



More ERA

Although you are probably tired of the subject, letters in recent issues of The ARROW have prompted me to express my feelings on the Equal Rights Amendment. Despite statements concerning the aims of our twelve Founders, I applaud Pi Beta Phi's choice of neutrality on this controversial subject.

Being a college student, I have listened to many heated discussions on ERA ratification. My own negative feelings toward this are not so much reaction to the amendment itself, as to the *methods* used by feminist groups urging its adoption. I am not a student of political science, but I believe that when the writers of our Constitution set forth the state's vote as a means of ratification, they had a very specific purpose in mind, that being the determination of whether or not a significant majority of the states (i.e., three-quarters) wanted the amendment adopted. If too few positive votes were collected, obviously not enough states were in favor and the amendment does eventually pass, it will be through somewhat ethically questionable channels. If states which have voted "nay" are to be continuously pressured, those states wishing to rescind their affirmative votes should be allowed to do so.

I am sure that other sororities have also had internal conflicts over support of the ERA. Could you let us know, for curiosity sake, the decisions made by other members of the NPC?

→ We do not have any definitive information concerning the ERA position of other NPC groups. It is our understanding, however, that at least one NPC group has opposed, officially, the 27th amendment.

2. Is it historically necessary to continue to refer to the organization, one solely of women, so far, as a fraternity?

3. Assuming that names other than the woman's current one(s) are necessary for record keeping and reference, can "maiden" be changed to "birth" name. . . ?

4. I applaud the liberal use of Vice President for officers, but would it also be possible to refer to committee heads as "chairs," "chairwomen," or "chairpersons," rather than "chairmen?"

5. As a former scholarship chair, I was particularly interest in the current

labels for various collegiate chapter activities. Although I'm sure these, and many of the above issues, have been discussed many times, it might be more appropriate to replace "advancement" with "development"....

I would be extremely interested in any reactions you may have to these comments.

 \rightarrow Although this letter arrived several months ago, we haven't had the opportunity to comment until now, and we felt others might be interested in the response.

- A life subscription to The ARROW is \$15, paid at the time of initiation. National dues—\$4 annually. Local club dues—determined by individual clubs.
- Pi Beta Phi was founded as a national fraternity for women. Thus we retain that designation.
- 3. It is our personal feeling that this is an unnecessary change.
- 4. The National Association of Parliamentarians adopted a resolution in 1975 which resolves, in part, "... the word "chairman" belongs to the title of the officer the same as the title of president or secretary." The ARROW occasionally uses the term "chair" also.
- The designation of the chapter vice presidents as vice president of mental advancement, vice president of moral advancement, and vice president of social advancement, was established by vote of Convention, 1971, in San Antonio, Texas.

With reference to the word *atria* found two times on page 5 of The ARROW, Winter, 1980, the singular is *atrium* as you know.

May I suggest that you... question all material put out by Anatole, for I am quite confident that the public relations office there, as often elsewhere these days, can't spell well. In each issue of The ARROW a considerable amount of space is devoted to service and philanthropic projects in which Pi Beta Phi chapters participate. Sometimes those projects are instigated by the chapters themselves; sometimes it's a case of participating in projects of other sororities or fraternities. The man and woman hours accumulated by Greek groups helping others is astronomical. Alumnae clubs participate in philanthropic activities as well as chapters. Nearly every sorority has a national philanthropy to which it contributes and for which it works.

In Pi Phi, of course, our major national philanthropy, the one to which tax deductible contributions may be made, is Settlement School. We have others—Holt House, Arrow In the Arctic, the Emma Harper Turner Memorial Fund, scholarships for collegians and alumnae—but Arrowmont and Arrowcraft, under the umbrella designation of Settlement School, is the main one. Our major efforts should, and usually do, go to the support of our national philanthropies.

Our Pi Phis are involved also, however, in raising money for Multiple Sclerosis, Cystic Fibrosis, March of Dimes, Muscular Dystrophy, the Heart Fund, Easter Seals, Red Cross, United Way, UNICEF, Cancer—the list is almost endless. In addition, local organizations receive much needed help from Pi Phis everywhere. Nursing homes, children's homes, needy families, shelters for battered women, state hospitals, burn centers—here again the list is limited only so far as the need for help is limited. And what we do as Pi Phis, is multiplied over and over again by members of Greek groups belonging to the National Panhellenic Conference and the National Interfraternity Conference.

