Arrow flies higher for Astronaut initiate

The first "mother in space" is a distinction earned by Anna Lee Fisher, alumna initiate of Pi Phi's 1989 Convention. A UCLA cum laude graduate, Dr. Fisher received a B.S. and M.S. in chemistry, as well as a medical degree. Her specialty is emergency medicine.

In 1978, Anna was selected by NASA for astronaut training. She was a flight engineer aboard the Discovery shuttle that, in 1984, retrieved two satellites in a "space salvage" mission. On that assignment she logged 192 hours in 127 orbits around the earth.

Anna's husband, Dr. William F. Fisher, is also an astronaut. They live in Houston, Tex., with their two daughters, Kristen, five years old, and Kara, five months old.

As an astronaut, Anna gives special programs as a volunteer in schools ranging from elementary level to colleges and universities. She also participates in Girl Scouts. In October, 1988, she was named one of the 100 outstanding women of the world by *Ladies Home Journal*.

Anna has several ties to Pi Phi. Her mother-in-law, Eleanor Yothers Fisher, is a Florida Beta Pi Phi, as is her sister-in-law, Julie Fisher Brewer, and her husband's aunt, Jean Yothers. Bill Fisher took his sister Julie's Pi Phi pin into space when Discovery thundered into space in August, 1985. (See AR-ROW, Spring 1986) Anna was initiated with that pin.

Convention Keynote

'Pi Phi Power means women in action'

As we endeavor to focus on charting the course toward and for a new decade, perhaps Carl Schultz's quote says it best:

"Ideals are like the stars... We will probably never reach them, but like the mariner of the sea, we chart our course by them."

The Founders of I.C. were idealists in a time when a very limited number of institutions were even offering higher education to women. Libbie Brook Gaddis, in speaking of those beginning ideals, wrote:

"Believing that young women of other colleges would favor the idea [of a secret society], we were encouraged to present it to them. The idea was more popular that we had hoped for, and we builded better than we knew."

Our Founders probably thought they were reaching for the stars when they envisioned a national fraternity for women, but with 122 chapters, two colonies, over 350 alumnae organizations, and 160,000 initiated members, we'll all agree that their ideal surely has been realized.

The often quoted Mr. Webster describes ideal as "one considered to be the best of its kind." From those founding years through this past biennium, Pi Phi leaders have navigated our Pi Phi vessel very skillfully, keeping foremost in the mind that Pi Beta Phi is the best of its kind. The events and accomplishments of our 122 years are fact and a great source of pride for all Pi Phis.

As Greek popularity rides the crest of the wave, Pi Beta Phi continues to take the lead by challenging the muddy waters, remaining steady as we go, and providing the best crew, best training, and best materials possible.

Looking back at the wake of the past biennium, we see that a record number have been pledged and initiated. Pi Beta Phi pledged this year nearly 5,000 young women. Of that number, 14.8% were legacies. Of the 1,900 legacies participating in rush, 34% pledged Pi Beta Phi. Pi Beta Phi academic standards continue to be very positive as the 1988 calendar year statistics indicate for all chapters a GPA of 2.892.

Greek popularity is very evident to the Pi Phi extension department as in the past two years 160 extension inquiries were received.

The toe of the star gazer may get stubbed if he is not aware of what is around him. Fraternity leadership has prepared for the future by listening and observing and by being willing to take risks through change.

A ship in harbor is safe, but that is not what ships are for. The past biennium has witnessed many changes. Major changes include:

- Province redistricting to bring better balance to both the collegiate and alumnae provinces.
- Chapter accounting transferred from a national to a local accounting system.
- Two new directorships established.
- New, improved insurance coverage.
- Two new positions at Central Office: Communications Coordinator and Assistant to Executive Director.
- Historic preservation fund established.
- Because the Pi Phi ARROW printer, Banta, phased out magazine printing, Pi Phi found a new printer.
- Extension programming revamped.
- A new Golden Arrow insignia offered.

A record number have contributed to the Pi Beta Phi annual drive, The Friendship Fund. Many goals necessitate funds far beyond those obtained through dues and fees. These gifts from alumnae continue to make the difference between general maintenance of Fraternity programming and that progressive step forward!

Pi Beta Phi is the best, and she intends to continue that standard as fraternities and sororities ride the peaks of Greek popularity.

A look ahead

In the midst of Greek favor and growth, there are clouds on the horizon. Looming over our Greek society are shadows of alcohol abuse, academic deterioration, declining ethics and standards, and hazing. Colleges and universities are becoming more skittish about student behavior. More and more universities are questioning the role of Greek organizations on their campuses. Almost without notice, entire Greek systems, men's and women's groups, have been banished from Colby, Amherst, and Franklin and Marshall Universities. *Newsweek*, in a seven page article called "Fraternities Under Fire," had a subheading that read, "At the height of their popularity, Greek organizations face charges of racism, violence, and hooliganism."

We know that poor behavior is not necessarily a fraternal characteristic, but Greeks are easily identifiable and highly visible. This negative side of fraternity life often does not represent the norm, and more often than not concerns the activities of men. The damage is done however to the university, the local fraternity system, to the women, and to the Greek system as a whole.

Our course for the future calls for human dignity and respect and standards of the highest order. One of the greatest dangers we face today is the acceptance of unethical behavior as a norm. If enough people do it, it must be right and therefore ethical!

I call on alumnae to insist on, and the young women of Pi Beta Phi to stand up for, the ideals in which they believe, the ideals upon which Pi Beta Phi was founded. Reinforce high standards of others through positive peer expectations. Ethics will not complicate but will help define one's life. Pi Beta Phi can play a vital role in the crisis of values and ethics the Greek world is encountering.

As a new decade approaches, the winds will be shifting. Wisdom tells us that there is nothing as certain as change. For example, nationally, and probably most evident on urban campuses, campus life in the next decade will be influenced by increasing numbers of ethnically diverse, female, and older students. More will work, commute, and attend classes part time. By the year 2000 one of every three U.S. citizens will be Hispanic or Asian. College chapters of the future will exist on much more ethnically diverse campuses. Student organizations must reflect the racial and ethnic diversity of contemporary American colleges. The faculty and administrators are more than ever addressing these needs. They are looking to Greeks for support.

