actively participate in our country's democratic
process in large part
because of the efforts of Carrie

Chapman Catt.

Born in 1859 in Ripon Wisconsin, Carrie Chapman attended Iowa State Agricultural College in Ames where she pledged and was initiated into the Iowa Gamma Chapter of Pi Beta Phi, and in 1880 graduated valedictorian and the only woman in her class.

Carrie Chapman Catt was an early teen when she decided women should have the right to vote. Twenty-eight years later, the cause's leader Susan B. Anthony named Ms. Catt her successor where she served as the key strategist gaining final ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920.

Founder of the League of Women Voters, Ms. Catt was recognized, in 1937, as one of 10 greatest American women. She graced the cover of *Time* magazine in 1926.

The play, "The Yellow Rose of Suffrage," was commissioned by Iowa State's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences to commemorate the achievements of this remarkable woman. Jane Cox, professor of theater, wrote and performs this one-woman play. A special benefit performance was held at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., March 1.

In October 1995, Carrie Chapman
Catt Hall will be dedicated on the Iowa
State campus. It will become the
College of Liberal Arts and Sciences
and the Carrie Chapman Catt Center
for Women and Politics. The center will
offer educational opportunities to
women and men who are interested in
politics and public service; organize
political issues seminars and workshops; foster research on issues related
to women in politics and encourage
women to pursue careers in politics
and public service.

This building was the Agricultural

Hall, more commonly known as Old Botany, and opened in 1893. It is the last surviving well-preserved 19th century building on the I.S.U. campus and was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1985.

A \$5 million renovation will make it once again a functioning building.

In front of the building will be a plaza of engraved bricks called the Plaza of Heroines. Here women, living or dead, will be honored for their contribution to families, sorority, community or world. The Fraternity honored Carrie Chapman Catt as a member of Pi Beta Phi by purchasing a paver which will bear her name.

The Center is a living memorial to a woman whose life's work was promoting education, securing the right to vote for women and working for world peace.



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# Capitol Gains

From the Texas State
Treasurer's office to
Washington D.C., United States
Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison
has traveled a maverick's path
to gain substantial yields for
Lone Star residents, women's
issues, small businesses and big
government.

She has been called everything from "Senator Sweet" to a "Texas Trend-Buster." Political Columnist Molly Ivins refers to her as the "Breck Girl." Adjectives such as soft-spoken, genteel, petite and demure are consistently used to describe her. And yet perhaps the most striking characteristic of this U.S. Senator has nothing to do with her blond tresses or small build.

Texas Monthly reports Senator
Hutchison's strongest character traits as determination, a tireless capacity for hard work, a knack for planning and organizing and extraordinary thriftiness. In a 1984 Dallas Morning News article, Senator Hutchison herself said the best advice from her mother was "Stop working so hard," and reported her epitaph should read: "She worked herself into this ground." She calls herself a perfectionist. "I don't demand anything of anyone that I don't demand of myself," said Kay.

A quick glance at Senator
Hutchison's résumé, and one might
think she sped to national prominence
with ease. But that assumption, just as
the "Breck Girl" label, is based on
appearances. Delve a little deeper and
there is more to be found. The road to



Capitol Hill was not paved for her; it has been bumpy and full of detours. One could say she navigated her way there maneuvering through the traffic of discrimination and harassment among other road blocks.

# The Trip Begins

Senator Hutchison grew up in La Marque, Texas, daughter of a builder and homemaker. She graduated in the top 10 percent of her high school class and started at the University of Texas as a government major. The Texas Alpha Pi Phi was active and popular on campus. A cheerleader at the University of Texas, Kay entered the University of Texas Law School her senior year, one of a handful of women.