Still we find that the major publicity that we receive focuses on negative aspects of fraternal life. The drinking, the carousing, the so-called snobbishness—these faults are publicized almost to the exclusion of the good done by those same groups. While these faults do result in frequent black eyes, they should not be a cause for decapitating the entire system.

What to do? Publicize—make certain the local newspaper is notified when the club or chapter has contributed to a local philanthropy in the name of the Fraternity. Be proud of the fact that you are a Pi Phi—either collegian or alumna and tell your neighbor about that animal your club adopted at the zoo, or the hours your chapter spent repainting a slum house or helping in Special Olympics.

Be proud you're a Greek and let your friends, neighbors, hallmates, professors, and everyone know that being a Greek is a positive reinforcement, not only in your life, but in the lives of many millions of others who are touched by members of sororities and fraternities.

There are eleven Pi Phis from various chapters who are currently attending law school at the University of Oklahoma. They include Laurie Williams, North Carolina Beta, Duke; Julie Bates, Texas Delta, TCU; Marykay Martin, New Mexico Beta, New Mexico State; Tami Tibbits Fitzgerald, Pam Kehn, and Mary Johnson, Oklahoma Beta, Oklahoma State; Candy Williams, Kathy Taylor Frame, Becky Sellers, Martha Long, and Jan Hunter, Oklahoma Alpha, University of Oklahoma. That surely must be some kind of record!

Adding to Pi Phi's luster at Vanderbilt University is Ruth Barron, Alabama Gamma, who is a third year medical student there. Ruth has been elected to Alpha Omega Alpha Honorary Medical Society, and she deserves congratulations for continuing the outstanding achievements which began during her undergraduate days at Auburn.

Not only do Pi Phis work hard for others, they often work pretty hard for themselves. The problem of West Virginia Gammas at Bethany was how to get the chapter house really clean for spring. The solution was to get together on a Friday, set up the stereo, get out the rags, mops, brooms, and other essentials, and put some "elbow grease" to work to make the chapter house sparkle. Refreshments were set out for the thirsty and hungry, and barely two hours later the house was clean. Everyone had a great time swapping stories and getting to know each other a little better. Even some fraternity sweethearts dropped in and helped carry out the trash. The house looked better and the girls were all ready to start the weekend, knowing that a major chore was out of the way.

Out in Las Vegas, the local alumnae club had its first Arrowcraft sale since 1961 last fall. It was highly successful with over 200 guests enjoying the tea and the beautifully displayed items from Arrowcraft.

It was our pleasure to attend the installation of Florida Epsilon in January. It was our first installation in many years, and we loved meeting all those new, lovely young Pi Phis as well as the involved alumnae in the Orlando area who worked so hard in getting the chapter established. These new Pi Phis, as well as those in the several other chapters added to our roster in very recent years, will surely add stars in our collective Pi Phi crown!



Cover Story Egguers' Elegant Eggs Enchant

Julia Bowman Leedy, Indiana Gamma, of Charlevoix, Mich., and her daughter, Barbara Leedy Cassidy, Ohio Alpha, of San Diego, Calif., have been making designer eggs together since Barb's college days twenty years ago.

It all started with the making of Easter eggs, the old-fashioned picturethrough-the-hole variety. The duo started out making the eggs just for fun, but along the way dozens were sold at church bazaars in Chicago, others enhanced trays at a Chicago Medical Center, and still others have been sold in Indianapolis and Cincinnati. Some of the loveliest hold places of honor in homes of the women's friends.

Once the eggs even bailed out the Chicago Business Women's Pi Phi Alumnae Club—the year of the big blizzard. A dinner had been scheduled at an elegant restaurant with the club committed to a set number of reservations. Came the night of the meeting, many members were snowed in or out—and unable to attend. It was eggs to the rescue, with as many as needed to meet the deficit made and purchased by loyal Pi Phis, thus arresting a club financial crisis!

Last winter Julia and Barb studied with Sylvia Fox of The Treasured Egg in San Diego, one of the most outstanding egguers in the country. Now, after their professional training, they have branched into a partnership under the name of The Aloof Oeuf (French for egg), featuring a much more sophisticated line.