Generally, students will tend to be conservative. They will continue to pursue job-related majors and be extremely concerned about getting a good job after graduation.

The day of the campus as a computer-intensive environment is just dawning, and technology will have a major impact on student life in the next decade. Colleges and universities have merely scratched the surface in terms of computer-assisted and interactive video instruction.

Other obstacles to our system include declining college enrollment, depletion of the volunteer ranks as more and more women return to careers, increasing cost of education, and more demands on our time.

Charting the course

The time is here; the time is now. The hardest part of being a success is that you have to keep on being successful! How do we plan for this new decade? How can we chart our course by our ideals?

First we must analyze ourselves, our organization. The Fraternity, locally and nationally, does not live in a vacuum, but is subject to a myriad of forces. We must self-appraise in relation to our surroundings, which are constantly changing. Knowing our shortcomings is more important than listing our accomplishments. Reciting the story of our firsts and our gains is helpful only if it points the way to an even better Pi Beta Phi tomorrow.

Second, we cannot be fearful of change. John F. Kennedy said, "Change is the law of life. And those who look only to the past or the present are certain to miss the future." To continue full speed ahead, we must be risk takers. Our Founders were dreamers; they were risk takers at a time when few women were even entering college.

Tomorrow's challenges will be our achievements, and a successful voyage is the product of skillful navigation. To chart the course is the critical task of the leader.

Sheila Blair, Executive Director of Leadership Birmingham, in the recent *Junior League Review*, had this to say about leadership, "... while some people do indeed seem to be 'born' leaders, many, many more become leaders by behaving like leaders." In trying to identify what sets leaders apart, Ms. Blair concludes,

- "Leaders see the big picture. They place the here-andnow in the context of something larger.
- Leaders communicate. They interpret what they see and think. They listen well.
- Leaders take reasonable risks, knowing that there will be times when they will fail.
- Leaders teach. They take it as their responsibility to organize thoughts and impart information so that others can more easily understand challenges and opportunities.
- Leaders follow. They understand the role of followers and practice followership themselves.
- Leaders manage. They know how to motivate others and get the job done."

A leader has the ability to use her skills and vision to make decisions, provide inspiration and influence positive action. A true leader works with others to find a solution to a problem rather than finding a problem for every solution.

Bennis and Nanus, in their book *Leaders*, define leadership as what gives an organization vision and the ability to translate that vision to reality.

The catalyst for all of this is the best part and Greeks have a monopoly on it. We have people power! We have Pi Phi power! We have our ideals, our ritual, our living membership of over 136,000 members.

Greek membership means an extended family—a sense of belonging. Fraternity is living and working and enjoying life with one's friends for a lifetime. It teaches service to the community and philanthropy. Greek life means self-discipline and commitment to the best. Membership means sharing a support system not only during college, but for a lifetime. It provides opportunities for leadership and guidance for moral and ethical growth. Membership in Pi Beta Phi is a life long experience from which we will reap personal benefits in direct proportion to the amount of effort we put into it.

Take action now

Thoreau once observed that Harvard charged him far too much tuition for all he was taught, but charged him nothing for the best thing he received in college—the association with his peers that he would remember all of his life.

Our ritual is the glue of continuity which binds us together through successive generations. Perhaps by living closer to our ritual and our creed, the chore of steering the ship would be less burdensome. We would be less likely to run aground.

While achievements of individual members, chapters and clubs are significant, collectively the Pi Phi power impact can be profound. We have power to join together for a purpose. Pi Beta Phi can be a vital force for change. She can join in potent partnership to tackle tough issues facing the Greek community today.

Let's move out of the comfort zone, where it is easy just to exist. Let's make things happen.

Let Pi Phi speak out through example and lead Greek organizations back to high academic standards.

Let's rid our chapters of any hint of hazing and admonish those groups and individuals for continuing such practices. Even in its mildest forms, hazing is an enemy of fraternal ideals.

Let's address more aggressively the largest single problem on campuses today—alcohol abuse. Let's insist that our fraternal brothers and sisters obey the law.

Let Pi Phi take a stand against demeaning, degrading activities often requested of sororities by men's fraternities.

Raise your voices and refuse to condone raids where property is destroyed or when pinning ceremonies embarrass or demean.

Say "No" to campus activities that showcase bad behavior and reflect poorly upon the entire Greek system. Negative actions of a few must be dealt with by the majority.

Let Pi Phi take the lead by enforcing her own values and standards. We *do* have a right to insist that our members adhere to Pi Phi standards or forfeit membership.

Let's show our true colors and address the issue of cultural diversity. We should make available to all qualified, congenial women, regardless of different background or culture, the benefits of fraternal membership.

Let's remember our Ritual, for it continues to provide inspiration and a design for living. It espouses the ideals star gazers look for.

Pi Beta Phi is a personal thing that provides a lifetime of memories and experiences. It shares a secret place in the heart. It is a positive force in lives of those who live it unselfishly. Vital, active, supportive alumnae and enthusiastic, inspired actives are the future of the Fraternity.

Pi Phi Power means Women in Action. Our alumnae and collegians are architects for the future. There are over 160,000 of us now, and even though some observe and support Pi Phi from above, we can continue to make a difference. Let us cling to our ideals, grasp the challenges on the horizon, and lead to a stronger Pi Beta Phi than ever before. Pi Beta Phi can navigate the course to a secure future for Pi Beta Phi and Greek membership everywhere.

Fraternity honors Marilyn S. Ford

At its 57th Convention, held in San Diego, Calif., in June, Pi Beta Phi paid tribute to Marilyn Simpson Ford. Marilyn's 21 years of service to the Fraternity as Editor of *The Arrow* have been exceeded only by the late Adele Taylor Alford whose tenure was at a time when the editor was a member of Grand Council. To present-day Pi Phis, Marilyn Ford is synonymous with *The Arrow*, and all wish her well in her retirement.

