Albert Schweitzer, on Looking Back

ONE THING STIRS ME when I look back at my youthful days, namely, the fact that so many people gave me something or were something to me without knowing it. Such people, with whom I have, perhaps, never exchanged a word, yes, and others about whom I have merely heard things by report, have had a decisive influence upon me; they entered into my life and became powers within me. Much that I should otherwise not have felt so clearly or done so effectively was felt or done as it was, because I stand, as it were, under the sway of these people. Hence I always think that we all live, spiritually, by what others have given us in the significant hours of our life. These significant hours do not announce themselves as coming, but arrive unexpected. Nor do they make a great show of themselves; they pass almost unperceived. Often, indeed, their significance comes home to us first as we look back, just as the beauty of a piece of music or of a landscape often strikes us first in our recollection of it. Much that has become our own in gentleness, modesty, kindness, willingness to forgive, in veracity, loyalty, resignation under suffering, we owe to people in whom we have seen or experienced these virtues at work, sometimes in a great matter, sometimes in a small. A thought which had become act sprang into us like a spark, and lighted a new flame within us.

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

Add to your list of Pi Phis who are among the Outstanding Young Women of America, Margaret Kelso Guchemand, Tennessee Gamma, who now lives in Baltimore, Md. Margaret is a music instructor at Essex Community College and is a soloist in a number of Baltimore churches.

Dorothy Buffum Chandler, who has been featured in The ARROW a number of times, has been named one of the ten highest-ranking women in big business by *Fortune* Magazine. Congratulations to both these fine women.

Did you know that women's lib has spawned at least one new product, the "Queen High Equality" deck of playing cards in which the "Queen is King" and the Jack is a princess called Jackie? That's according to a Lockheed Credit Union house organ.

Karen Stuck Is Awarded Fellowship

Karen Jean Stuck, Michigan Beta, has been named recipient of the Pi Beta Phi Fellowship in the amount of \$1,000. Karen, graduated from the University of Michigan "with highest distinction" in June, received a Bachelor of Science degree in zoology. In July she will enter Ohio State University's College of Medicine to pursue her medical degree.

Karen is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and has been co-secretary of Mortar Board. She received Class Honors each year, and as a freshman, was the recipient of a William J. Branstrom Freshman Prize for being in the upper



five percent of her class. She is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta, and while a freshman pharmacy student receive a Rho Chi Achievement Award. She has maintained an accumulative scholastic average of 3.77 on a 4.00 scale for her four years in pre-med studies. For eight months she worked as an independent research assistant in the Dental Research Institute at the university where she was engaged in some preliminary studies fundamental to progress in cancer research.

Karen's chapter activities include holding the offices of pledge scholarship chairman, chapter president, treasurer, and 1971 Convention delegate. She has served on the Panhellenic Council

and was treasurer of Persephones Consilium, a joint active-alumnæ governing body for the local Panhellenic. She also worked on the Soph Show and was a member of the 300 voice University Choral Union. During her 14 months as president of Michigan Beta, the chapter won the Director's Award for the fourth outstanding chapter in the country in 1971, and the Stoolman Vase for the second best chapter in 1972.

In writing about Karen, Sandra Dewar Bostwick, Michigan Beta AAC chairman, says, "... we have seldom seen a girl with Karen's ability and maturity who consistently grasped the essence of a situation and calmly led her chapter to solid conclusions." Margaret Krause Young, former Zeta Province president, used Karen's explanation of the I.C. program with all her province chapters.

Among phrases of commendation concerning Karen and her work were the following: "... one of the three best students in the class ... uniformly outstanding throughout the course ... success is due to an admixture of intelligence, organization, and hard work"; "... outstanding student, distinguished herself by her alertness, depth of perception, and breadth of understanding, all superior ... poised, dependable, and competent"; "... she was well liked by her classmates ... she struck me as someone who could handle a great deal of responsibility with poise and equilibrium."

In writing about her aspirations, Karen says, "Though I am not sure as to the kind of medicine I wish to practice, family medicine and pediatrics are certainly two that are most interesting to me. There is such a need for the general medical man in these days of highly-disciplined specialists, that I do feel a great sense of responsibility to the person who is without adequate medical attention. I think it would be most rewarding and enlightening to become part of a community that needs to be kept well.