Eggs have expressed an art form through the centuries, with religious and folkloric significance. With the creations of Peter Carl Fabergé, made in gold and precious gems for the Royal Family of the Russian Court and Queen Mary of England, the giving of eggs in all their beauty has become a universal custom to express love and friendship.

The Aloof Oeuf had its premier showing at the Charlevoix Hobbycraft Show last summer, with eggs of every description on display. Only real eggs are used, including quail egg necklaces; duck and hen picture eggs; pullet egg thimble cases; goose egg Christmas decorations; bells with a music box one doesn't put a clapper in a goose egg. From duck and goose eggs, ginger jars and jewel boxes are popular.

All decals are hand made, and eggs are finished with eight to fifteen coats of porcelain or bisque glaze, with intermittent bakings, as needed. There is a complete line of sports eggs for the fisherman, tennis and golf buffs, and the skier. Among the most enchanting are the two doored, velvet covered, jewel edged, which, when opened, display tiny village scenes with lighted post lamps, or skaters, etc. These are mounted on music boxes.

The entire family is involved and interested in The Aloof Oeuf project. The grandchildren are the best sales-

men and adore the hobby fairs. Julia's husband makes many of the needed tools and turns beautiful wooden bases. He also built the display case, and sets it up for those big days when the eggs are shown to the public.

Although mother and daughter are separated by half the country, Barbara sells in San Diego and many varieties are shipped back and forth as needs are relayed by telephone.

Julia's most cherished keepsake egg was made for her last fall, by Barb. It is a tiny quail egg, bisected, painted silver blue with a wine carnation, hinged with a minute hinge, lined with blue silk, topped with a blue bead finial, and mounted on a tiny half-inch gold base. The entire miniature jewel box stands less than two inches high. It houses—what else—Julia's fifty year Golden Carnation.

Two Women Awarded 1981 Fellowships

Two outstanding young Pi Phis have been chosen to receive Graduate Fellowship awards from the Fraternity. The awards total \$1500 each, and the selection was made during the meeting of Grand Council in March.

The Graduate Fellowship was established in 1909, "open to any Pi Beta Phi who has received her bachelor's degree and available for use in any university in this country or in Europe." Two points are considered in awarding the Fellowship: "scholastic standing and all-around development of character with its resultant ability worthy to represent the Fraternity."

This year Carol Cinnick, Illinois Theta, and Katherine (Kittye) Little, Oklahoma Alpha, will continue their education with the help of Pi Beta Phi.

Carol Cinnick

Carol is presently pursuing her Master of Arts degree at Northwestern University in the field of speech/ language pathology. She must obtain that degree to be professionally certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

Her academic and clinical work thus far has included her major field of speech/language, and minor fields of science medicine, linguistics, acoustics, psychology, and education. She's had clinical experience in language, articulation, and aural rehabilitation while at Bradley's clinic, and studenttaught severely orthopedically handicapped children. Last summer she worked as a speech therapist, under supervision, in a residential facility for mentally retarded adults.

Carol was graduated from Bradley University magna cum laude in May, 1980, with a bachelor's degree in speech and hearing. In the area of campus activities, Carol's ranged from Variety Show singer and dancer to TV telethon operator, from Mortar board and numerous other honoraries to continued involvement in her chapter. She is a past president of Illinois Theta and her leadership was a prominent force for change in

Kittye was accepted in the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine as a junior and attended there while simultaneously completing her undergraduate degree in chemistry this past year. She was graduated this spring with highest honors, while serving as secretary-treasurer of the class of 1984 in the medical school, vice president of Women in Medicine, and the freshman representative on the Pre-Doctoral Education Committee of the College. In addition she was named outstanding senior woman by the OU Dad's Association last October; received the Outstanding Scholastic Senior Chemistry Major Award; was Big Woman on Campus; Mortar Board; Who's Who, a member of numerous honoraries, and the holder of a number of beauty titles.

Kittye was equally active in her Oklahoma Alpha chapter. She was Model Pledge, received the pledge scholarship award, the outstanding chapter member scholarship award, was chairman of many committees, Panhellenic representative, State Day chairman, and four-time member of the executive council.