# A Turn in the Road

After receiving her law degree in 1967, Kay worked for a year at a law firm in Galveston, Texas. She tried for months to find work in a Houston law firm but met with rejection and frustration. Many firms thought male clients would not work with a woman attorney. Others did not risk hiring her. They worried about what might happen if she married and had children. Always industrious, Kay turned to a career as a

reporter for KPRC-TV in Houston. It was this turn which provided her first close glance at politics when she was assigned to cover the courthouse and political beat. An interview with fellow Texan Ann Armstrong, Co-chairman of the Republican National Committee, led Kay to a job in Washington as press secretary for the committee.

# The Road Back Home

After a short stint in the Capitol, Senator Hutchison returned to Houston to fulfill her political ambitions and was twice elected to the Texas House of Representatives; holding her first elected office at the age of 29. In 1976, President Gerald Ford appointed her Vice Chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board.

In 1978 she married Ray Hutchison, a former colleague from the Texas House, and moved to Dallas. There she was appointed senior vice president and general counsel of Republic Bank Corp. She later cofounded Fidelity National Bank of Dallas. Kay turned again to the political arena in 1981. She decided to run for Congress. After placing first in the primary, Kay was forced into a runoff with a friend. Three days before the runoff, an anonymous smear letter about her was circulated and she lost the election. Defeat was not easy for her to accept. In a rare display of public emotion, Kay conceded the race, saying, "I voted for myself this morning ... and I felt good about it."

From politics, she switched gears to business. She was a partner in Boyd-Levinson, Ltd., in the Dallas and Houston design centers. In addition, she owned McCraw Candies, a manufacturing company with national distribution. Running her own business Kay

called "the toughest thing I have ever

Still possessing a fervor for politics, Kay sold the company and ran for state treasurer in 1990. This race, too, turned personal as her opponent claimed Kay had a conflict of interest because of her husband's position as a bond attorney. Quick to defend herself against the accusations, Kay persevered. It wasn't until after midnight that Kay could claim victory; she was elected to office with 49.9 percent of the vote.

# **New Horizons**

Lloyd Bentsen's departure to become secretary of the Treasury in Washington opened a seat in the U.S. Senate. Governor Ann Richards appointed Democrat Bob Krueger to fill the vacancy until a special election. In June of 1993, in that special election, Kay Bailey Hutchison, Republican of Texas, was elected by the largest margin of votes ever received in the United States against a sitting, incumbent senator.

Just months after her victory, a
Texas grand jury indicted her on
charges that as Texas State Treasurer
she had misused state funds and
employees for her own political purposes. The controversy continued for
months as charges were dismissed and
reinstated twice. On February 11,
1994, Senator Hutchison was exonerated of all charges. Republican Senator
John W. Warner of Virginia said on the
Senate floor that Hutchison wore a
"badge of courage and firmness I wish
more of us had."

In November 1994, she was reelected to a full, six-year term in the Senate.

# Life in the Fast Lane

Her major legislative initiatives have been aimed at restoring the proper focus of the federal government and limiting its intrusion into the domain of states, local governments, small businesses and individuals.

On the Armed Services Committee, Senator Hutchison has proven a strong advocate for United States military personnel and their families and for increased readiness and support for our armed forces. After 18 months on Armed Services, she became the first woman to serve on the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

In her work on two other Senate committees, Small Business, along with Commerce, Science and Transportation, she has consistently voted to roll back federal mandates and to limit the power of government. A recurring theme in Senator Hutchison's political theory since entering politics, was illustrated in a speech entitled, "Let Thomas Jefferson Rest in Peace" when she was state treasurer. "Thomas Jefferson is rolling over in his grave. When he framed the Constitution, he fought for states rights. He fought for limited federal government. What we have today is not the small representative body envisioned by our founding fathers. What we have is a 3,000 pound gorilla."

Senator Hutchison was named a Deputy Majority Whip and is co-chair of the Senate GOP Regulatory Reform Task Force. She has been making the news of late introducing legislation that would provide violence ratings for television programming on a quarterly basis. In addition, she is co-sponsoring the IRA Equity Bill to allow homemakers fully deductible contributions of up to \$2,000 to individual retirement accounts.