Marilyn began her Pi Phi life as a Nebraska Beta, serving as vice president of her pledge class and of her chapter. After receiving an Associate Degree in Applied Arts from the University of Nebraska, she became the Director of Publicity and Promotion for KSCJ-Radio in Sioux City, Iowa, writing and broadcasting a daily and

weekly radio show. She also edited the radio page for the Sioux City *Journal*. Marilyn holds a Bachelor of Science in Speech from Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill. and as a student there, was the only undergraduate (of four students) chosen to produce and direct a weekly program for a Chicago radio station.

Following graduation from Northwestern, Marilyn moved to Atlanta, Ga., where her first employment was as music librarian for WAGA-Radio. Within one year she was moved to the continuity department to write commercial advertising, and soon became that department's director. She served as Southwestern Area Red Cross Radio Chief, producing scripts for Red Cross chapters throughout that area. Later, Marilyn held the position of editor of an Atlanta weekly newspaper.

Marilyn Ford's expertise in journalism was duly noted when she served on the Daily Dart at Pi Beta Phi's Centennial Convention in 1967. "When Dorothy Morgan (then Grand President) asked me to take over the position of Arrow editor, I thought I would do it for two or three years and then pass it on. But being involved in national Fraternity work instilled a feeling of belonging that was difficult to give up. And so the years have passed with eighty issues of The Arrow added to the files. I wouldn't have missed it for anything!" So spoke Marilyn in recalling her appointment. She had never worked on a magazine prior to that 1968 date, vet under her tenure the Arrow has grown in size, coverage and direction. It is one of the finest examples of Greek society publications.

Marilyn met her husband, Bill, through a Georgia Alpha Pi Phi who was dating him at the time. They have been married for over 40 years and are the parents of three sons and one daughter. Each of their children is married, and there are three granddaughby Barbara Sands Olsen, National Fraternity Historian

ters, with another grandchild expected soon. They live in the Atlanta area, where Marilyn has remained active in all alumnae activities.

As president of the local alumnae club, she led the group to its highestever paid membership, making personal calls and arranging for area coffees to attract new potential members. At a new member luncheon, Marilyn's busy mind wandered, so rather than the Pi Phi Grace, she led the group in her children's prayer, "God is Great, God is Good " During another speech, she forgot the name of a prominent Pi Beta Phi officer, and was corrected from the audience. The "slips" she handled with the same aplomb as when, as our brand-new editor, she no longer received her own Arrow, a situation quickly corrected by rank of office.

Marilyn chaired the Georgia Alpha House Corporation Board when money was raised and the new chapter house built. She and her special Pi Phi friends who also worked on that committee continue to attend new chapter installations whenever possible. The Atlanta Alumnae Club awarded her the Brady-Cowart Alumnae Club Spirit and Service Award in 1987. The club has honored Marilyn on a national scope with the Marilyn Simpson Ford *Arrow* Correspondent's Award, available to chapter correspondents.

The *Arrow* editor's skills and expertise are of the highest caliber; she has brought well-deserved honor to Pi Beta Phi through her services to the entire Fraternity world, having held all offices, including the chairmanship of the National Panhellenic Editors Conference. A member of the Board of College Fraternity Editors Association, she has written its *Editor's Edition* for the past three years and, at CFEA's conference in July, she was voted "Honorary Life Member" of the group. The story, "The Infertile Egg," appearing in the Fall 1988 issue of *The AR*-

ROW, won second place in the "News Article Content" category at that same meeting. Her biography appeared in *Who's Who in American Women* several times in the 1970s. Marilyn wrote the National Panhellenic Conference skit for presentation at the 200th anniversary celebration of the Greek system, held in Williamsburg, Va. in 1976. She also wrote a show, complete with music, for the editors and Central Office executives to present to National Panhellenic delegates during a later meeting.

Marilyn is proud of her Pi Phi heritage; her mother and her mother's two sisters, a cousin and a niece are Nebraska Betas. Another aunt and a cousin are also Pi Phis. She has a collection of over 200 angels which she has gathered in travels around the world, including one from Vatican City. Also collected on travels throughout the United States and Europe are over 150 pieces of arrow jewelry.

As is true of all Pi Beta Phi national officers, Marilyn Ford feels a deep gratitude to her family members for their understanding of her commitment to the Fraternity. She said, "Involvement in Fraternity work, whether on the local, province or national level, is time consuming, yes, but most rewarding. It cannot be done, however, without the help and cooperation of one's family. My four children have grown, married and become parents themselves during my years as Arrow editor. During all this time, my husband, Bill, has supported me all the way. He has cooked meals, planned trips and vacations around deadlines and proofs times, cancelled plans when a frantic *Arrow* crisis has appeared and made last-minute trips to the post office so I wouldn't miss a deadline. He's a true Mr. Pi Phi and I love him and thank him for it!"

At the closing session of Convention, Barbara Sands Olsen paid tribute to Marilyn Ford. Speaking on behalf of all Fraternity members, she said, "It is with deep-felt honor that we recognize Marilyn today. As she hangs up her typewriter and galley proofs, as she writes 30 to her "Off the Arrow Hook," and to her career as editor of the Arrow, we wish her the very best for all that is yet to be. With respect for her accomplishments and with love for her as our Pi Phi sister, we honor her!"

Pi Beta Phi presented Marilyn Simpson Ford with a specially engraved plaque, a gold pin in the shape of a feathered quill pen, and with the coveted Dorothy Weaver Morgan Award in recognition of her devoted service.

Twenty-Something And making a difference

Twenty years ago man first walked on the moon, and in doing so said, "One small step for man, one giant step for mankind." Thus, the course of history for America's space program was changed. It was with that same pioneering spirit, 20 years ago, that Pi Beta Phi launched the formalized graduate consultant program. In the past two decades, recent graduates, with a keen sense of adventure and determination, have stepped into a role which has allowed them to make a difference in the lives of thousands. A consultant, too, is not just taking a step for herself, but is taking a step towards building and strengthening the Fraternity, influencing its course of history.

