

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

Carol's academic achievements, as well as her leadership qualities, make her a worthy addition to the roster of Fellowship winners. According to Karen Peterson Simopoulos, Nebraska Beta, program director for the Louisiana State University Union, "While pursuing a demanding premedical curriculum, Carol served as a student chairman of an active Union committee in her junior year; under Carol's leadership, the Current Events Committee presented programs of nationally known speakers and thought provoking topics. Students on the committee respected Carol and worked diligently with her."

Carol plans to use her Fellowship at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. Although she has not as yet set any definite career goals, she is a psychology major with a premed minor and she is interested in psychiatry. Summer work has provided the financing for most of her education thus far, as well as for her Pi Phi membership.

Culture of South India Comes Back To Minnesota

IF Minnesota Alpha Phis ever got tired of American cooking, they would just have senior Cyndy Brehm mix them up a dish straight from South India! As a junior, Cyndy spent four months in Coimbatore, India, studying community nutrition, child development, the caste system and family relations.

Cyndy went to India on a Phi Upsilon (Home Economics Sorority) scholarship grant. She was one of two foreign students at Sri Avinasahilingam Home Science College in Coimbatore. While there, she was treated just as an Indian girl, wearing a sari, eating their food in their way, and attending their temple and local festivities. Cyndy learned about typical diets for various conditions and how to prepare Indian foods. She studied culture and customs as they

affect nutrition and food habits, and also through participation in ceremonies and festivals. Before returning home, she travelled for two months throughout the rest of India and Kashmir.

Back at Minnesota Alpha, Cyndy presented papers on her experiences and learning to the Department of Nutrition at the university. She is now a graduate, majoring in Family Social Science and Community Nutrition. But Cyndy's interests do not stop there. Besides being an active part of Pi Phi, she does volunteer work at the University Hospital. She recently received a \$500 scholarship from the Minnesota Heart Association and is active in church work. And the "intercultural travels" of Cyndy have benefited all the other Minnesota Pi Phis.

Mrs. Davis summed it all up when she said, "I'm sure I've received as much as I've given. It's been a very worthwhile experience. I can now truthfully say that people haven't really changed since I was in college."

Georgia Alpha's feelings about their youngest housemother were summed up by one active who said, "It was a fantastic experience. It brought us closer together in a lot of ways, because we all learned. I just can't wait til she comes back to play."

Massachusetts Alpha is proud to have had national officers, province and alumnæ province presidents from its membership; to have recognized seventy-seven Golden Arrow members; and to have had many loyal alumnæ working diligently for The Fraternity and for the active chapter throughout these seventy-five years. In particular we honor Anna Robinson Nickerson, Grand Vice President from 1918-1925, Sarah Pomeroy Rugg, ARROW Editor from 1912-1921, and Ethel Sanford Adams, who has given many devoted years to The Fraternity and this chapter.

Gifts of flowers, mostly carnations, decorated the house. Contributions toward sending an alternate to Convention were given by alumnæ who could not be present. A special, very meaningful and thoughtful poem was written for the occasion by Evelyn Peters Kyle, Grand Vice President of Alumnæ, who had visited and grown to know the chapter last fall. This was read by incoming chapter president, Sue Crust.

Coincidentally, in our Diamond Anniversary year, the chapter is just the size of our charter chapter—ten wonderfully enthusiastic and loyal members. During this anniversary year, Sue Strecker, our 700th member, was initiated. Sue Crust, who attended Convention in San Antonio, hopes to lead Massachusetts Alpha over the troublesome spots safely toward our centennial year! But our 76th year will be the most crucial ever!

Fraternities Prove Valuable Today

Syndicated columnist Russel Kirk, who is also a professor at Michigan State University, has written that college and university administrators across the country are having second thoughts about the fraternity system and its usefulness. Roughly a decade ago many administrators were persuaded that the social fraternity was hopelessly undemocratic, anachronistic and meritless. In some cases, fraternities were banished from the campus or so severely restricted that they could not survive. Kirk, not a fraternity member, says "the fraternities are more valuable today then they were in the 19th cen-

tury, when many of them were founded. . . . I mean that the typical student body nowadays is far too big, so that most students are lost in a lonely crowd, and many complain that they have been reduced to business machine numbers." In Kirk's judgment the fraternity offers an ideal means of eliminating the anonymity and impersonality of the large university. He sees the fraternity as a "residential club on a humane scale, a little community, a focus of affections." Kirk concludes: "If fraternities adhere to their declared objectives, they can do much to restore the higher learning in this land."