Senator Hutchison and her husband Ray live in Dallas. He is a partner in the law firm of Vinson and Elkins. Among other charitable activities, the Hutchisons fund two scholarships at the University of Texas and one at Southern Methodist University School of Law.

The Senator's links to Texas are historic. Thomas Jefferson Rusk, of Nacogdoches, was the first Texan to serve in the U.S. Senate. His friend and law partner was Charles S. Taylor, who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence. Taylor's great-great-great-great granddaughter, Kay Bailey Hutchison, today occupies the Rusk seat in the U.S. Senate.

Her links to build bridges for today's women are just as historically noteworthy. Kay Bailey Hutchison is a woman of firsts: first Republican woman elected to the Texas House; first Republican woman elected to statewide office in Texas; first woman elected Senator in Texas. Though her accomplishments are many, you haven't heard the last from this woman of firsts. One gets the sense that this U.S. Senator is a pioneer of women for women. "I want to be able to pick up the newspaper and read that 'the bottom line earnings of a bank are the best, and the president happens to be a woman,' rather than reading that 'there is a first woman president of the bank." She concludes. "I think the best thing that will happen to women is when there are no more 'firsts.'"

In a special interview with Pi Beta Phi, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison shares her feelings on Pi Phi, politics and persistence.

# How has your experience in Pi Beta Phi benefited you in your endeavors?

Many of the best friends I have are those I made in the sorority. I have been touched by how many of my Pi Phi sisters from all over Texas helped in my political campaigns. Many held leading positions in my organization, many contributed and hosted coffees and receptions for me.

# You have worked as a reporter, press secretary, attorney, bank vice president and business owner. What advice would you give our collegians currently determining their career paths?

First, get the best education you can and take advantage of every educational opportunity. Once in the work force, don't be afraid to try new things early in your career and take on new challenges. A good job is one that forces you to learn something new every day. Move around and experiment-but give yourself 100 percent to whatever you're doing.

# How can Pi Phis make their presence known politically?

Get involved in local community affairs, both individually and as a group, and be loyal, reliable participants in the process. Vote, support the candidates who represent you and look for opportunities to make a unique contribution based on the strength of our organization.

# What character qualities do you believe helped you most in your political career?

Persistence, and a willingness to risk failure. The one characteristic shared by those who succeed is the ability to pick themselves up after they've lost a round, and try again.

# What do you believe you can contribute as a United States Senator? What goals do you have after serving as United States Senator?

Our country needs to revitalize its roots. We became the greatest nation on earth by rewarding hard work and assuring success based on merit, not birth. We must return to self-reliance, rather than dependence on government, and we must free our businesses from over regulation and taxation so they can compete in the global marketplace and create more jobs in America.

I hope, as a senator, to help get this country back on track. My goal after leaving the Senate is to write a book!

# What do you consider your biggest political accomplishments?

As a state representative, I sponsored and passed bills to authorize the creation of transit systems in Texas cities and create county historical commissions to preserve our heritage, and a measure to ensure fair treatment of rape victims. As State Treasurer, I fought against the imposition of a state income tax and cut my agency's budget more than any other in the state, while earning more for our taxpayers' investments than had ever been earned in one year. As U.S. Senator, I am fighting for a

strong national defense, for homemakers' retirement security and for a balanced federal budget.

# As a women in the predominately male-oriented political arena, what have been your greatest challenges? Your biggest surprises?

The challenge in my first campaign for the state Legislature in 1972 was to prove I could do the job. Back then there was healthy skepticism whether a woman could be tough enough to function effectively in politics. It came as a big surprise to me to find that now the situation is just the opposite: being a woman in politics is an advantageand is very rewarding.

I'm touched by the women who love helping other women and by fathers who bring their daughters to meet me because they want them to have a role model.

# What do you consider your causes?

Strong national defense; individual retirement accounts for homemakers so they will enjoy the same security in their later years as those who worked outside the home; regulatory relief for small businesses.