"I've learned that it takes a team of people to light the way for progress and achievement, and whether that group is within a national sorority or is a health team, the same need for each other is present. Yet one person can give everything she has to make her part of the team something to build upon, and it is my hope that this is the kind of physician I will be. Only the years will tell, but my love of people and my desire to help them runs very deep."

Seventh Illinois Chapter Is Colonized

I. C. Sorosis was founded in 1867 in Monmouth, Ill. One hundred years later Pi Beta Co-op was founded at Normal, Ill., by ten girls seeking a cooperative living arrangement. In 1973 the seventh chapter in the founding province became a reality, the first province to cover that number of chapters.

The Greek name of the colony, Pi Beta, was derived from the initials of President Robert G. Bone, head of Illinois State University in 1967. Pi Beta was established with high academic, civic, and social ideals that are still pursued today.

Holding the award for highest grade point average among the Greek women's houses, Pi Beta stresses the importance of a good education. Often social and civic functions are combined as Greeks on the I.S.U. campus hold benefits and sponsor fund-raising drives for charity. Other activities of this school year include a breakfast for the Chicago Cubs, an ecology drive, taking Christmas baskets of food and clothing to needy area families, and serenading and treating the nursing home next door on Halloween.

Based on the principles of cooperative and democratic living, Pi Beta is unique in that all its members contribute to its management. In addition to cooking and housekeeping, Pi Beta girls quickly learn such arts as antiquing furni-

ture and fixing blown fuses. Most importantly, the women of Pi Beta have learned to live and work together to achieve a feeling of true sisterhood.

Pi Beta Co-op became a colony of Pi Beta Phi on March 23. Twenty actives and eight pledges were installed as Pi Beta Phi pledges on May 5 at the home of Mary Ann Way Lauder in Bloomington, followed by a luncheon at the Bloomington Country Club.

There are six other local sororities or co-ops on the Illinois State University campus. Delta Zeta and Alpha Gamma Delta recently installed chapters there, and many other National Panhellenic Conference groups are working with various locals to establish chapters of national sororities. There are twelve men's nationals on campus. The University has an enrollment of 18,000 students, with approximately 9,500 women. 97% of the enrollment is from the state of Illinois.

The pledging ceremony was conducted by Elizabeth Frushour Hill, Grand Corresponding Secretary, assisted by Dorothy Baker McFadden, Mu Province President; Ida Jane Spicer Sharpe, Mu South Alumnae Province President; and Marjorie Deetz Early, Mu North Alumnae Province President. Representatives from the six other Illinois active chapters were present.

Kansas Alpha Holds Centennial Reunion

More than 400 members of Kansas Alpha gathered in Lawrence, Kansas, the weekend of March 31, to celebrate the golden anniversary of the chapter.

Chartered as Kappa chapter of I.C. Sorosis on April 1, 1873, it was so called until the national organization took its Greek motto for its name in 1888, and the Lawrence chapter became Kansas Alpha of Pi Beta Phi. The chapter was installed by Sara A. Richardson, a Pi Phi from Lombard College and sister of three of the charter members, who included: Hannah Oliver, Clara Morris, Lizzie Yeagley, Vina Lambert, Gertrude Boughton, and Flora, May, and Alma Richardson.

Kansas Alpha was the first fraternity for women established on the Kansas University campus; and the chapter has other important firsts to its credit: the charter members had the first cooky-shine, an informal party which has become a Pi Beta Phi institution; the first issue of *The ARROW* was published by Kansas Alpha in May, 1885; the first home of the chapter was the first house to be built on the K.U. campus especially for fraternity women. It was built in 1906. Prior to that time, the girls lived in boarding houses. The first house was outgrown by 1914, and a new one to house 24 girls was built. An addition to it was built in 1928, and that structure served the chapter until 1962 when it moved to its present home where 70 coeds live.

In 1954, Kansas Alpha started the Pi Beta Phi Educational Foundation at K.U. from which gift scholarships are awarded annually to university women.