During the past three summers, Kittye worked at the Norman Municipal Hospital to gain further insight and knowledge about the field of medicine. One of the doctors with whom she worked wrote, "[Kittye] is not only a bright and dedicated woman, but she possesses an exuberant curiosity and sensitivity for life. I feel that Kittye will be an excellent physician and model for those who are associated with her."

Further, one of Kittye's chemistry professors wrote that "Kittye is an exceptional young woman who will surely develop into an excellent physician. She has already been a credit to the University and to Pi Beta Phi, and I am confident she will be even more so in the future."

Interns Love N. Y. Semester

Taking a semester off to go on an internship program is a popular experience at New York Delta. One such program is called Urban Organization, is offered through the Human Ecology School at Cornell, and is a full semester in New York City.

Students work 3¹/₂ days at a prearranged placement in their fields of study. One day a week is spent in a seminar with Dr. Madeline Holtzer, the Field Study professor. Students live in Cornell Medical School dormitories on the upper East Side. In the evenings and on weekends, they are free to experience the excitement and culture of the "Big Apple."

This year three Pi Phis participated in the program. Laura Older, textile science major, worked at the Wool Bureau, a non-profit organization formed to promote the sale of wool and wool products. She worked in the fashion office making presentations to manufacturers, retailers, and designers, participating in fashion shows, and creating fashion bulletins and mailings. While she was there she met and worked with Fran Kozen, a Cornell Pi Phi graduate. Fran is the senior market research analyst at the Wool Bureau. Laura said of her experience, "It was so exciting to be right there in the garment district, meeting people and seeing how all fit together. It was probably the best semester I've spent during my education."

Donna Regii, a communication arts major was with McCann-Erickson, a major advertising firm. She worked on producing five nationally aired radio commercials, along with several other promotions for name brand products. She said of her experience, "It was really exciting seeing all that goes on film shooting sessions, dealing with different clients, and analyzing market data. I learned a lot and saw and did things I'd never be exposed to in a classroom situation. Advertising is so dynamic and exciting."

Sarina Monast, a consumer economics major, worked for a small public relations firm. Her main project was making a food related promotion for national barbecue week. She said, when asked about her internship, "New York City is the best. It's hard to describe how much I've grown through my experience. Everyone should do it!"

It is also a way to do a daily check on those who are alone and provides these shut-ins with a link to the outside world.

"To what do you attribute your long life?"


That was the stock question asked of Alice Dunning Flick, Maryland Alpha, Des Moines, Iowa's, oldest living Pi Phi alumna. She may well be Pi Phi's oldest living alumna also, since she is now 100, and will be 101 in August of this year.

Alice couldn't answer that stock question. She just laughed and noted that all her family were long lived and that she's always been healthy. She walks an equivalent of four or five blocks each day and is vitally interested in daily events. She also has a spectacular "green thumb," and keeps dozens of plants and flowers on her wide window sills. She lives in the family home with her son Robert.

Last summer the Grace Methodist Church hosted a reception in her honor. She remains active by attending her monthly women's group meeting. Later, in August, her PEO chapter and her son gave a reception for her 100 birthday, at which time she received a beautiful memory book from her study club.

Alice was the first child of Frank and Rebecca Dunning, born August 25, 1880, in Bedford, Iowa. Her forebearers were of Scottish and English descent, first settling in the east, then gradually moving west and coming to Iowa in 1856, ten years after it gained statehood. Her father was a banker and provided a good home for his family. Alice remembers a happy childhood and had a love for outdoor activities. At the age of 13, in 1893, she and her sister attended the famous Columbia Exposition in Chicago.

Alice was an excellent student. Her favorite subjects were Latin, chemistry, and English literature. She was also a member of the first Bedford High School girls' basketball team. She was graduated from high school in 1898 and went to Baltimore, Md., to attend Goucher College. She was initiated into

Maryland Alpha in 1901. Included in her many college activities and honors were May Queen, girls' basketball team and other sports, and president of the senior class. She attended her sixtieth class reunion in 1963, "a joyous and noisy affair." May Lansfield Keller, Pi Phi's Grand President from 1908-1918, also attended that reunion and was one of Alice's good friends.