# Who has served as a role model for you?

I consider Anne Armstrong, former co-chair of the Republican National Committee and first female ambassador to Great Britain, to be a role model. I was her press secretary and learned so much from her. She has continued to be my closest advisor and friend through the years.

# How do you maintain homes and offices in Washington and Dallas and have a personal life?

My husband is a political veteran as well as a respected attorney in his own right. Without his support and understanding, it would be impossible to do what I do.

# How are you able to maintain a perspective in the face of criticism?

One of the adjustments I had to make in my life was making the transition from wanting people to like me to a career in which I seek not popularity, but respect. In life, all of us who work hard and fight for our beliefs will have detractors—this is magnified if we are in politics. I try not to take criticism personally and I try not to criticize others in a personal way.


Our readership consists of nearly 120,000 women, ranging in age from 18 to 80 and beyond, what issues do you consider paramount to their futures as we approach the year 2000?

Recently I attended a memorial service for Melissa Gail Aptman, a Pi Beta Phi collegian who had been brutally murdered just two weeks shy of her graduation from Washington University in St. Louis.

More than 800 students, faculty and friends gathered to pay tribute to this young woman whose future seemed so bright and yet was cut short. The night was one I will not soon forget. Peers, sisters and mentors openly shared how one had touched them, the impact made on their own lives.

I am saddened to think of the number of similar services we have each attended, saying our goodbyes to those we have held dear. Our members who have died are listed in the In Memoriam department, and though we do not publish obituaries of deceased members, we know that with each life is an incredible and inspiring story.

For every issue we receive notes and letters informing us of the death of our members.

Sometimes newspaper clippings are included, a husband pens his feelings of grief and loss, an alumnae club shares the program from a memorial service, collegians send photos from Pi Phi functions. As objective as we are called to remain in an editorial sense, many times our hearts surrender and we are brought to tears.

Resonating in my mind are the words of Melissa's younger sister who, in a poem she wrote in tribute to her sister, asked, "Can anyone mend a broken heart?" Unfortunately, none of us can. Yet, we can call on one another for support and assistance, to bear one another's burdens.

I believe it is in times of great grief and sadness that the utter core of our Fraternity shines through. As much pain and anguish as was visible at the memorial service, I was strengthened to see the chapter members of Missouri Beta walk together across the quadrangle of the campus, wearing wine and blue ribbons and their badges, comforting and sustaining one another.

Following is an excerpt from a poem by Melissa entitled "Uncertainty."

You can't read ahead into our life's plan, so you must do what you can... to enjoy today's delights, because change comes with the night.

The rearranging in life stimulates the soul. although it always takes its toll.

Departing from the comfortable has its price...

but without risks ... what is life?

To move ahead, we must say goodbye.

To shape the soul, we must break old ties.

However, we never lose that which we once had at the start.

It remains engraved in each of our hearts.

In this issue, we celebrate women—from Carrie Chapman Catt to Melissa Aptman and thousands of others—who in big and small ways charge us to give of ourselves ... to our country, our community, our causes, and most importantly to each other.

PHYLLIS ELLIOTT OAKLEY, Illinois Epsilon, is the Assistant Secretary of the Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration at the U.S. State Department. In Northwestern University's magazine, Mosaic, Phyllis described her job, "What we do involves subjects that are on the front page almost every day," she says, "whether it's about people coming to the U.S. to seek asylum, refugees from Haiti and Cuba washing up on shores, or humanitarian assistance in Bosnia, Somalia or Burundi." Phyllis and her husband Robert Oakley, a retired ambassador to Pakistan and former special envoy to Somalia gave a joint presentation at the fifth annual Leopold Lecture at Northwestern University emphasizing humanitarian issues, namely refugee crises.

# Gentle Message Delivered at School's First Painting Conference

"Having long since made the not so startling discovery that art is not the best choice of professions by which to get rich, my belief is that one becomes an artist because of a certain independence of spirit, and to give up that independence is to give up the real reward of being an artist."