Internal Rot Is Biggest Threat

In my opinion the greatest threat to the future of fraternities is the pessimistic attitude of many fraternity leaders. It was distressing to hear the president of the alumni IFC at a Southwestern campus state with conviction that he expected fraternities on his campus to be dead possibly within 10 years and certainly within 15 years. My discomfort was compounded when I learned that several undergraduate fraternity leaders shared this view. They cited changes such as strong student interest in matters other than social activities, improved campus housing and improved off-campus housing which made the fraternity house less attractive in comparison, and criticism from liberal (and sometimes moderate) students and professors as the major reasons for the gradual demise of fraternities on

campuses, such as theirs, which have old established fraternity systems.

On the other hand they would assert with vigor the view that it is natural for college students to want to have small group associations. If the desire for small group identification is natural (and I believe it is), then why should the eventual death of fraternities be inevitable?

Fraternities, I suggest, can have a bright future. If they die, it will probably be more the result of internal rot than external pressure and I do not dismiss external pressure lightly.

Greeks For Peace Movement Begins On Oregon Campus

THE Greek system at the University of Oregon is changing. Every house on campus realizes that to survive, it has to become active in campus affairs that relate to politics and public welfare. The Greeks here are broadening their horizons to include more than the traditional activities because the university itself is very politically oriented where student interest lies.

Panhellenic and the Inter-Fraternity Council realize the need for more vital activity. That is why they began the Greeks for Peace movement. The main objective of Greeks for Peace is to involve fraternities and sororities in positive, constructive, non-violent anti-war activity.

Two Pi Phis are on the control board of Greeks for Peace. They are Gidge Benson and Ally Nuschy. Gidge explains that there are six Greeks on the control board who take care of all the business. It is the board's job to talk to the various houses to promote interest in the anti-war movement and gather members.

The members of Greeks for Peace want to educate people on Vietnam and American foreign policy in general. These Greeks have visited houses and talked to members, but not only about their own ideas. They are also promoting Young Voters for Peace, an organization whose roots are in Oregon, but is hoping to spread. The idea behind Young Voters is pledging refusal to vote for any candidate who does not publicly advocate removal of all troops from Vietnam. If the movement spreads and the objective of 50,000 letters to politicians is reached, then it is possible that legislation can be changed to end the war.

Greeks for Peace have an advantage in influencing businessmen, alumni and other members of the community because fraternal affiliation puts forth a better impression than violent radicalism

Pi Beta Phi is reaching outward, as are the other Greeks on this campus, and as a result we are growing and maturing into constructively active, thinking citizens.

Welthy H. Fisher Honored With Humanitarian Award–1970

SHE's done it again! Whether or not it was the most notable award she has ever received, it was certainly the most glamorous!

On the night of April 30th, in the somewhat unlikely setting of Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, Welthy Honsinger Fisher, New York Alpha, received Variety Clubs International's 1970 Humanitarian Award from the hands of movie star Cary Grant.

She's in good company. Previous winners include Winston Churchill, Helen Keller, Herbert Hoover, George Washington Carver, Dr. Jonas Salk, and Albert Schweitzer.

Approximately 1,000 guests, mostly from the entertainment world, gathered to honor Mrs. Fisher's life's work. It was the latest of many such honors accorded Mrs. Fisher, including the first Nehru Literacy Award, presented by the Indian Adult Education Association in 1968.

Mrs. Fisher is founder of Literacy House in Lucknow, India, and president of World Education, Inc., New York. Literacy House is a non-sectarian institution, established in 1953 as a comprehensive training campus for teachers, writers, and village leaders. It believes that the problems of India demand that literacy be actively related to food production, family planning, and the other pressing needs of the masses in the villages. Puppets, publications, village libraries, and other media are used to make training teachers in functional literacy "come alive." Educators from around the world come to study

In May, thousands of young people around the United States walked some 30 miles on International Walk Day, raising funds for projects all over the world combating hunger, overpopulation and illiteracy. Welthy volunteered to walk along with them in one of the cities that has supported Literacy House or some other World Education project. She didn't expect to make quite the whole 30 miles, since she fell and cracked her pelvis in February. However, it will take more than another cracked bone or two to dampen the spirit of Welthy Fisher—even in her 92nd year!