In 20 years the graduate consultant program has evolved from a onewoman mission into a highly structured and specialized program. Today the program will send out, to explore new frontiers, ten highly motivated leaders representing a variety of academic and geographical backgrounds. Some will be a part of the foundation for establishing a new Pi Phi chapter; others will travel the United States and Canada meeting as many as 1500 women in one semester. Regardless of the position, these women will leave footprints on the hearts of many chapters and individuals.

One consultant notes, "Imagine, if you will, receiving a thank you note in the mail with 125 signatures. In no other job can one touch the lives of so many."

Pi Beta Phi's consultant program concentrates on lending support and guidance to brand new chapters as well as established ones. A Resident Graduate Consultant (RGC) is assigned to a new colony or chapter where her responsibilities include pledge education, instruction in Fraternity heritage and Pi Beta Phi procedures, and the instilling of Pi Phi values and standards. An RGC makes a difference in assuring growth and development of a new chapter. During her term, she is able to watch a seed that she helped plant grow in the life of a new chapter. With her nurturing, this infant group of congenial young women blossoms into a healthy and vital Pi Beta Phi chapter.

A Traveling Graduate Consultant (TGC) travels full time, visiting chapters from coast to coast. She may visit a chapter to provide rush assistance, conduct officer training, share ideas or help with problem solving in a specific area of chapter programming. In the course of one year, a TGC's schedule may take her to over 30 Pi Phi chapters. The impact that she makes can be seen on 124 Pi Phi college campuses. A TGC works as one liaison between the national Fraternity and its collegiate chapters. By sharing resources and ideas, she is able to link chapters of various sizes and backgrounds.

One past TGC, reflecting on her year, said, "One thing is evident. I will have to look long and hard before I find a job with as much excitement, challenge and rewards as found within the consultant program of Pi Beta Phi."

At twenty-something, these young women are given the opportunity to make a difference. They are stepping into one of the most exciting and coveted positions in the Fraternity. Chapters realize the benefits gained from a consultant's expertise, as she brings them the best ideas and most successful plans for all areas of programming. Chapters are able to relate to a consultant as a peer advisor when dealing with such contemporary issues as hazing, alcohol abuse or eating disorders. A new chapter or colony is dependent on the consultant to guide it in establishing structure and chapter procedures, as well as developing their local traditions. By sharing the intrinsic sense of Fraternity value and ideals, an RGC is able to see the true sense of sisterhood develop.

Barbara Tootle, assistant to the President at The Ohio State University and former OSU Greek Affairs Advisor for 11 years, has assisted with Pi Phi consultant training for a number of years. She comments that young women today recognize the consultant program is not "time out" from career plans, but is "time ahead." The consultant is given the opportunity to have immediate

decision-making authority, interaction with upper-level management personnel and independence rarely seen in an entry-level position generally available upon graduation. Previous consultants agree that they have enhanced their qualifications and polished skills that they used later.

"In working as a merchandise director of Horchow, I find myself constantly drawing upon my experience as a consultant," said one former consultant. "I am using skills that were first discovered and then developed by the graduate consultant program."

Another summed it up well by saying, "I knew that other jobs would always be an option for me, but only once would I have the opportunity to work as a consultant. It is truly a oncein-a-lifetime experience—and what a difference it has made!"

It makes a difference to Pi Beta Phi women, to our Pi Beta Phi chapters, to our Fraternity and to a strengthened fraternal system.



Arrowmont campaign unveils exciting plans

Exciting plans for the future of Arrowmont were announced to San Diego Convention delegates in June when a capital campaign, Blueprint for the Future, was unveiled. A large triangular package some eight feet high and four feet wide, completely covered in brown paper, was literally unwrapped to display architectural drawings and future programming details.

Following an audiovisual presentation which depicted a week in the life of an Arrowmont student, Convention attendees were the first to learn about the \$2.2 million campaign for Arrowmont, a Blueprint for the Future. Components of the campaign are a much needed 50-bed dormitory, a painting studio, and endowments for children's programs and an artist-in-residence program. Grand Council and the Settlement School Board of Governors have spent over two years exploring the feasibility of these projects. Results of studies indicate the projects are not only feasible but necessary to maintain Arrowmont's standing as one of the top five non-degree granting, fully accredited art/craft schools in the country.

Jean Wirths Scott, former Grand President, is chairman of the capital campaign. A steering committee is being formed and is anxious to hear from all Pi Phis with an interest and ability to assist in the campaign. The Pi Beta Phi Settlement School was conceived and developed through the efforts and generosity of Fraternity alumnae. Over the years all Pi Phis have shared a great pride in the value and effectiveness of work done through Settlement School. Today a similar pride can be expressed for Pi Phi's major philanthropy, Arrowmont School of Arts & Crafts. The campaign steering committee hopes this pride will translate into strong support from clubs and chapters throughout the fraternity. Interest and suggestions should be directed to the campaign chairman.

New legislation

Convention delegates adopted legislation providing for a change in the governance of Settlement School. Beginning September 1st, the seven members of Grand Council joined ten other Pi Beta Phi alumnae as voting members of the Settlement School Board of Governors. The Director of Arrowmont School becomes an ex-officio, non-voting member of the Board. The new Board make-up better reflects that deemed appropriate for the governance of Settlement School/Arrowmont as a tax-deductible, non-profit entity.

At the time the expanded Board of Governors is installed, Arrowcraft will be separated from Settlement School and established as Arrowcraft, Inc., a taxable, non-profit corporation in the State of Tennessee. This new corporation will free management to employ a variety of sales and marketing techniques previously disallowed when the Shop fell under the educational, charitable designation given to Settlement School.

Arrowcraft, Inc. will be governed by a five-member Board of Trustees consisting of the Grand Vice President of Philanthropies, the Grand Treasurer and three other Pi Phi alumnae. Grand Council envisions an eventual expansion of Arrowcraft merchandise to include Pi Phi sportswear and other items with special appeal to collegians. Profits from the sale of these items will benefit the Fraternity, while profits from traditional Arrowcraft items will continue to be designated for Settlement School/Arrowcraft.