This quote from
Milford Zornes, published
by Hillcrest Press in 1991, perfectly
sums up the active career of painter
Milford Zornes, the keynote speaker for
the Watercolor USA Honor Society
Conference held April 20–22, 1995 at
Arrowmont.

Born in Oklahoma in 1908 and reared in California, Zornes has traveled the world, painting in such places as Mexico, Majorca, Greenland and Uganda.

As one of 42 official U.S. Army artists in World War II, Zornes was assigned to the Pacific Theater. "The army experience was a significant one," Zornes said at Arrowmont. "I was sent to India, Burma, China and spent two years abroad with no other chore than to paint, draw and collect graphic sketches of anything that had to do with army life. Of course I cheated—I

went and saw things outside of army life and did a lot of painting I wasn't required to do, so it was an outstanding experience."

Since then his many teaching assignments have taken him to places such as Italy, Ireland, Spain, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, Bali, Java, Alaska and very recently to Tennessee, where he taught one of eight pre-conference

watercolor workshops at Arrowmont.

"In my own teaching I definitely don't teach people to be artists, I certainly do not attempt it. I teach painting as a craft. In Ireland a young friend of mine, a student, rushed up to me one day and said, 'Mr. Zornes! Do you know how to be an artist?' I said I'd like to,

and he said, 'You get your paints, your canvas, your brushes and your easel, and you set up in the square or by the road, and you paint, and people come along and say there's an artist!'

"I'm afraid that's the reason why we as painters do get the label 'artists,' whereas in other fields of endeavor this label has to be won. People do not speak of a novel as a work of art until it has proven itself to be a work of art, and the same is true in architecture, music or any of the other arts."

Zornes confided that over the years he's become suspicious of "art by intention or art by influence or art by attitude. I've found that what constitutes art is what any one individual needs from his world, and what he looks for. If he finds it, he finds art."

Arrowmont Business Manager Nadine Whitted is celebrating her 40th

anniversary with Pi Beta Phi. A native of Gatlinburg, Nadine attended Pi Beta Phi Elementary and Pi Beta Phi High Schools. After graduation, she joined the staff at Arrowcraft in February of 1955. "There was a lot of business (at Arrowcraft) then," Nadine said. "Arrowcraft had a loom out front, and I demonstrated weaving some."

Gradually she moved into the shipping department. After she had worked five years with Arrowcraft, Nadine was hired by Settlement School Director Marion Miller. Her office was in Teachers' Cottage. The area where Arrowmont now sits, Nadine recalls, "was fenced in with mules, cows and livestock."

"I worked year round back then, but we only had about five weeks of classes in the summer, and they were held in the high school building. Those (students) enjoyed it! They weren't pressured so much like now. Everybody goes at a fast pace now."

Things have changed steadily since then. Today Spring and Summer Workshop Programs occupy 14 weeks of the year, and Elderhostels about six weeks. Ten years ago Arrowmont offered five workshops during November Community Classes; there

were eight in 1994. Children's Classes boasted three workshops in 1987, and seven in 1995. Twelve Elderhostel Workshops are scheduled for this September, twice as many as in 1987. Additional studio space has enabled Arrowmont to offer 100 classes during its 1995 Spring and Summer Workshop Program, up from 76 in 1985. As classes and programs have expanded, so have Nadine's responsibilities and her job description.

Though busier than ever at Arrowmont, Nadine's work schedule enables her to remain active in her church where she and former Arrowcraft employees Veryl Monhollen, Faye Cook and Nella Hill got together and formed a gospel group called Southern Harmony. "They're all sisters," Nadine explained, adding, "Sometimes we go visit other churches and things, and once in awhile another group will have us, but mostly we just sing at our church."

For about 25 years, Nadine crossed the parking lot to spend lunch hour with the Cook sisters at Arrowcraft. The ritual ended when the shop was leased in 1994, but Southern Harmony is still intact.