One of our newest members, Marjie Kornfeld, was just elected Phi Delta Theta Sweetheart. It is an honor for Marjie and for us.



Karen Is Active On Three Fronts



Mrs. Thora L. Gatwood, recreational director of Groveport, Ohio, was scholarship recipient of the Columbus, Ohio, Alumnæ Club last summer. A few months ago she was selected Outstanding Leathercrafter of Ohio for 1970, earning over three times as many points as her nearest competitor. Recently she was put in charge of the craft program for all six senior citizens' centers of Columbus. She will attend Arrowmont again this summer, receiving another scholarship from the Columbus club.

Art Major Works With Juvenile Court

Joseph B. Martin, Arrowmont scholarship recipient last summer from the St. Louis Junior Alumnæ Club, was responsible for setting up the arts and crafts program for the St. Louis County Juvenile Court about three years ago. He works with children from 9 to 16 years of age, with never more than seven to a class. The aim of the program is to give these children a freedom of expression through their creativity in individual projects. The freedom of expression is something they have never had before. Since the classes are held twice a day, afternoon and evening, the teacher almost becomes a psychiatrist. He finds that hostility in the children often prevents true accomplishments.

An art major at Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Mo., Mr. Martin had had experience in many areas. However, learning macrame and cloisonne at Arrowmont were particularly interesting to him.

In writing of his Arrowmont stay, Mr. Martin says, "Experience is skill or knowledge gained by actually doing, feeling or finding out a thing. Two weeks at Arrowmont meant all of these to me. Up until the day that I arrived, I had long forgotten just what it meant to experience total expression. My job as Art and Crafts instructor is interesting and challenging work. But Arrowmont gave me a chance to express myself fully, and to work with others doing the same.

"The physical plant and beautiful grounds were truly inspirational. The knowledge gained in the varied arts and crafts seemed to stimulate everyone to produce, not only because it was expected, but because it became a part of you to

grasp all that was within reach.

"It was an experience to work with all ages, and not recognize the age—only recognizing different people willing to share something beautiful.

"My job allows me to express myself, but my expression sometimes limits the student. Experience at Arrowmont reminded me that all who are involved with arts and crafts must be allowed to express themselves—teacher and student alike. This expression that Arrowmont allows is an experience that has given me new perspective in the arts and crafts."



Note In Teapot Tells History

But such is not the case with the little teapot that has been sitting in the break-front in the Texas Alpha house for the past 20 years, virtually unnoticed. Now, however, the little teapot has come into its own, and occupies a place of honor, in the house and in the hearts of Texas Alpha Pi Phis.

Last February, Grand President Sarahjane Vanasse enjoyed lunch with Texas Alpha. An additional chapter guest was Dorothy Jones Birdwell, former director of alumnæ advisory committees. The little teapot attracted the attention of the ladies, and when no one seemed to know anything about it, curiosity determined that it should be checked. From that moment on, the little brown, color-banded teapot became a priceless piece of antiquity.

Inside was a faded, almost illegible note in script which read:

How To Get a Job

Take Inventory of Yourself

So, now it's time to get a job, begin a career, or just make a little extra money! Whatever the motivation, there are some fundamental choices and decisions involved. No matter your age or where you are in your college career, you have had some testing which attempted to determine the life work for which you are best suited. But sometimes your innate ability and your developed interest are not one and the same.

Thus, it's wise to take a personal inventory before setting out on a job hunt. This means taking stock of your basic interests, the things you enjoy doing, the situations which are most pleasant. Do you particularly like to be around children or elderly persons? Or perhaps the age group is unimportant so long as people are involved. Do you like working with a group, or would you rather help with planning where fewer people are included? Or, do you find you are happiest completely by yourself—reading, studying or walking?

Some work and career situations are geared for persons liking to work secluded or in limited number groups. But most livelihoods today are earned in contact with all age groups representing all levels of a complex and heterogeneous civilization. For work in "people" situations a first step is for you to evaluate your own potential of compatability as honestly and objectively as possible. (If you'd like help with this, you can take the test provided on page 37.—Editor.)