Though some significant changes were adopted at Convention and exciting plans presented, much remains the same. Success of the Arrowcraft Shop continues to depend upon sales generated by Pi Phis. (Be sure to shop the catalog accompanying this issue of The ARROW) And Settlement School/Arrowmont continues to rely upon the support of all Pi Phis, be it through clubs, chapters or individual members, that it may fulfill its mission of enriching lives through art.

Former BOG Chair returns with hubby

After a long time away from Arrowmont, former Board of Governors chairman, Helen Deppe Vollmar, was back in April for a week of Elderhostel with her husband, Joe. Helen studied ceramics while Joe was out nearly every day in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park shooting color slides with his classmates. Their cheerfulness and wit was enjoyed by everyone, and before leaving Helen took a few moments to reflect on what Pi Beta Phi and Arrowmont have accomplished. She also talked about how unusual it seems to outsiders that Pi Phi supports a visual arts complex.

"I think that's because there's a lack of understanding among people who aren't Greek. They think, because the Greek system is a 'joiner' organization and one must conform, that [this relationship] becomes a paradoxical kind of thing."

Helen admitted that on the surface artists and Greeks do seem like strange bedfellows. "But Pi Phi did this and we certainly were with the crafts many years before craft became the big thing. When the machine took over, crafts were looked down upon because people wanted things that could be manufactured; these handspun looking things who wanted those? But Pi Phi, through their work with these mountain people and their weaving, did have an appreciation for that.

"At the 1964 Convention in Victoria, we voted on what kind of project to have for the second century of Pi Phi, and there were a lot of ideas presented. Because we have been associated with the crafts for so many years, with Marian Heard starting the workshops here in 1945, it really behooved us to continue in that field."

Marian was at Arrowmont during Helen's stay and walked through the main building with her. "It was such a thrill to be with Marian and go through the building," said Helen, "because in 1971 when I came on the Board, it had just been finished. Then it was like a new home, or a house that is empty, because there was so little in it. To come through after all these years, and see it so alive with all the marvelous books in the library and beautiful pieces in the gallery that these artists have given us..."

The well-equipped studios made Helen feel that Arrowmont's facilities have been well used over the years. "Seeing all the activity going on here was just wonderful. As Marian was leaving, we stood looking back at the building. Seeing it in the afternoon sun, it was so beautiful with all the shrubs and dogwood trees. I couldn't help but feel that Marian was really looking at it as her dream that came true. How wonderful it is that Pi Phi is sponsoring this place where people with dreams can put those dreams into reality."

Arrowmont memories called Esther back

It has been 43 years since Esther Lowry spent six weeks taking classes at Arrowmont. She first heard of the program from her high school art teacher and came to Gatlinburg in 1946, Arrowmont's second summer of operation.

"I think there were three hotels here at the time, and the bus station."

It was a quieter time one sometimes hears about from long-time Settlement School employees, but now Gatlinburg has no bus station, and far too many hotels to count.

When asked why she came back for an Elderhostel class after all these years, Esther remarked, "Well, I think the six weeks I spent here were probably the nicest six weeks of my life."

In the interval between Esther's two visits to Arrowmont, she married, had two girls, and went into the restaurant business, then a franchise for Holiday Inn. Her life became pretty busy with the franchise, and that was when she learned how to fly.

"I was on the board of directors with International Association of Holiday Inn, so I had to travel back and forth from our business in Thomasville, Ga., to Memphis, and around to the different Holiday Inns." About 25 years ago, she earned her pilot's license and soon she was racing airplanes.

"I flew my first race when I had my license less than a year," she says.

The famous Powder Puff Derby was the largest women's air race and it ceased to be about 13 years ago. Consequently, a group of women fliers formed a race called the Air Race Classic, of which Esther is president. Her term in office last three years.

Considering her involvement in air racing, one might think that a week at Arrowmont would hold little interest for Esther, but she didn't hesitate when she said, "I've always wanted to come back."

Student finds respite in watercolor class

Despite the fact that Arrowmont's workshop program is well known and respected in the craft world, it is not always easy for the isolated beginning artist to find out about it. Joe Palmer, who lives not too far from Gatlinburg, discovered what Arrowmont has to offer only by good luck. In May his wife took a group of elementary students on a field trip to Gatlinburg. Although merely chaperoning and not interested in art classes herself, she was greatly impressed. She knew that her husband had been searching in vain for a local watercolor class, so she took a brochure home and told him that she thought she had found just the thing he was looking for.

"I read it and sure enough, Arrowmont seemed to be exactly what I needed," said Joe.

"I am a pharmacist and I've always wanted to paint, but my profession required me to spend so much time in didactic work that I never got into painting. I'd find myself doodling a lot on the side of the page . . . I knew that was my art trying to come out."

After receiving a little watercolor kit as a Christmas gift, Joe discovered that he loved watercolor.

"I went to the library and checked out all kinds of watercolor books, and I'd go through them and I'd try this and that. But books weren't enough. I needed something more. When this brochure came and I saw that the instruction I could get is a one-of-a-kind experience, I thought that was just fantastic!"

Could Joe have learned as much by studying watercolor books for a solid week? "No, no, no. Definitely not! I needed somebody to say, this is the way you do it ... lay the brush down this way ... put it in the paint this way ... use lots of water like the instructor, Ed Shay, does. I leaned toward drybrushing because I didn't realize how important it was to let the action occur on the paper. So I'm impressed. I've learned a lot. I really feel good about this experience.

"One of the things that has impressed me about Ed's method is that he was so free and so loose. However, what he

was doing was gently urging us into experimentation on our own. You make a mistake—so what! It's only paper! He taught us to push ourselves and the colors to the limit of what we thought because everybody had been afraid to put the color on the paper."

Eventually Joe experienced a feeling of relief and relaxation. "It's expressive, it feels good! This freedom that Ed has led us into has been very subtle, but I feel myself changing."

Being able to get away from it all and wake up his sensibilities has been part of what Arrowmont has given Joe.

"In my business I go to work at 9 o'clock in the morning, answering phones, taking care of people's needs, and they're clutching me all the time ... ten hours a day. You numb yourself to a lot of sensitivities." Joe decided that a class at Arrowmont was something he would do for himself.