Plans for the Kansas Alpha reunion were begun last September by Jane Griffith Stevens of Lawrence, and Rose McColloch Dressler of Kansas City, Mo. They were assisted by many Pi Phi alumnae from the Lawrence and Kansas City clubs, and by members of the active chapter. Activities began with a cooky-shine at the chapter house with the actives in charge, on Saturday evening. Here everyone met old and dear friends, toured the chapter house, and viewed

the large display of Arrowcraft items offered for sale by Sally Fitzpatrick Postma, the Lawrence club's award-winning Arrowcraft chairman. During the buffet supper, some of the girls led groups of alumnae, who were scattered throughout the house, in singing many old favorite Pi Phi songs.

On Sunday, the centennial reunion luncheon was held in the Kansas Union ballroom with tables decorated in wine and blue with carnations centered on each table. Following the luncheon, Marilyn Sweet Kiene, mistress of ceremonies, began the program with words of welcome and presentation of a lovely engraved silver bowl to Jane Griffith Stevens in appreciation of all her work. That was just the beginning for Jane! Martha Keefe Griffith then announced that Jane had been selected as the Xi province winner of the Evelyn Peters Kyle Angel Award. She was nominated by the Lawrence Alumnae Club for her many years of service as an officer in the club, as member of the advisory board for the active chapter, secretary and then treasurer of the Kansas Association of Pi Beta Phi, and finally as advisor to that group. She has worked tirelessly since September, 1972, to ensure the success of the centennial celebration. Margaret Seybold Hill, Angel Award chairman of the Lawrence club, presented Jane with a small gold angel charm from the club.

Joan Darby Edwards, chairman of the centennial gift committee, announced the selection of a lovely antique chest to house the Balfour Cup, which has been awarded to Kansas Alpha five times; a daguerreotype case which holds many old Fraternity badges, including some I.C. pins; and a new porch swing for the chapter house.

Chapter Breaks Campus Tradition To Win Dickinson President's Cup

For the members of Pennsylvania Gamma and returning alumnæ, homecoming at Dickinson meant more than a football game and a concert last year. Each year at homecoming the President's Cup is awarded by President Howard Rubendall to the outstanding fraternity on campus. The award has traditionally been awarded to one of the ten national fraternities on campus, but this year, for the first time in the 200-year history of Dickinson, the competition was extended to include the three sororities. The winner was announced during the half-time activities of the football game—Pi Beta Phi!!!

The competition for President's Cup is based on four categories: scholarship, extracurricular activities, campus involvement, and community service. Each fraternal organization submits an application stating qualifications in these areas.

Pi Phi was found to be ranked second academically among the thirteen fraternities and sororities, with an overall grade point average of 3.25. Individually the members of Pennsylvania Gamma are active in all areas of extracurricular activity, including sports, music, student government, and clubs, as well as considerable involvement in the community. The chapter as a whole enjoys excellent relations with the college administration, and participates in campus activities and events, from Sigma Chi Derby Day to the college's bicentennial celebration. Pennsylvania Gamma also extends itself in service to the Carlisle community with such activities as parties at an orphanage, aiding paper drives, and babysitting at the Y.W.C.A. The application also included space for an evaluation of social and pledge programs, and even an opportunity to mention the winning of Derby Day!

The sisters were very proud to receive this recognition and it was indeed a smiling group of faces that carried the silver cup to the Pi Phi rooms after the football game. More than this, we were proud to be the first women's fraternity to receive this award, especially in the first year that women were permitted to enter the competition! Our enthusiasm in this respect was




President Vicki Sweetser, Pennsylvania Gamma, holds the President's Cup, awarded at Homecoming, 1972.

Heirloom Arrows Given To Fraternity

Two beautiful arrows have been presented to the national Fraternity to be held in the possession of the Grand President. The smaller official badge was presented to Grand President Sally Vanasse at the Purdue Workshop by Mary Taggart Timmcke, Lambda Province President. It had been the president's badge at Wisconsin Beta, and the following information was given by Elizabeth Arneman Hutchison.

"Anna Lytle Tannahill was dean of women at Beloit College when I entered in 1921. She had just completed her term as Grand President of Pi Beta Phi and was a charming, gracious lady. She always wore the beautiful pin when she came to Pi Phi functions, which was often.