Before the Job Interview

There are four major public sources for job information. 1. College and university placement bureaus, 2. Private employment agencies (which may charge a fee or percentage of the first month's salary), 3. State employment agencies which offer free service, plus testing and counseling in many states, 4. Newspaper advertisements.

When you find a job which you feel you would like to investigate further, an appointment may be set up for you through a placement group, or it may be up to you to arrange your own interview. In either case, it is to your advantage to compile some information on yourself before the appointment, and, in the case of a company some distance away, to submit a personal dossier by mail.

Your compilation, neatly typed, should include the following information: legal name; permanent address; name of parents; whether parents are living or deceased and if there is a guardian; educational background with names of all schools and years attended; extracurricular activities or honors received in school; any practical experience, whether compensated by money or not, and including summer jobs or part time jobs on campus; complete names and addresses of any past employers and the dates of employment; and complete names and addresses of four or five character witnesses or references. The complete title and position of these persons should be given. They should be responsible persons, well thought of, who can vouch for your reputation. Be sure that you never use a person's name for a personal reference without first asking his or her permission.

Now, do some investigating on your own. Find out something about the firm, or employer, with whom you have made the appointment. Talk to people who work or have worked for the company. Invariably, in every interview the applicant will be asked, "Why do you want to work with us?" An answer which tells the in-

terviewer you cared enough to investigate will indicate your sincere interest. Be certain to let the interviewer know if any relatives of yours have ever, or presently work with that employer.

The Actual Interview

The first contact you have with the future employer or his representative should begin as pleasantly as possible. To create the proper business atmosphere *be on time!* If something beyond your control prevents being punctual or keeping the appointment, contact the interviewer as soon as possible.

The first impression is most important. Dress neatly and appropriately. Be attractive but not an attraction! Some girls have the mistaken belief that the "bizarre" attracts attention and singles them out of the crowd as individualists. Some girls also think that the low neckline, the short tight skirt and the provocative dress will land the job. In both cases, experienced employers and interviewers know that this type of girl causes contention, disrupts work and creates situations which do not improve personal relationships or work output.

Do wear business attire, a tailored dress or suit, appropriate shoes and runless hose. Carry a reasonably sized purse. Keep make-up to a minimum. Few girls wear hats these days but be sure your hair is clean and neatly done as a part

of your over-all appearance.

You probably will be asked to fill out a form application by a receptionist before the actual interview. Fill in all of the blanks as accurately and neatly as possible with a pen. The manner in which this application is completed is taken into consideration when a job decision is made.

Now for the interview! Introduce yourself by your complete name. Nicknames may sound more familiar, but "Babs," "Tootsie" or "Mitsy" hardly are business-like in the workworld. Be seated only when you are asked to be seated. Answer questions fully, offering information. Don't make the interviewer pull the information out of you. Coyness is not an attribute, but neither is loquaciousness. Stay on the beam of the conversation without side discussions which add nothing to the purpose and sometimes distract.

If you smoke, do not do so until asked. It would definitely be better not to smoke for

practical reasons. Concern over where to put ashes and leaning across a desk for an ashtray do not add up to personal composure.

Sometimes interviewers arrange to be, or by chance are, called out of the room. Remember to remain seated or if reading material is available, read it, but do not wander around, leave the room or examine the contents of the interviewer's desk.

Perhaps you think a person should ask about "fringe" benefits such as overtime, vacations, coffee breaks and insurance benefits. This is important, but not during the first interview. Your interest during the interview should be on what skills, knowledge and training you have to offer in return for monetary compensation commensurate with your offering. If an employer has something "extra" to offer he usually tells you with great pride without having to be asked.

Don't let the interview drag. The interviewer may be waiting for you to terminate it to evaluate your business acumen. Either a decision will be made or he will contact you later. If the latter is the case, thank your interviewer for his time and tell him you will be looking forward to hearing from him. Leave with a pleasant, "I'm so glad to have met you" or just "Thank you."

Remember each interview gives you additional experience in how to conduct yourself to your best advantage. So don't be disappointed if you do not get that first job applied for. Your interviewer is much more experienced than you and knows what he needs and who would be most efficient and compatible in his job. So bow to his better judgment and look for other openings and opportunities.