"So that's how Arrowmont has given me, this week, far more that I had imagined. I've really been impressed ... honestly."

High Risk Moms

"Angel" is a word that could describe Laura Krumwiede, daughter of Candyce Clifton Krumwiede, Indiana Delta. An angel who came into the world 13 weeks prematurely, weighing 28 ounces, is today a normal four year old with no severe complications related to her birth.

Candyce was a high-risk in pregnancy. After three unsuccessful pregnancies, (a miscarriage, stillbirth and the death of a baby), she was faced with the realization that the only way to achieve a living baby was to have one prematurely.

High-risk pregnancies can be difficult to handle, emotionally as well as physically. Even knowing the risks of the high-risk pregnancy, the pregnancy can be an experience very different from the one faced by women whose pregnancies are uncomplicated. Candyce found this out early in her last pregnancy, and she turned to a support group called "High Risk Moms, Inc."

A woman experiencing a high risk pregnancy can find that it is very difficult. She may be faced with months of bed rest (not because she is tired but for the health of the unborn baby), expensive medical tests such as ultrasounds and biophysical tests of the baby in utero, expensive drugs to sustain the pregnancy, and even long term hospitalization. The mother may also have to cope with other children at home which can add additional stress to the situation. A high-risk pregnancy is a stressful time, and many times people don't realize that fact. Even family members can have a tough time coping with the pregnancy.

A support group

This is why a group such as High Risk Moms is important. A high-risk mother may feel abnormal and long for that normal pregnancy. The media seems to focus on pregnancies as a chic thing to do—birthing rooms, the Jane Fonda exercise tapes, and the dream of delivering on Friday, home by Sunday and back to work on Monday. In a high-risk pregnancy this isn't the case. These moms are the special ones! The ones who wonder, day by day, even hour by hour, if the baby will kick or if the preterm labor will stop. A highrisk pregnancy can be a time full of apprehension and fear of what is happening to the baby.

High Risk Moms Inc. was founded in 1983. It is a self help emotional support group that offers assistance to mothers (fathers) who have had, are anticipating, or are experiencing a high-risk pregnancy. The group is based in the Chicago area. They meet monthly as a support meeting, and offer a telephone network system for bed restricted or hospitalized moms. They sponsor seminars twice a year that feature

professional speakers. The group has launched a new program for area hospitals. They prepare holiday "cheer" baskets for mothers who may be in the hospital over those special days.

Candyce came to this small knit group as a high-risk mom. After she and her daughter were healthy and they had recovered from all the pregnancy complications and Laura's long hospital stay, Candyce began to get involved in High Risk Moms. Her involvement led the group into incorporating and receiving funding from such places as the March of Dimes Birth Defect Foundation, Astra Pharmaceutical Company, and Junior Women of Hinsdale, Ill. The network system is governed by a seven women board of directors.

High Risk Moms works closely with the medical profession. Even though the group is made up of lay persons, they still can be looked upon as experts because they have lived through the "high-risk" situation. Some have gone through it more than once.

As baby boomers have begun to have their babies, technology also has improved methods of achieving pregnancy for women who were told never to try. Women with health problems such as diabetes, lupus syndrome, DES daughters, incompetent cervix, and placenta previa have been able to carry babies to term. Even though, physically, a doctor can treat the pregnancy, many times the emotional aspect of the pregnancy can not be met by medical personel. That is when a support unit such as High Risk Moms can be of important value.

Emotional support also needed

High-risk pregnancy can be a result of the mother's physical problems, but it also can be a result of her emotional state of mind. Many times a mother who has experienced repeated miscarriages, a stillbirth, or the death of a baby needs emotional support during a subsequent pregnancy. Once a person has experienced the worst, such as the death of a baby, assuming that a pregnancy always results in a live birth can be a factor in coping with the pregnancy. Many times these mothers need encouragement, hope, and reassurancies as much as the mother who physically has a problem in pregnancy.

Candyce and her counterpart, Pat Smith, the founding "mother," have been working with the medical community to help professionals understand the "mother's perspective" of a high-risk pregnancy. The two do public speaking for nursing seminars, and attend conferences of nurses and social workers to offer assistance in understanding the "high-risk" patient.

Candyce recently served as chairman for the March of Dimes Walk America of DuPage County in Illinois. She and her daughter made public appearances for the March of Dimes to address the topic of high-risk pregnancies, prematurity and infant mortality. This foundation is also very concerned about the high-risk mother and her pregnancy. They are turning some of their focus on research in this area too.

Women's issues have become a focal point in the 1980s, and they will continue to be in the 1990s. The buzz word in the medical field is "high-risk"—the high-risk mother and the high-risk infant. As you continue to educate yourself about the world around you, remember that a high-risk pregnancy doesn't touch on just one sector of life, it can happen in every sector of life, even Pi Phi.

She originated the chapter history program of the Fraternity.

Frances lives in Muscogee, Okla., and has earned many honors over the years. The latest occurred on April 1, 1989, when, on her 90th birthday, the mayor of Muscogee declared the day the Frances Rosser Brown Day.

Loved by all who know her, Frances is well known both inside and outside of Oklahoma. She had a dream fulfilled when, in 1966, the "Five Civilized Tribes Museum" opened in Muscogee, established to help motivate gifted Indians of the Choctaw, Chickasaw, Cherokee, Creek and Seminole Tribes. She helped establish two hospitals in her home town and she has received recognition from her church, the Elks, Kiwanis and Soroptimist Clubs, Delta Kappa Gamma, and is an honorary member of the Da-Co-Tah Indian Club.

In 1971 she was awarded the Distinguished Service Citation by the University of Oklahoma, the University's equivalent of an honorary degree. On Statehood Day, November 17, 1973, she was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame.

In September, 1984, Frances was awarded the Alumnae Achievement Award by Randolph-Macon, "conferred upon alumnae who personify the value of a liberal arts education and who have brought honor to themselves and to Randolph-Macon Women's College through their outstanding accomplishments."