"She was a widow with no children. During my senior year she resigned as dean of women and married the president of the college, Melvin A. Brannon, who had been a widower for many years. You can imagine what a stir that caused!


"After her death, he gave her lovely pin to the Wisconsin Beta chapter. The chapter president wore it and passed it on to her successor. You can imagine how pleased I was when my daughter was chapter president in 1952 and she had the privilege of wearing it for a year.

"We feel that the badge should belong to the Grand President from now on. Of course, we hope so much that our Wisconsin Beta will be active again some day."

For 21 years the members of Tennessee Beta and the Nashville Alumnae Club of Pi Beta Phi have shown their civic interest and philanthropic concern by helping the Bill Wilkerson Hearing and Speech Center in Nashville, Tenn. In 1961 an enormous project was undertaken. A large auditorium was rented, and a unique bazaar called "Christmas Village" was held with great success. Each year since, Christmas Village has been an outstanding feature of the holiday season in Nashville. (See *The Arrow*, Spring, 1970)


In 1963, with the cooperation of her family, she went back to school and earned her masters degree in counseling at the University of Akron.

her chapter. Kentucky Beta is very proud of Cyb and Tricia and all of their sisters are looking forward to following their careers and accomplishments.


Alumna Receives Engineering Award

On Saturday, March 31, two hundred and ten girls attended High School Day. The event was held at the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity house and featured a slide show of sorority girls in both candid and posed shots. The slide show was presented with a brief talk on sorority and campus life given by Diana and the Panhellenic president. The talk stressed the love shared in a sorority and within Panhellenic. The importance of the individual within the structure of sorority living was also highlighted. Sorority life was presented as one of many life styles to choose from in a college environment, but as a unique sharing experience. After the slide presentation, the girls were split into twelve groups, each going to one of the twelve sorority houses on the campus, where they enjoyed do-it-yourself sundaes with the members of various sororities.

High School Day was an innovative and successful event for both the active sorority members and potential rushees. The members of the California Gamma chapter are proud of the fact that the inspiration and initiative for the idea came from one of our own members.

Mother, Daughter Share Initiation Day

For the first time in Texas Alpha history, the traditions of initiation experienced some changes.

Early in the year, the chapter voted to initiate the junior members of the pledge class in November rather than in March. The chapter also voted to initiate a mother and daughter simultaneously.



Arrowmont Identified

Have you ever been to Gatlinburg, Tennessee? Gatlinburg is a small tourist town which lies at the foot of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Each year 8 million visitors pass through this small town. Many of them miss seeing our legacy to mankind—the Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts. The Arrowmont School is the continuation of a teaching tradition started by our Fraternity in 1912.

Arrowmont School (3) is open during the summer months and teaches courses ranging from textiles and spinning to jewelry and woodwork. The students are of many different ages and many different backgrounds. These students have one thing in common, however, they love to create and to be useful. The atmosphere here lends itself to creativity. The Fraternity has about 50 acres of undeveloped land where students and faculty can enjoy the beauty and serenity of the mountains. Yet they are only a few steps away from downtown Gatlinburg should they prefer a change of pace.

Arrowmont is located in the heart of downtown Gatlinburg. The Arrowcraft Shop (1) is a retail store which sells only handmade area crafts. The Administrator's Office (2) is located on the main street. Mrs. Helen Lewis has been the Administrator of Arrowmont since October, 1971. She does a marvelous job of "ruling" this 67 acre domain.

The present Arrowmont building (3) was completed in 1970. The Staff House (4) is just as the name implies, the house where the staff lives. This presently includes Mrs. Lewis, the Administrator, and Mrs. Riddle, Assistant Administrator. The Staff House is also the dining room for summer school. The dining room can seat 104 people.

Students who attend summer school at Arrowmont are not always lucky enough to find housing on campus. There is a definite need for more dormitories. As the picture clearly shows there is land to build on but we have no money to build with. The ultimate goal of our Fraternity is to make Arrowmont a year around school. In order to accomplish this there must be more housing. There are three rustic houses which are used as dormitories, they are Stuart (5), Pollard (6), and Teachers (7). The Red

Barn (8) located very close to the Staff House was remodeled in 1949 to provide housing for students. Thus we have a new school which can accommodate 134 students and housing facilities for only 80 students. At the present time the urgent need is for more housing.