On June 5, 1907, Alice married Bruce Flick, a lawyer who was a member of her high school graduating class. During the following nine years they had three children. Alice was active in the women's suffrage movement, helped establish a Carnegie Library in Bedford, and belonged to the Women's Civic League, an early form of women's lib.

In 1921, the family moved to Des Moines, where Alice joined the study group, Brevity Club, and was active in her church, is a member of PEO, was in the Des Moines Women's Club, and helped establish the Association of Attorneys' Wives. She was branch president of AAUW and has had an association fellowship established in her name.

The Des Moines Alumnae Club is very proud of their outstanding community leader. She is a true inspiration to all.

Margie McCarter, head of Arrowcraft sales, pops in to tell Jan that a visiting alumna is in the shop and wants to say hello.

Jan and Bob go back to Staff House for lunch, prepared by Marie Ryder, Arrowmont food manager. Sandra Blain, Director of Arrowmont and the special initiate at the Phoenix Convention, and Clare Verstegen, Program Coordinator for Arrowmont; join them. Bob, who is responsible for the business affairs of Settlement School, has spent the morning working with Nadine Whitted, his administrative assistant

The Skinners, who have been married for twenty-seven years, are both originally from Chicago. Jan went to the University of Minnesota, where she majored in humanities. Bob attended the University of Tennessee where he majored in marketing. After graduation he worked for twenty years for a department store in Knoxville. Jan had moved to Knoxville in 1953 when her father became an executive with a flour company there. She was the local chairman for the 1966 Convention in Gatlinburg and served several years as province president. All this with three small girls!


Musical performances, slide presentations, movies and exhibitions provided faculty, students and staff an experience that will be long remembered.

Woven Piece Is In Permanent Art Collection

A beautiful addition to Arrowmont's permanent art collection was the direct result of hard work by students in a commissioned weaving class. Ken Weaver, a fiber artist specializing in architectural commissions, worked with advanced weavers to design and execute a hanging for Arrowmont. Students examined all aspects of commissioned hangings including the available space, and interior design of Arrowmont, the idea development, the construction, and the final installation of the piece in Arrowmont's main building.

Students worked long hours to complete the woven piece during the five day class. Faculty, students, and staff watched as the weavers secured the barnacle-like sections in place, with the entire piece measuring 18' in width and 9' in length. The staff at Arrowmont was truly appreciative of the dedication of all involved in the project and proud to have such a fine piece on display.

Three Participate In Unusual Study Grant

Can you imagine eating the same three meals every day for twelve weeks, measuring the ounces of water you drink, and running three to five miles a day? As participants in a human metabolic study, Kathleen Flynn, Janet Tarr, and Karen Parfitt, New York Deltas, found this an interesting experience.

Dr. Daphne A. Roe, Professor of Nutritional Science at Cornell, received a grant from the USDA and the American Dairy Association to conduct the study. The purpose was to determine the impact that exercising has on certain B vitamins required by women. Women, ages 20-35 years, were screened for health habits, history and present status, dietary intake, and exercise patterns, before becoming participants.

Twelve women began the study on January 19, 1981. Each morning the women weighed in, ate breakfast, and turned in a daily diary of physical condition, activities, body temperature, hours of sleep, ounces of water consumed, and minutes of running. Blood samples were taken twice a week. Every gram or milliliter of food had to be eaten, but no more. No late night pizza or popcorn! Six days a week the women faithfully ran 3-5 miles on the indoor track. All meals were eaten at the special metabolic unit. Each individual's diet was carefully planned so that she did not gain or lose weight in the twelve week period.

Being a subject involved many clinical and biochemical measurements, exercise, resting tests for oxygen consumption, and underwater weighing for body fat ratio. Results of the research should contribute to knowledge of what is adequate nutrition for exercising women.

Of course Kathleen, Janet, and Karen awaited the final day, April 10, with great anticipation. "Don't send money, Mom, just cookies, ice cream, pizza, bagels with cream cheese..."

Rub, Sweat, & Tape Is Trainer's Pastime

As she walks in wearing designer jeans and a buttondown shirt, it is hard to believe that Cynthia Hamm, Texas Epsilon, spends up to forty hours a week working in a sweaty situation.