Today, Nadine's office is located in a shingled cottage between the Parkway and a hedge around the Pi Beta Phi Elementary School playground. "Oh, I love this building," Nadine said. "It's away from the beaten path!" Formerly the Settlement School clinic, the building houses three offices and a historical room under a lovely slate roof. The nearby hedge is popular with birds and rabbits, and with her windows open she can hear children on the Pi Beta Phi playground—a pleasant reminder of the Fraternity's long history in Gatlinburg.

permanent collection. With support
from the Campaign, this area of
Arrowmont's role in education is
poised for growth.

Hired less than a year ago to the administrative position made possible by Campaign gifts, Rothove's full-time commitment to the gallery program is opening doors and bringing visibility to the school.

# The Internet

The Smithsonian's call was to announce that the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art is putting its White House Collection of American Crafts "on tour" on the World Wide Web, the fastest-growing part of the Internet. The "tour" will include the work of 12 to 15 of Arrowmont's faculty. In addition to pieces in the White House Collection, these recognized craft artists have pieces in Arrowmont's permanent collection and have been represented in numerous exhibitions in the school's gallery.

# The Arrowcraft Collection

One of Rothove's goals is to "expand our educational outreach and establish Arrowmont even more firmly

as an institution of historical significance." When speaking of current activity to document the school's historic Arrowcraft Collection, Rothove says, "This collection is far more important than I first realized. We are fortunate to own a collection with such regional significance and we have an obligation to preserve it." The largest portion of the collection represents hand-woven textiles from Pi Beta Phi's cottage weaving industry. Correspondence from the Mint Museum of Art in Charlotte, North Carolina supports Arrowmont's role as a resource and recognizes the value of its treasures. The Mint Museum seeks Arrowmont's help in documenting the origins of work for its Southern Arts & Crafts Movement in 1890-1940 exhibition scheduled for mid-1996. Several

In celebration of its 50th anniversary, Arrowmont's gallery will host a 50th Anniversary: Faculty Invitational Exhibition from August 18-October 7. Faculty who have made a commitment to send work for the anniversary exhibition have received a personal appeal to donate a work to the newly established 50th Anniversary Collection. This collection is being assembled to represent the best in late 20th century American art and craft objects. The Anniversary Collection will become a part of Arrowmont's permanent collection with continuing visibility in the school's atrium and foyer gallery areas

A full-time coordinator is providing the gallery program with new vitality, and is offering Arrowmont the first glimmer of activity toward

We're already seeing it in installations and in the earliest steps to document and preserve valuable collections. But we've just begun. Many more steps lie ahead and additional gifts are essential."

Opportunities for the Arrowmont program are limitless. Whether they include visibility on Internet and the information superhighway, assembling a new collection, providing a climatecontrolled environment for the preservation of a historic collection, or selecting pieces for the many theme exhibitions ... funding will dictate the boundaries. The undivided attention of a full-time gallery administrator will ensure that monies are spent wisely. An open endowment begun with gifts in honor of Sandra Blain seeks support from Pi Beta Phis and other friends of Arrowmont.

broadcast receivers for the visually impaired and testing those receivers prior to distribution. The women of the chapter also received training to become "on air readers." Initially, three members volunteered weekly. Now, 10 members read for one-hour sessions each Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Another 25 members have volunteered as substitute readers. Just one year ago, Radio Reading Service did not have enough volunteers. Now, thanks to Pi Phi, it has more volunteers than it needs each week!

Alabama Beta hosted the annual Volunteer Readers Reception at the chapter house to thank all community volunteers who read for the program. The chapter also sponsored a widely publicized golf tournament that raised more than \$2,000 for Radio Reading Service. Chapter members and local Pi Phi alumnae worked to procure prizes, recruit players and staff the tournament. Local alumnae also serve as "on

air readers." Pi Beta Phi's Mentoring & Networking Program

In 1995, Pi Beta Phi's Directions
Program got a new look and a new
emphasis. To oversee the expansion of
the program, Grand Council moved
Directions under the jurisdiction of the
Director of Membership Kay Knittle
Brock. In addition, a national committee of six women was appointed. Clubs
in larger cities appointed a Directions
Coordinator, whose function is to promote Directions within her club as well
as collect and send enrollment forms to
Central Office.