You will do well to evaluate privately each of the jobs you apply for in the following terms:

Immediate Concerns: Is the job suitable for your talents, ability, experience and interest? . . . What about transportation and proximity to your living facilities? . . . What is the cost of living in the surrounding area? . . What is the actual salary plus any other compensations or expense allowance (in some hospitals, schools and businesses "food at cost" cafeterias are maintained for personnel)? . . . Are work surroundings pleasant? . . . What type of clothing is needed and will there be extra cost involved? . . . Is a car necessary for the work? . . . Does the firm or concern provide low-cost participating insurance for both health and retirement? . . .

Is there provision for compensation during short term illnesses?

Long Range Concerns: Does the position offer a chance for advancement? . . . Does it provide training or needed experience? . . . Will you be able to use outstanding or experimental equipment? . . . Does it offer opportunities in different areas of the career or profession? . . . Does it provide adequate opportunity for leisure time, including vacation? . . . Does it offer stimulating co-workers with whom you share a common interest? . . . Does the position provide some social opportunities? . . . In the geographical area are there available cultural activities or special sports? . . . Would the work give you a feeling of accomplishment and of making a worthwhile contribution to society?

All during this time you can also practice interviewing. Practice on your friends, or, if you are in a chapter house, arrange demonstrations. Ask representatives from the school placement bureau to come to an open meeting and give a program on job interviewing. Perhaps a professional model could give you tips on grooming and conduct. There are many experts within your reach willing to share their knowledge and experience just for the asking. But best of all, those of you currently on campus should begin as soon as possible to make the positive attributes a part of your everyday living. You will see that the social training and experience of group living and cooperation in a sorority have enhanced your value as a cooperative and courteous employee. Graciousness is needed in all human relationships whether during a faculty tea, or a 5th grade parents' meeting, a fraternity exchange, or a high-level meeting of your employer's district managers, a planning session for homecoming decorations or a conference report of a research project. Never forget that your actions and reactions toward people are in direct relationship to your degree of success as a well-adjusted human being.

Making Temporary Permanent

Well, now you have a job! Making real MONEY! How do you prove your value since you've been given this opportunity? There are two extremes to avoid. First, don't stand back, afraid of making a mistake, and do nothing until told to do something. There is nothing to be gained from asking questions—but KNOWL-

EDGE. Secondly, don't attempt to revise and streamline systems as an expert after a week at work.

If you have suggestions for improvement, they will be listened to in their time, taking the total work situation into consideration. Spend your effort more wisely by attempting to do your work well and adapting to the situation already existing. Be friendly and helpful to all, but make close friendships slowly and carefully. Ask questions—how else do you learn? Coworkers will be flattered to be asked for information.

The U. S. Department of Labor statistics tell us that over 90% of persons being fired from jobs (professional, clerical and skilled labor) were not requested to leave because their knowledge or skills were found wanting. They lost their respective positions and jobs because they were incompatible with co-workers—in other words, they could not get along with people.

Assess your personal habits and find if you have some which might be irritating or distracting to persons working in close contact with you. Try to recall those things which irritated you about other girls when you were living in a dorm, or which caused contention during social programs at the chapter house.

Let me list some "small" irritations (which are 99% responsible for loss of employment) and their remedies:

Selfish use of facilities—Learn to share fairly and equally.

Poor personal cleanliness—Practice good grooming.

Indifferent borrowing habits—Never borrow without permission and always return in good condition as soon as possible.

Careless smoking habits—Be neat.

Personal irresponsibility—Don't seek special favors or consideration. Regard promises the same as pledges; fulfill them. Learn to pitch in to get a job done.

Just a tip for wise handling of money. Credit is precious and a person's credit rating is considered as a character reference. Don't let "money in the hand" give you illusions of grandeur. Overspending with inability to pay will soon be called to the attention of your employer, which is often followed by subsequent loss of employment.

Now that you as a person are in tune with the vibrations of the work-world, let's also take a look at progress and advancement. Take advantage of any additional training possible. Sometimes your employer will have special training programs. Perhaps a night school or correspondence course would increase your possibility of advancement or branching out into another facet of your career. Just taking any training in itself indicates your desire to improve and the impact of this is never lost on an employer.