As you tour the country this summer, come to Gatlinburg and tour Arrowmont. Mrs. Lewis or Mrs. Riddle will be happy to show you around. Each Pi Phi should learn to appreciate what her Fraternity is doing to bridge the generation gap, and we should all strive to make Arrowmont a school which operates all through the year.

Workshop Brings 135 to Arrowmont

During the first week in April, Arrowmont and the Department of Crafts and Interior Design of the University of Tennessee presented a workshop for the Art In Home Economics Association.

Co-chairmen for the event were Arrowmont's Director, Marian G. Heard, and David Van Dommelen, Associate Professor from Pennsylvania State University.

Undergraduate students, graduate students, and faculty members from colleges of home economics all across the country and Canada filled the nine different craft classes. The members of the organization were so enthusiastic that they voted to hold another workshop at Arrowmont some time next spring.

There were 135 people registered as students, plus 17 staff and faculty members. Since school housing facilities are limited, many of these people had to find housing at nearby motels.

Hopefully Arrowmont can continue to host such workshops and conferences in increasing numbers in the future.

Helen Lewis Plans Gatlinburg Retirement

Helen Anderson Lewis, Kentucky Alpha, came to Gatlinburg in October, 1971, to accept a temporary appointment as administrator of Arrowmont and Arrowcraft. In April, 1972, she agreed to stay on as administrator until September 1, 1973. Those who have come to know Helen in Gatlinburg are happy to learn that she plans to live on in Gatlinburg after her retirement in September.

Helen has given many years of service to Pi Phi. Her career as a loyal Pi Phi started when she was a charter member of Kentucky Alpha at the University of Louisville, serving as treasurer and as vice president. After graduation, Helen immediately became active in the Louisville Alumnae Club, and following her marriage to Benjamin Lewis, moved to Indianapolis where she continued to be active in the Fraternity, serving as treasurer and vice president of the Indianapolis club.

After nine years as vice president of the old Delta Province (during which she and her family moved to Detroit), Helen became province president, making frequent visits to the Indiana and Michigan chapters.

In 1950 Helen was elected to Grand Council as director of rushing and pledge training, and

in 1958 became director of membership. While on Grand Council she served as NPC alternate and evolved the colonization plan which is still in practice. In 1960, she left Grand Council to serve as national convention guide, where she served until 1970.

During the years as an officer, she was in charge of or assisted at the colonization of the following chapters: Alabama Beta and Gamma, Texas Delta, Colorado Gamma, Michigan Delta, Kentucky Beta, and Ohio Eta. She attended installations of Ohio Eta, Indiana Zeta, Michigan Delta, Ohio Zeta, Kentucky Beta, Michigan Gamma, and Indiana Epsilon. Helen has attended 19 conventions and has visited approximately 75 chapters.

Helen is proud of her two married daughters, one a Pi Phi, and her eight grandchildren. Along with her interest in her family and Pi Phi, Helen, an accomplished pianist, has found time for her music and church work, for gardening, knitting, and bridge. She is not always serious, either, but can be counted on to join in the fun and frivolity when the occasion arises. In fact, the life that Helen leads exemplifies the ideals of Pi Phi.

Scholarship Recipient Lauds Arrowmont

Mary Rae, Milwaukee, Wisc., was the recipient of the Brendel Scholarship to Arrowmont for the 1972 Summer Workshop. Mary is Curator of School Programs for the Milwaukee Art Center. As such she gives color slide presentations in schools, and develops instructional art resources for educators.

In response to a request for her thoughts on Arrowmont, Mary wrote, "I was so pleased to have received the Brendel Scholarship.

"I have been doing some textile printing since my session at Arrowmont; however, the greatest help has been in my work here in the Milwaukee Art Center. The whole environment at Arrowmont, and even the indirect inspiration derived from other work being done there, has given me increased understanding and appreciation of contemporary crafts that has been directly applied to the in-class presentations (color slide lectures) that I give in the Milwaukee area schools. Specifically, my courses in textile printing and craft media have helped me with my program entitled "Fibers," a program showing the contemporary fabric constructions

and textile designs of Wisconsin design-craftsmen.