Cynthia is currently serving an apprenticeship as an athletic trainer for the Mean Green of North Texas State University. Working with athletes in all sports, she tapes weak ankles, treats injuries, and oversees conditioning programs. Whenever NTSU holds a tournament or some other type of athletic activity, the trainers act as hosts and serve a public relations function for the university. But in Cynthia's own words, they just 'sort of do all they can to keep things running smoothly.''

Cynthia works with both male and female athletes. "I enjoy working with the guys more than the girls," she said, adding quickly, "they are less temperamental and take treatment with less objection."

Cynthia participated in varsity basketball and track in high school, so she always has centered everything around sports. "When I first came to college I wanted to major in fashion merchandising or something like that, but sports was really where my heart was, so that's what I decided to do."

As a physical education major, she already met the basic requirement for the trainer's program. But the hard part of getting the apprenticeship remained to be conquered. Cynthia had to convince John Porche, head athletic trainer at NTSU, that she was the best one for the job.

"He (Porche) tried to make it sound really difficult," Cynthia said with a gleam in her eye. "But I'm pretty aggressive and I was determined to let him know that I was sincere."

She must have been convincing or her determination paid off because Cynthia got the position and works constantly trying to keep those athletes in line.

"Cynthia is very ambitious and has a true desire to learn about professional athletic training," Porche said. "In fact, she's such a ball of fire that sometimes we have to slow her down."

Very few problems seem to arise out of the job, according to Cynthia. She said that NTSU is one of the few schools with a coeducational training program. "It cuts down on the vulgarity in the training room," she said. "You know—kind of puts a lid on the situation."

Spare time may be in shortage, but Cynthia said that sorority life has taught her how to schedule her time. "With few idle moments between training and Pi Phi functions, I really had to learn to discipline myself."

Cynthia hopes to work for a relatively large high school following graduation, knowing that small schools don't usually have trainers.

"I plan to be a friend as well as a teacher to my students," Cynthia said thoughtfully. "I want to put some of the old-fashioned fun back in school. Those kids are gonna look forward to my class!"

Her ultimate goal is to be the first woman trainer in professional football. But at the present time women aren't even allowed in the locker room. So it looks like that dream may have to wait outside the door a little longer.

The trainer feels as though all young people should have the chance to try things on their own, and she thinks being in a sorority can be one of the greatest opportunities to do this.

"Pi Phi has helped me in so many ways," Cynthia said. "Being in a sorority not only has advantages in college, but it can really be a help later in one's career. People always appreciate the fact that you've been a part of a prominent group like Pi Phi."



Through Chapter Service Projects

Every year the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity at Ohio State holds a beauty pageant with the proceeds going to the Heart Fund. Sue Squire, OHIO BETA president, placed second runner-up in the Queen of Hearts Pageant in February, after participating in interviews, evening gown and talent competitions.

The Heart Association chapter in San Diego received \$500 as a result of efforts of Sigma Nu and CALIFORNIA EP-SILON. A softball tournament took place over one weekend in November, with two Sigma Nu coaches appointed to help each sorority that participated. Mark Borson and Kurt Richardson were Pi Phi coaches and even found a sponsor to buy the uniforms—a local florist. The tourney benefitted Greek relations at San Diego State as well as being a fun philanthropic project.

ALABAMA ALPHA participated in a jump rope-a-thon at Birmingham-Southern, with proceeds going to the Heart Foundation. The chapter raised more money than any other group participating and had a great time doing it.

Recently several KENTUCKY ALPHAS served as hostesses at an auction for Cystic Fibrosis at the Louisville Galt House. Also, they formed a CF road block and collected money to aid the national campaign, and worked during the CF radiothon at a local Louisville station. During Louisville's Run for the Dimes, sponsored by the March of Dimes, Pi Phis helped out by recording times and directing runners.

NORTH DAKOTA ALPHAS are collecting pop tabs to help a fellow student get some free time on a kidney dialysis machine. Another service project of this chapter was participating in the March of Dimes Mothers' Walk.

NEW YORK DELTA has held a dessert party for senior citizens and a birthday party for children in the Big Brother-Big Sister program.

