completed by Arrowmont maintenance men Zanley Watson, Jeff Monhollen, Ernie Shultz and Neal Watson.

The two women are California Betas and Debbie is the immediate past president of the Marin County Alumnae Club.

The Roberts doll, Carolina Rowena, brought \$300, purchased by Debbie's husband, Salvatore.

Pat, when she isn't being an auctioneer, works on a one-toone basis with abused children who have been removed from their families and placed in foster homes. She acts as liaison

between the child and the parents, with the hopes of reuniting the family. She also goes to all court proceedings. In addition, the voice of E.T. is being released on a TV commercial.

Debbie's life centers around her family right now. She's a Cub Scout leader, is a past president of the parents' group at the children's school, arranges all the assemblies, and has chaired the local Bike-a-Thon.

"All the groups I belong to I become involved in fund raising. I have taken jobs from modeling to selling handcrafted goods to just plain soliciting money, to raise funds," she says.

Cosmo has new staffer during university interim

Last fall what were most collegians doing? Studying? Going to parties? Planning spring rush? While they were heading off to a 9:00 o'clock class, I was slipping a token in the turnstile at the 28th Street station in New York City, waiting for the Double R subway to take me uptown. By 9:30 I was seated at my desk in the fiction department of COSMOPOLITAN Magazine.

From the beginning of September until Christmas I lived in New York with ten other Duke University students, participating in the school's new program, "New York and the Arts." The program requires each student to plan an independent study, enroll in one course at New York University, participate in an art seminar, and most importantly, work as an intern in a professional office.

As large a magazine as COSMOPOLITAN is, their fiction department has a staff of only three. Therefore, I was, in no time at all, assuming the responsibilities of a regular staff member. Along with completing fiction research projects for Helen Gurley Brown, I corresponded with publishers concerning book rights and spring catalogs, read unsolicited manuscripts and priority stories sent by agents, and aided with the publication of articles for upcoming issues.

As well as learning about the operation of a large, commercial magazine, I also found that there is very little glamour involved in this type of work, contrary to popular belief. (I was often asked the question, "Do people who work there look like the girls on the covers?") Fiction assistants read up to forty books a week, searching for suitable novels for condensation and trying to stay one step ahead of competition. Long hours are spent reading, writing, and editing material, all at a pace which never lets up, as there is always another issue looming in the future.

Away from the job, I never lacked things to do. New York City is the center of intellectual, social, and cultural life, and it caters to its residents like no other place in the world. Going to Broadway shows, art galleries, night clubs, and street festivals were all fascinating ways to spend my free time. Living on Madison Avenue in a residential hotel, I was within walking distance of innumerable distractions. Delis and grocery stores are on every block; shopping along famous Fifth Avenue was merely a stroll away. To be in New York is to be surrounded by the best of everything.

When I graduate from Duke, I hope to return to New York, M.A. in English in hand, and try to get my big break as a writer, advertiser, or publisher. The city is a sea of opportunity; some make it, others are lost to the cold, impersonal rat race for which the place has become famous. Even if my suburban self can't be transplanted in this teeming, churning, urban body of New York, I'll be satisfied knowing that I was there once, living with the big shots and the low lifes, the good and the bad.

Being in New York is like eating raw oysters—every one has to try it at least once. If you don't, you've missed an ephemeral part of living.

Judge Hallanan is federal appointee

One of the newest federal district judges is Elizabeth V. Hallanan, West Virginia Alpha. Appointed by President Ronald Reagan as United States District Judge for the Southern District of West Virginia, Elizabeth was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate on November 11, 1983, and assumed the office last November 30. She is the first woman to be on the federal bench in the fourth circuit, including North and South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, and West Virginia.

Elizabeth received an A.B. degree from Morris Harvey College, now the University of Charleston, and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from West Virginia University College of Law. She pledged Pi Phi during her first year in law school.

In 1959 Elizabeth was the first woman judge of a court of record in West Virginia when she became judge of the first full-time Juvenile Court in the state. For many years throughout her career, she was active in private law practice. She has served on the West Virginia Board of Education, was a member of the House of Delegates, and has been assistant Commissioner of Public Institutions. In 1969 she was appointed a member of the

W. Virginia Public Service Commission and was named chairman by Gov. Arch A. Moore, Jr. She served on the commission until 1975.

In an article appearing in the Charleston, W.Va. *Gazette*, written by E. J. Reich, Elizabeth noted that a good federal court judge must be "a ringmaster, a traffic cop and a baseball umpire, with stamina, kindness, and humor." She sees that as both a challenge and a mandate. She doesn't expect to be an activist judge and describes herself as a conservative.