"More recently, on March 23, 1973, the Milwaukee Art Center opened an exhibition entitled **FIBERS: CONTEMPORARY REVIVALS** which I planned as an educational exhibition for school groups as well as the general public. The exhibition features the contemporary works of nine Wisconsin artist—craftsmen working in the fiber media. Three of them, Joan Michaels Paque, Sister Remy Revor, and Richard Daehner, have been instructors at Arrowmont. The fiber techniques are illustrated and explained with reference to their historic origins on instructional panels that accompany the contemporary pieces. From this exhibition, another instructional resource will be developed in the form of color slides with an accompanying text to be used by teachers. My in-class presentation, "Fibers," will be revived also.

"With this exhibition we hope to spread the same enthusiasm for the fiber field as was exuded at Arrowmont last summer!"



Passover and the 25th anniversary of Israel's Independence in May are being celebrated at the Salvador Dali Museum in Cleveland, Ohio, with the graphic display of two Dali suites, "Aliyah, The Rebirth of Israel," and "Song of Songs."

The Dali Museum is the only permanent exhibition of works by a single living artist in America. It is owned by A. Reynolds Morse, president of a Cleveland engineering firm, and his wife, Eleanor Reese Morse, Florida Gamma, and is operated in the public interest as an educational project. At any one time, from 50 to 55 Dali oils, 60-75 Dali drawings and water colors, plus 100-200 Dali graphics are on exhibit. Salvador Dali himself was present for the inauguration of the museum in March, 1971.

Eleanor Morse studied singing in Italy and received her Bachelor of Music degree from Rollins College. It was only a step from the love of music to a consuming enthusiasm for Dali's art.

A Master of Fine Arts degree in French and the knowledge of Italian and Spanish necessary

for her vocal work have proved invaluable in translating several of Dali's recent texts.

The Morses first saw Dali's art in a 1941 show of the painter's early works assembled by the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Fascinated, they began to collect his works, and first met the artist in March, 1943. Their many Dali memories include a three-day transcontinental train trip with the artist; a lecture tour with him in 1950; and countless meetings over the years at his home in Catalonia, in Paris, Rome, Madrid, New York, and Rotterdam.

Mrs. Morse feels that her friendship with Dali over the past 30 years and the gradual acquisition of 93 of his paintings and hundreds of other works have enriched the lives of both her and her husband.

The Dali Museum, located in the IMS Building in Beachwood, a suburb of Cleveland, is open to the public without charge and is privately run. It was conceived and is run primarily for the dedicated individual who is interested in seeing Dali's work as a serious artist,

Former Staffer Is Honored By Ohio Alumni Association

Mary Lib is the daughter of George Starr Lasher, founder and first director of Ohio University's School of Journalism, and for 30 years editor of *The Rattle of Theta Chi*. During his terminal illness, Mary Lib edited *The Rattle*, and was the third woman to receive the national Theta Chi Appreciation Award for her labor of love.

Mrs. Lasher was nominated for the certificate of merit for the outstanding accomplishments in her career. She is free lancing currently, and editing the convention book for the 1973 Sigma Delta Chi national gathering in Buffalo next November.

Nasmyth told the Pi Phis of his experiences as a POW during the six years after he was captured.

"The biggest risk I took as a POW was trying to communicate with the other prisoners," Nasmyth related.

Nasmyth, an Air Force officer, had been a POW since Sept. 4, 1966. He noted that he had been placed in irons for punishment, after trying to teach a new POW a "tapping code" the prisoners used to communicate between the cell blocks. "A guy could tell you his whole life story through signals and tapping," Nasmyth said.

The torture the '65 through '68 prisoners received, Nasmyth stated, were for three reasons.

"Number one, they tortured us to demonstrate they could make us do anything they wanted. They had to show that they could break us.

"Number two, they did it to gain statements." The "statements" were forced confessions POWs made that they were war criminals and had been receiving good treatment from the North Vietnamese. In the statements, North Vietnamese had the POWs condemn fellow officers for their activities in the war. The names the POWs used for the condemned officers were obvious lies, such as "Clark Kent" and "Ben Casey." Nasmyth said the American press stood up laughing after the reading of these confessions. Later, he recounted, the men who had written these statements were put in irons and two were put to death, for making the North Vietnamese look ridiculous.