The database of resource people has been increased and updated. In December, a questionnaire was sent to all members currently enrolled in the program. Individual Pi Phis were able to update Central Office records ensur-

ing that the information provided through the program is current. So far in the 1994-95 academic year, approximately 500 requests for Directions information have been filled. The Fraternity is better able to send members what they want, expect and need.

Kay has brought a new emphasis to the program in meeting the needs of today's women and widening the personal communication channel between members. Among other goals in reorganizing Directions, Kay wanted to redefine the purpose of the program and educate members on how to participate and what to expect. In achieving that goal, beginning this summer, members who register with Directions will be given guidelines for the program.

MARJORIE MONTGOMERY BOWKER
ALBERTA ALPHA
UNIVERSITY OF ALBERTA
EDMONTON, ALBERTA, CANADA
PROFESSION: RETIRED JUDGE OF FAMILY
AND JUVENILE COURTS OF ALBERTA

Alberta Alpha Marjorie Bowker served Alberta, Canada as Family and Juvenile Courts Judge for seventeen years, not only exhibiting excellence and leadership in her profession, but service to her country, Canada, and the community as well. In her judicial capacity, with the aid of a federal grant, she was instrumental in 1972 in establishing a court-centered Marriage Conciliation Service, in the Family Court of Edmonton. The first of its kind in Canada, it is aimed at preventing divorce, reducing divorce and conciliating differences created by divorce. The service would become a model for other courts in Canada, as well as in Australia. Partly in recognition of her work in this field, she was awarded the Queen Elizabeth Silver Jubilee Medal in 1978.

Published in 1988, her book on the Canada-U.S. Free Trade Agreement, entitled "On Guard for Thee," was a national best seller. Her two books on the Constitution, "The Meech Lake Accord: What It Will Mean to You and to Canada" (1990) and "Canada's Constitutional Crisis: Making Sense of It All" (1991) were also best sellers and were commended for making complex constitutional issues understandable to the average citizen.

In 1989 Marjorie was named Woman of the Year by the Business and Professional Women's Club of Edmonton and given the Distinguished Canadian Award from the Council of Canadians in Ottawa. An honor for which she is most proud is the Order of Canada, the highest civilian award in Canada's honors system, emphasizing lifetime achievement. She received the award in 1990. This February, Marjorie was named to the Alumni Wall of Recognition which honors distinguished alumni of the University of Alberta.

Although retired from the court, Marjorie continues to counsel on a oneon-one basis, and is sought after as a speaker and mediator for her profession.

CATHERINE NELSON EVANS TEXAS GAMMA TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY ARLINGTON, TEXAS COMMUNITY: VOLUNTEER

Catherine Evans' volunteerism has touched the whole of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex for the past 30 years. A Texas Gamma, her expertise in community and urban affairs has been sought by community boards, mayors and United States legislators.

Accompanied by a sound sense of integrity, gracious manner, depth of knowledge, untiring diligence and a skillful finesse, Catherine's interests and efforts have impacted community needs in a variety of arenas.

Catherine's honors and awards for her volunteerism have dated from 1968. Most recently she was named Tarrant County Legacy of Women Volunteer of the Year. The Women's Shelter, Inc. of Fort Worth sponsors the awards program to call attention to the accomplishments of women in areas where the shelter serves victims of domestic violence.

Since 1989, she has served on the board of directors for United Way of Metropolitan Tarrant County, for the past three years as board vice chairman and Community Initiatives and Allocations Division Chairman. In 1991, Catherine was named United Way Volunteer of the Year for Metropolitan Tarrant County. She serves on the board of directors for The Parenting Center. Catherine represents Tarrant County Commissioner's Court while serving on the Sheriff's Department Civil Service Commission. A former president of Mortar Board, Inc. and Mortar Board National Foundation, Catherine served four years during its transition to a co-ed honor society. Catherine is board vice president for Challenge, Inc., a substance abuse advisory and advocacy agency. She volunteered as chairman of Arlington Human Service Planners for three years and served on the Coordinating Board another seven.