Campus fights world hunger

She worked in a trench which was excavating under the seating section of the Circus. The most exciting thing that she uncovered was a Roman lamp made of terra cotta which had a relief of Achilles, the famous Greek warrior, dragging Hector around the Trojan wall.






Synchronized swimming mixes ballet, dance, and swimming with music to produce a tantalizing effect. The pair glides through the water without creating a ripple on the surface. The hardest thing for duets in this event is timing and imitation of movements. Every single move must coincide with the partner's, to produce a mirror image.

The girls design their costumes with rhinestones and sequins and wear hats of the same. To keep their hair back and out of the way, they use a mixture of gelatin and water. This keeps it on top of their heads while twisting underwater.

Tracie became a member of Arizona Alpha in 1981. She left after her first year at the University to pursue her goal, the Olympics, after which she plans to return to Arizona to finish college.

Late word has been received that Tracie Ruiz, who swims with the Seattle Aqua Club, finished first in the Solo Finals of the U.S. Synchronized Swimming Invitational National Championships and Olympic Trials Sunday, April 30. Her partner, Candy Costie, finished second.

Dean is All-American

Molly Dean, Pennsylvania Gamma, is the first female All-American athlete in the history of Dickinson College. She competed in the NCAA Division III Women's National Swimming Competition at Emory University in Atlanta in March and qualified to swim in the maximum number of events, four individual and three relays. She earned All-American status in four of the seven events by placing in the top twelve in those four. She was seventh in the 200 yard freestyle, ninth in the 400 freestyle relay, ninth in the 200 butterfly, and seventh in the 800 freestyle relay. Her team finished sixteenth of seventytwo schools competing. Last year Dickinson swimmers weren't even listed on the scoreboard!

Molly achieved many other swimming honors throughout her freshman year, just completed. She broke ten varsity records and broke a seven-year Mid-Atlantic Conference record in the 200 butterfly. At that meet, she led Dickinson to a conference championship for the first time, winning five gold medals.

Molly is an inspiration to many of her teammates, but her personal inspiration is quite special. She finds her drive in her older brother, Jeffrey.

"He was born with Down's Syndrome, yet he has overcome so much," explains Molly. "He has been a world champion swimmer in the international Special Olympics. He's probably the only person more upset than I am when I don't swim well. He helps me stay up. Because of him, I realize we can do anything we set our minds to, even if we have a handicap."

Molly's coach, Joe McEvoy, claims that Molly's strength lies in her positive attitude. "She's an extremely hard worker," he stated. "She works on every aspect of every event she competes in."

Athletics and academics aren't all Molly has found at Dickinson. She is "extremely happy" to have pledged Pi Phi and her enthusiasm resulted in her election as pledge class historian. She is even more excited about Pi Phi now that swimming is over.

"When I was in Georgia," she said, "I had to miss out on a lot of pledge class activities. But now I can devote myself fully to Pi Phi so that I can give the most I can and get the most out of Pi Phi. Pi Phi sure has a lot to offer!"

Molly Dean has a lot to offer Pennsylvania Gamma and the chapter is proud to have her as one of their number.

TV career is in future for campus broadcaster

While many graduating seniors remained undecided about plans for their futures, one Kansas Alpha had made her decision long ago.

The broadcast news major began her public experience at about age 13 when she developed a talent for "mannequin modeling," or freezing in a set position, in bridal shows and commercials in her home town, Wichita, Kan.

"I could act like a dummy—that's what I was best at," she laughs. "But," she added, "I knew I didn't want to make a career out of that. I knew I wanted to go into TV."

The younger Oatman has already excelled in broadcast in her own right. During the summer of 1983 she worked as an "entertainment tipster" for PM Magazine on Wichita's Channel 10, where she produced, wrote, directed, and starred in a short segment each week, and assisted the director.

Then last fall at KU she was chosen to anchor a campus news broadcast called "15 Minutes." Originally an advertising sales major, she found herself in competition with about 40 broadcast news majors auditioning for the show.

"When I auditioned I had not been a broadcast news major," she said. "I just auditioned for the heck of it."

Oatman's latest accomplishment was securing a spot as one of two narrators for a new production called "KU Magazine," an informative film produced by KU's University Relations.

"It's a pilot for future shows," she said. "They're trying to release it to stations in Kansas."

To further her knowledge, she has taken courses in production because she feels that by understanding everyone's job on the crew she performs her own duties more competently.

Oatman hopes to find her first job in Wichita, and her Kansas Alpha sisters, who also know and respect her as former vice president of social advancement, are certain she'll have no problem shooting for a star position.