Frances has worked tirelessly to preserve Oklahoma's history and heritage. She will always be "Mrs. Muskogee."

She is not the only distinguished member of her family, however. Her sister, Louise Rosser Kemp, also Oklahoma Alpha, of El Paso, Tex., was Grand Treasurer of Pi Beta Phi from 1967–1970. She also was honored recently when the middle school library at St. Clements Episcopal Parish School was named for her. Louise was on the founding board of the school and served on that board for many years.

Glennis finds fame from football to Grand Marshall

Glennis McCrary Goodrich, Texas Zeta, received an unusual tribute in a recent Baylor celebration. She was chosen to serve as Grand Marshall in the November, 1988, Baylor University Homecoming parade in Waco, Tex. This honor is usually bestowed on a man, so Glennis felt quite honored to have been selected.

A Magna Cum Laude graduate of Baylor University, Glennis was a protegee of Dr. A. J. Armstrong, head of the English department for many years. She traveled in Europe on one of Armstrong's tours one summer, and celebrated her 20th birthday during a surprise party in Geneva, Switzerland. She earned membership in Sigma Tau Delta, honorary English fraternity. As a member of Alpha Omega, now Pi Beta Phi at Baylor, Glennis was a yearbook beauty queen in her senior year.

Elected by popular campus vote, the beauty was captain of the first co-ed football team in the world! Pathé News took pictures of the 11 girls in the team's regular uniforms, except for the shoes. They had to wear their own!

A double major in English and education, Glennis was in charge of the religious section of the Baylor Annual in her senior year. Following her graduation, she went to Columbia University in New York to work on her Masters degree in English.

Returning to Texas, Glennis settled down in her home town of Winnsboro and taught high school English for three years. These were, in retrospect, the most rewarding years of her life. Some of her former students still keep in touch and several were on the sidelines for the Baylor parade that honored her.

Glennis and her late husband, Baxter Dee Goodrich, former chairman of the board, president and CEO of Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation, established a Goodrich Scholarship fund at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Tex., honoring his late mother and father. Dr. Schilling, president of Southwestern, wrote Glennis a letter of appreciation following her last gift to the University, three years after her husband's death, stating that it was the largest scholarship fund at Southwestern.

Glennis is still working, from an office in her home, five and six days a week, making investments which will later go to Baylor. She is currently working on a project to build a new music school building which will be named in her honor. She has already given \$1.5 million to the project. scheduled for completion in 1992. with ground breaking to be held in January of next year. A room in the building will be furnished with the Goodrich collections of Dorothy Doughy birds, Irish Belleek, jade, Hawkes crystal, antiques, Persian rugs and paintings.

Glennis is a world traveler and has had many exciting times during her travels. In 1972, during a visit to Morocco, Glennis and her late husband were invited by the King's brother to a beautiful luncheon in King Hassan II's summer palace. Dozens of distinguished Moroccans attended. It was there that Glennis met the Moroccan Ambassador to Iran and his wife, Kinza. Kinza and Glennis corresponded for 12 long years after that luncheon, with the former continuing to urge Glennis to visit.

"Finally, in 1984, after (Ambassador) Mehdi was sent to London as Moroccan Ambassador, Kinza wrote me that I must visit them in the beautiful Moroccan Embassy residence, a few blocks from Buckingham Palace," writes Glennis. "I went and stayed three weeks, and if I were asked for the most exciting, most thrilling period of my life, those three weeks would surely be it! When I left, my hostess and the six servants followed me to the Embassy car which would drive me to Gatwick Airport, begging me not to leave!"

During one of the state dinners at the Embassy, Sophocles Papanicolaou, former financial advisor to King Constantine of Greece, and his artist wife, Lilika, were among the guests.

"As soon as Lilika heard that I was from Houston, Tex., she asked me to carry back with me to NASA the portrait she had just completed of Dr. Sally Ride, the first American woman astronaut to fly in space. I agreed to do it, and I am happy to say the portrait hangs at NASA."

Now Glennis' portrait will also occupy a place of honor—in the building that will bear her name on the Baylor campus.

Mrs. Cooper, what do you do at Holt House?



Georgia Alpha has Golden Anniversary

When Georgia Alpha, Pi Phi's eighty-first chapter, officially joined the family in February, 1939, Grand President Amy Burnham Onken was on hand to install the new chapter and initiate its charter members.

When Georgia Alpha celebrated its fiftieth birthday in April of 1989, Grand President Carolyn Helman Lichtenberg was on hand to present Golden Arrow pins to those charter members, assisted by Sarah Ruth "Sis" Mullis, Director of Alumnae Advisory Committees.

The ceremony occurred at the opening night banquet celebrating "Fifty Years of Friendships" which took place April 7 at the Georgian Hotel in Athens. On February 4, 1939, the chapter's installation banquet had been held at the same location.

Georgia Alpha's membership in 1939 numbered eight colonizers and 13 initiates. Fifty Pi Phis from other chapters attended the initiation and installation events. From that small beginning has grown an award-winning chapter that now numbers 160 members. Approximately 350 guests attended the anniversary events.

As the banquet program continued, Georgia Alpha's first president, Alice Louise Hamlin Lowe introduced Dorothy Coleman Thorman, Illinois Epsilon, who joined the Georgia faculty in 1936 and served as faculty advisor to the new chapter. This lady of distinction, initiated in 1922, shared her recollections of Georgia Alpha's early days.

Ann Bass Godwin, another colonizer and former chapter president, regaled guests with comments about each colonizer as she was introduced. In addition to Alice and Ann, those present were Mildred Campbell Yates, Patsy Loomis Martin, Eleanor Bushnell Lehner and Anne Finch Taylor.

What is a colonizer? A simple definition might be: "A colonizer is a pioneer who leaves the security of familiar

surroundings for the purpose of carrying a torch into unknown territory."