ILLINOIS EPSILONS Robin Daughtridge and Carola Del Rio teamed up with an ATO and and ADT to raise money for the Arthritis Foundation in Northwestern's seventh annual Dance Marathon. The Pi Phis and their partners kept moving for 30 hours one weekend in early February.

Each year the Alpha Tau Omegas at Washington State sponsor a 52-hour dance marathon to benefit epilepsy. This year's goal was set at \$14,000 to be used for the treatment of the disease and to increase the public awareness of epilepsy. The clinic is open two nights a week and sees patients both on an appointment and walk-in basis.

GEORGIA ALPHA held its annual Kidnap Social in March. Sorority and fraternity presidents, or a representative, were kidnapped and taken to a local gathering place while awaiting the ransoms. The social was open for anyone to participate. In addition to the \$10 ransom, a 50¢ donation was collected from individuals. \$347 was collected and donated to Arrowmont.

CALIFORNIA EPSILON is sponsoring a child through the Christian Children's Fund program. The \$15 a month sponsorship payments help furnish tuition and assistance for food, clothing, shelter, and books, as well as vocational guidance and training when applicable. Youngsters are selected on the basis of personal and financial need, and the child continues to receive help from CCF until he or she is 18 years old.

Sue Palumbo, PENNSYLVANIA EPSILON, while helping Delta Gamma raise money for the partially blind at the annual Anchor Splash, decided to enter the bathing suit contest and placed second overall. Other Penn State Pi Phis who helped in the event were Tracy Rock, Trish Hayward, Karen Cubbison, Marijo Cavallaro, Anne Depsky, and Sherry Walsh. Then the chapter won the overall spirit competition.

The first Sunday in March, OHIO DELTA spent the afternoon playing bingo with twenty women in a local nursing home. The girls concluded the afternoon by singing some Pi Phi songs for the residents.

NEW MEXICO ALPHA participated in several projects during the year. They held an Easter egg hunt for underprivileged children; a Halloween party, in conjunction with Sigma Chi at the University, for a local foster home; and served as "huggers" during the New Mexico Special Olympics for Retarted Citizens.

OREGON ALPHA'S annual Christmas philanthropy was a big success again this year. As in past years, they joined with Theta Chi and had a party for the underprivileged children in the Eugene area.

NEW MEXICO BETA earned \$118 for their philanthropy fund by holding a box lunch with Sigma Pi. In November the chapter kidnapped Greek presidents and held them for a ransom of food items. The food was donated to the chapter local philanthropy, the Garcia Foster Home. A house cleaning for the home took place in November and December, and at the latter time, posters and stockings stuffed with goodies were taken for the children to enjoy.

A STRANGER AT MY DOOR

by Mary Kistler, California Delta

Doubleday & Co., Garden City, N.Y., 1979, 184 pp.

Author of numerous published short stories, Mary Kistler's recently published second novel is a modern romance filled with colorful scenes, lively characters, and a suspenseful plot. It completely captured my attention from beginning to end.

The book contains all the ingredients of the classic Gothic novel, which I particularly love to read. There is the mysterious setting, this time in a remote part of Spain, complete with a huge, old house "Made of stone. Beautiful and old. It has stood for a century, alone on a high cliff by the sea." There is the pretty young heroine, Lisa Stephens, victimized by an automobile accident, amnesia, and probably a plot to conceal her identity. There are two possibilities for leading man: Enrique Fuente, Lisa's supposed husband, arrestingly handsome with black hair, pale skin, and dark blue eyes, who needs her signature to save his family's palatial ancestral home, and Edward Meredith, a "pleasant-looking" young American who offers to help Lisa escape the trap she feels has been set for her by Enrique. There is a supporting cast of possibly sinister characters: Enrique's grandmother, a dowager with "hooded eyes" and a cold manner; Antonia, Enrique's beautiful cousin and suspected mistress; Alfredo Garcia, Enrique's tough companion whom Lisa thinks is spying on her; priests loyal to the Fuentes; and hostile villagers.

The plot contains danger, real clues and false clues, missed opportunities of escape, mysterious gunshots, heartstopping chases, and a surprise ending with love conquering all. What more could a modern day Gothic novel fan want in a book?

LIFE CAN BE BEAUTIFUL

Privately published, 1979, 83 pp.