Constant looking for "greener pastures" does not go along with self-improvement, though. This "never satisfied" feeling can lead to jobhopping and a prospective employer views a record of this type with much apprehension. Consider a new job offer with great concern, weighing all pros and cons. Discuss it with your employer and when you have made a decision, give him plenty of time to replace you. Personal stability is much to be admired, and your employer has earned your consideration for the courtesy of a notice.

With all of these "do's," "don'ts," "pleases" and "avoids" whirling about in your head, let's add one more thought: The world is full of ordinary, average people doing ordinary, average and "it'll get by" kinds of jobs. Be the unusual, do the extraordinary, sometimes "go the extra mile." You will be happier as well as appreciated, and more likely to succeed.

Score: Your score on the quiz is the total of points you have recorded in the affirmative column. A perfect score, indicating a desirable compatability with people, would by 96. If you score less than 50 Yes-points this indicates a need for some definite re-evaluation of personality based on a long hard objective look at yourself. At 75 Yes-points, you are in an area in which a person can adapt herself to her surroundings. The potential for success increases with the rising number of points.

Job Prospects, 1971

So, you are looking for a job right now!

The outlook for 1971-1972 is mixed. Surveys show that, despite a great deal of uncertainty as to changes in economic conditions, companies in the business field are planning to hire 11% more college women graduates than in 1970. In teaching, where two out of five college women usually find their jobs, the supply of teachers continues to surpass the demand for them.

The figures on business and industry come from the survey of trends in employment of college and university graduates conducted annually by Frank S. Endicott, director of placement, Northwestern University. Reports were made by 191 companies, representing 25 states, that recruit on college campuses. Women, however, normally must secure jobs not through campus interviews but by application.

Greatest opportunities (and the greatest lack of qualified women applicants) are listed as being in the fields of accounting, engineering and data processing. Somewhat lesser needs are mentioned in mathematics, general business, chemistry, marketing and economics (finance).

Starting salaries for women may be up this year—perhaps as much as 4%. Some companies did admit in the survey that lower salaries for college women than men show "discrimination and prejudice" and an unenlightened attitude

of management, but suggested that "for identical jobs with identical skill and preparation, (male and female) salaries are generally comparable."

Women's Lib might also notice that several companies mentioned other factors having to do with women's attitudes which they feel limit pay: Women apply for and accept jobs with less pay . . . Women only want short employment . . . Women believe they cannot do the job as well as men . . . Women prefer jobs with less responsibility . . . Women are not really committed to competing directly with men . . . Women are unwilling to relocate or travel. Also, women's salaries would increase if they became more skilled in needed, specialized fields.

Though, in teaching, the beginner's salary is up slightly (perhaps from an average of \$6,600 to \$6,800), unfortunately the 1970 squeeze on jobs is continuing. According to a September 1970 National Education Association report, while the supply of public school teachers continues at a record level, the demand is at the lowest point in at least 16 years. On the state level, Illinois has reported that only 5,839 beginning teachers were employed 1970-71 as compared with 15,515 the year before.

In fact, a NEA survey of the states showed all having a substantial number of qualified applicants for teaching vacancies in 1970. Only Georgia and South Dakota reported some shortage of applicants. Oregon showed some excess of applicants while Arizona, Colorado, Minnesota and Washington showed a substantial excess. Most other states lay in between with an excess in some subject areas, a shortage in other.

It is in the shortage areas that the 1971 graduate will have the best luck in securing teaching jobs. Even though the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for Illinois predicts "a teacher surplus will probably exist in 1971-72," he excepts the specialty areas of "special, vocational and health education," where the demand is greater than the supply. In addition, 67 of the nation's largest school systems reported to the NEA extreme difficulty in 1970 in filling positions with qualified applicants in the following fields: industrial arts; special education; mathe-

matics; trade, industrial, vocational; natural and physical sciences; physical education (women); remedial reading, speech, etc.; elementary (regular instruction). There was also a need in many states for elementary school librarians, guidance counselors and teachers for the educational disadvantaged. Especially overcrowded fields were high school English and social studies.

All of which suggests to one university placement director that the 1971 college woman graduate should run, not walk, to the nearest phone and use this, instead of the mail, for making an appointment for a job interview, either in business or education—and heed well, when applying for the job, the procedures given in the accompanying article on How To Get a Job.