In 1938 Alice Hamlin, Missouri Gamma, was selected by Grand Council to transfer to the University of Georgia as president of a probationary group to establish a new Pi Phi chapter on that campus. Jean Parkinson, Nebraska Beta, was selected to serve as treasurer. The previous year Anne Finch, Texas Alpha, had enrolled as a temporary student in order to gather helpful information about life on the campus. Other colonizers who enrolled in 1938 were volunteers and included one from Florida Alpha, four from Florida Beta, and one from Virginia Alpha. These colonizers founded the chapter, with much help from their alumnae advisors.

Caroline Burson Thrasher, who officiated at all of the anniversary events, was Georgia Alpha's first pledge and first president. As chairman of the 50th anniversary celebration she devoted months to the preparations of this inspiring event. 350 guests attended the Saturday Founders' Day luncheon at the Athens Country Club.

Grand President Lichtenberg traced the history of Georgia Alpha, including details about the themes and activities of every one of the chapter's initial week of rush parties... to the delight of colonizers and charter members who had participated 50 years ago.

An evening "mixer" and a formal dance followed the luncheon. The closing event, on Sunday morning, was a combination buffet brunch and tour of the chapter house.

When they arrived to visit the house in which they had lived 50 years ago, early members discovered that their traditional Southern white frame home had been transformed into a handsome red brick mansion that coordinates with many of the other recently built or remodeled campus or community structures. They were pleased by the expanded interior space and the gracious decor on the lower floor. And they were delighted by the colorful, original decorations in the profusion of upstairs bedrooms. They were almost tempted to start college all over again.

Founders come alive in personal stories

In the true spirit of Founders' Day, the Arlington Heights Alumnae Club remembers the Founders of Pi Beta Phi each year and reflects on their lives. It isn't often, however, that today's alumnae can be transported backwards in time for some personal glimpses of the college and family lives of those special women. Arlington Heights' own Juanita Wimbigler Reinhard did just that when, as a Golden Arrow honoree in 1989, she passed a picture to her sisters at Founders' Day and told a story.

Juanita wove a tapestry rich in Pi Phi history where her own family history was entwined. Although not Pi Phis themselves, Juanita's grandmother, Mary Louise Wimbigler and her great aunt, Alice Wimbigler, were close personal friends of Clara Brownlee Hutchinson, Emma Brownlee Kilgore and Inez Smith Soule. Many good times were spent on the Monmouth College campus where Alice was a math teacher for 50 years. Alice had such influence at Monmouth College that, in the 1940s, a dormitory was built and named in her honor and is still in use today.

As Juanita continued and the picture moved from table to table, stories of these proud women during college years and beyond became real. Stories unfolded about Juanita's maternal grandmother, Anna Porter Watt, and her membership in I.C. Sorosis in the 1870s. Stories continued of Juanita's mother, Lucille Watt Wimbigler, and her desire for the sisterhood during her college days at Monmouth in the early 1900s. Sororities were banned at Monmouth then. The ideals of our Founders persevered and sororities made a comeback in time for the oldest of Lucille Wimbigler's daughters, Elizabeth, to be initiated into Illinois Alpha in 1928. A second daughter, Maxine Wimbigler Menely, pledged loyalty to the wine and blue also at Monmouth and was initiated in 1936. The last sister, Juanita, became the last link in the long chain of her family's Pi Beta Phi history; a history that now includes three Golden Arrow sisters. Her own 50 years of Pi Phi memories began at Monmouth College like so many "sisters" before her. She was a very proud initiate in 1939.

For the Arlington Heights Alumnae Club, the 1989 Founders' Day was particularly memorable. We gave Golden Arrow Juanita her 50 year pin with our appreciation, our love and our thanks for her years of service to the Fraternity. In addition to her contributions to Pi Phi, what better place could Juanita concentrate her efforts but in service to the college her family has loved for so many years. After many years on Monmouth College's Alumni Board of Directors, Juanita is a worthy member of the Senate and Board of Trustees for the college.

We thank Juanita for helping us to turn back the calendar for a look at her rich Pi Phi history and her family's friendship with our Founders.

Senate confirms Jenna Dorn for Labor Department post

Jennifer Lynn Dorn, Oregon Beta, an Oregonian who served four years on the staff of U.S. Senator Mark O. Hatfield, has been confirmed by the Senate as an assistant secretary of labor for policy.

Jenna, raised in Corvallis, graduated from Oregon State University in 1973 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism. That year she was named Pi Phi's national winner of the Amy B. Onken award. While in college, she worked as a reporter for the *Corvallis Gazette-Times*.

After graduation, Jenna went to New Haven, Conn., where she took a clerical job in the Financial Aid office at Yale to help pay her husband's way through graduate school. Working menial tasks with other women who were busy putting their husbands through school lit in her a fire that still burns bright. After a brief stint in the advertising world—"more stereotypical women's stuff," she says—she returned to school herself to get a graduate degree in public administration.

As assistant secretary for policy, Dorn will assist Secretary Dole in carrying out the U.S. Department of Labor's mission of enforcing major laws protecting the wages, health and safety, employment and pension rights of working Americans.

In her role as the secretary of labor's chief advisor on policy and regulatory matters, Dorn will also counsel Secretary Dole concerning the department's responsibilities in equal employment opportunity, job training, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, free collective bargaining, and labor statistics.

Dorn received a Master of Arts degree in public administration in 1977 from the University of Connecticut and served as legislative assistant to Senator Hatfield from 1977 to 1981. She also served as a staff member of the

Senate Appropriations Committee, before joining then-Transportation Secretary Dole in the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Dorn was appointed as associate deputy secretary of transportation in 1985, also a Senate-confirmed position, and chief of staff at the department. Prior to this, she was the first director of the Office of Commercial Space Transportation, created in response to the President's Executive Order to encourage the development of the private sector space transportation industry. As a result of that effort, the U.S. for the first time has aggressively and successfully entered the commercial space market.

Prior to joining the Department of Labor, Dorn was director of strategic planning for the Martin Marietta Corporation in Bethesda, Md.

She is a member of the Oregon Women's Forum.

After her much publicized automobile accident in 1983, Mandrell took her seat belt advocacy to the Tennessee State Legislature and to the entire nation via a public service announcement on audio, video and posters which strongly urged "Buckle up—you may never have another chance."