Dedicated to her late husband of 50 years, Irene Campbell has published this collection of poems out of a lifetime of experiences. Her poems are grouped in categories of love and friendship, holidays, childhood and family, nature, memory and grief. Celebrating high and low points of her life they are a testament to her faith in God and concern for others.

Some of these poems were previously published in newspapers in her hometowns of Altoona, Pennsylvania, and Sun City, Arizona, and were collected and printed at the urging of her friends and family. A poem I particularly enjoyed began with these lines:

> My love is like a silver stream So quietly it flows, But always there's the golden gleam, No matter where it goes.

In her introductory poem entitled "Collecting", the author tells us that her collection is "dear friends and NELLIE'S BOARDING HOUSE: A dual biography of Nellie Coffman and Palm Springs

ETC Publications, Palm Springs, Calif., 1981, 229 pp.

The author describes this biography of a woman, a resort hotel, a town and a desert as a four-and-a-half year labor of love. Pi Phi Marjorie Bright tells the remarkable story of the "Mother of Palm Springs," Nellie Coffman, and her impact on the now world-renowned resort city in California.

Nellie came to the desert for her health and discovered its beauty. In 1909 at 42 she moved there with her husband, a doctor, to start a sanitarium/hotel. According to the author, she found in the desert the four S's—space, stillness, solitude and simplicity—and reveled in "the warmth of the golden days, the blue of the skies, the gorgeous moon and stars, the lure of the desert nights, and above all, the peace and quiet and sense of security that she found there."

When Nellie opened her 6-room boardinghouse there were no roads and only a handful of people. She had little money, no business experience, and within a short period of time no husband, as they parted in 1914; her assets, however, included a love of the desert, a compelling personality, two sons who later went into business with her, and a conviction that she would succeed if she provided the three C's comfort, cuisine, and, of course, climate. She ran Nellie's Boardinghouse for 33 years during which time it grew into the sophisticated resort complex of The Desert Inn. More than any one person, Nellie is credited with creating the city of Palm Springs.

Marjorie Bright has sprinkled through the biography of a remarkable woman, her personal friend, many of Nellie Coffman's poems. She also draws on Nellie's other writings; recollections of her family, friends, and Palm Springs pioneers and newcomers; and newspaper accounts. Her book contains vivid descriptive and factual passages about the desert; the history of the Desert Inn, now the site of a luxurious shopping center; the story of Palm Springs and the fabulous people who go there; and the characterization of a colorful, forceful personality, Nellie Coffman. At her death in 1950 the Palm Springs newspaper called her "one of the grand personalities of the desert."

Alum Cites Real Estate Opportunities



Adele Ritchie Foschia, Maryland Beta, executive director of the Washington, D.C. Society for Crippled Children, was presented the Medders Award at the annual meeting of the National Easter Seal Society in Chicago in January.

Given to an Easter Seal executive who has been nominated by the local board of directors, the Medders Award is the highest honor that can be bestowed on an Easter Seal employee.

Adele started in 1962 with the society as a teacher of multiply-handicapped pre-school children. At the same time, she was a graduate instructor in special education at George Washington University. In 1975, with a seedgrant, she inaugurated the first comprehensive program for handicapped infants in D.C. and has continued it for the past four years. Since 1971, she has served on the Developmental Disabilities State Planning Council of the District. She is the only person to be reappointed continuously by the Mayor since the Council's inception. Within the Council itself, she has served as chairman of the protection and advocacy committee, the legislation committee, and the human rights committee, and has served on the executive committee.

Over the years, Mrs. Foschia has been a major force in Washington, advocating proper public school placement of multiply handicapped children.

Last fall saw the opening of an additional center serving 34 more handicapped children in southeast Washington and the purchase of the Kilby Treatment Center in Prince George's County, Md.

Her associates say, "Those of us who work with her on the board, the staff, and in the community all feel that the situation of the handicapped in Washington, D.C., is immeasurably better because of Adele Foschia."

Three Realize Long-Planned Visit



Karin was not worried about leaving. Her prime motivation for undertaking this endeavor is her desire to help other people. "I'm not only helping other

She defines a risk as "the purposeful welcoming of danger;" Karen seems willing to take a risk in opening her vulnerabilities, emotions and questionings to her readers.