Catherine's most recent endeavor is fund-raising chairman for a multi-million dollar retirement center sponsored by the United Methodist Church Central Texas Conference.

COMMUNITY: CHILD ADVOCATE

For seventeen years, Wisconsin Alpha Judy Frick has concentrated her career on child advocacy. Many organizations in Wichita, Kansas have benefited from her outstanding leadership abilities. In 1978, the three Junior Leagues of Kansas formed Kansas Action for Children, Inc. (KAC), a statewide child advocacy organization. When Judy Frick was called on to assume the presidency, KAC was struggling. At the end of Judy's three years as president, KAC employed a full-time executive director and had completed several major projects including a statewide project to promote the revision of the outdated Kansas Juvenile Code, and a project to promote the knowledge and use of the new Kansas Juvenile Code with an emphasis on permanency planning for children in foster care. Today, KAC is a very successful statewide advocacy organization participating in projects such as Kids Count, teen pregnancy prevention, child care policy and citizen review boards.

Judy has been a presenter to the Governor's Conference on the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect. In 1989 she was appointed for a threeyear term to the U.S. Advisory Board on Child Abuse and Neglect for the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and in 1988 she received the Friend of CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) Award.

After many years of helping children voluntarily, Judy was hired as the executive director of Wichita/Sedgwick County Cities in Schools, Inc. (CIS) in 1990. CIS is a private nonprofit dropout prevention program which seeks to redirect community services through the school. Through her efforts during the 1993-94 school year, CIS served 880 children and their families by way of site coordinators, 41 staff persons on loan from human service agencies and 200 volunteers. The loaned staff and volunteers represented 95 different agencies, businesses, civic and religious groups, colleges and universities, and they contributed 21,000 volunteer hours to help children at project schools.

## MARILYN HORNE CALIFORNIA GAMMA UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA NEW YORK CITY, NEW YORK PROFESSION: OPERA SINGER

For four decades mezzo-soprano Marilyn Horne, California Gamma, has been gracing operatic stages around the world.

Among her many honors, Marilyn received New York's highest cultural award, The Handel Medallion in 1980, for her outstanding contribution to the arts in New York City. She received the Covent Garden Silver Medal for Outstanding Service in 1989 which marked the 25th anniversary of her debut at The Royal Opera House, and in 1990 the San Francisco Opera's

Silver Medal for 30 years of extraordinary artistry. In 1992 Marilyn was honored by The National Endowment for the Arts when President Bush presented her with the coveted National Medal of Arts. The International Association of Opera Directors awarded her the prestigious Fidelio Gold Medal. Marilyn was the first American artist so honored. In 1993 she was the featured vocalist at the Inauguration of President Clinton.

Marilyn has the distinction of being the only living artist selected by Jarold C. Schonberg for his *New York Times* list of the nine "all-time, all-star singers in the Met's (Metropolitan Opera's) 100 years."

A first for Marilyn in 1994 was the Marilyn Horne Vocal Workshop at Carnegie Hall. The intensive five-day workshop of seminars and masterclasses gave some of the country's brightest young artists the opportunity to learn and be coached by the esteemed singer. To further education of artists, Marilyn established The Marilyn Horne Foundation, a nonprofit organization devoted to the art of the vocal recital. The foundation's purpose is to provide grants to musicians and presenters to create more performance opportunities for singers; educational programs for grade-school children; and song commissions for American composers.

Future projects for Marilyn include serving as Voice Program Director Designate and Artist-in-Residence of the summer institute at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, where she will be full time as of the summer of 1997.

Kathy's mother, Nevada Alpha Rita Laing Daniels, says she is often asked what her daughter does for the State Department. "All I am able to say is, 'She helps Americans who get into trouble."