"Number three, some sadists tortured for torture's sake. They'd leave a guy tied up in irons like a pretzel for months."

Nasmyth, who is single, estimated at one point that 20% of the married POWs were served divorce papers before they got off the plane. "Some homecoming! I was reported dead

for three years. But, some wives didn't wait for their husbands, even when they knew they were alive."

When a Pi Phi asked how the Americans had treated North Vietnamese POWs, Nasmyth said, "I don't really know how we treated prisoners, I was never in South Vietnam. The South Vietnamese were in charge of the prisoners, however, and the Vietnamese invariably treated their own people worse than others."

Nasmyth then spoke about Lt. Calley and the My Lai massacre. "A war crime is a war crime and there is no justification for it. I'm sorry about it. A lot of people don't realize though, that every man, woman, and child is armed in North Vietnam."

Referring to Jane Fonda's denials that POWs were tortured, Nasmyth stated, "I'd like to take Jane Fonda back to Washington, D.C. Some of those men are grotesque looking. Not because of injuries, but because of medical butchery.

"The medical attention was very poor and backward," he said. "They didn't know anything about preventive medicine. After you got an infection, they would give you penicillin."

"The North Vietnamese also used medical treatment to bargain," Nasmyth said. "When I was first captured they let my injured arm go nine days without medical attention, until it became black and swollen. I was ready to cooperate at that point."

Nasmyth recounted that other men had been left in irons for such great lengths of time that "the irons had worn through their skin to the bones, and the skin began to grow over the top of the irons."

When asked about how well the prisoners of war looked, Nasmyth mused, "When people say 'My God, how good they look,' they should see how well some guys look with their clothes off. One guy's leg is three inches shorter than the other, because they never bothered to set his fracture. Another man's back had been beaten with a cat-o-nine-tails 700 times," Nasmyth said.

During his talk Nasmyth spoke about the poor food during his years as a POW. "I went down from 169 to 120 pounds." He noted that they were fed more after the 1969 POW cam-

paign, although it was still the same diet of fish, soup, and greens.

Nasmyth attributed better POW treatment from 1969 to 1972 to the billions of letters sent to Hanoi. "The North Vietnamese were heavily influenced by public opinion."

Nasmyth is one of the most highly publicized returning POWs, both before and after he was released. Nasmyth told how his sister, at the age of 20, flew to Paris in 1969 to ask the North Vietnamese delegation if her brother were alive or not. "She's a cute little girl, and she made the papers standing there crying while asking the delegates if I were alive or not. A month after she returned to California my family received a letter from the delegates that I was alive."

"My brother and his friends also made the news. They drove 'semis' from California to Washington, D.C., loaded with mail for the POWs. They then shipped the trucks, full of mail, to Paris. When the North Vietnamese delegates refused to take the mail to the POWs my brother and his friends backed the trucks up on the North Vietnamese Embassy lawn and dumped the tons of mail on it."

When Nasmyth returned to the states, a newspaper reporter asked him what musical groups he missed. "I told him that I used to like Sonny and Cher, and I hoped they were still around. When they heard this they sent me an invitation to be on their show. Cher is just as sexy in person as she is on television."

Nasmyth said that he was grateful for all the gifts he and other POWs received, but he felt that the other Vietnam veterans need recognition. He also plans to work on getting the other MIAs in Laos and Cambodia back, or at least get information as to their being alive or not.

He ended his talk on a pleasant note, mentioning his seven years back air force pay, with ten per cent interest. "Keep the goldiggers away, they don't have a chance," Nasmyth announced.

Three Named Maine Eagles

Recently, three Pi Phis from Maine Alpha at the University of Maine were selected to be sophomore Eagles. This is an honor organization designed to reflect the best images of the college. The girls are selected for their scholarship, dignity, character, friendliness, and dependability. They are Mary Scanlon, Cindy Rogers, and Rae Mathieu.



"If you plan on slides or films, be sure the operator knows how to operate the particular machine you'll be using so the pictures won't be upside down or on the ceiling or something. Also check to see that the amount of light in the room can be controlled."

A Chapter President Speaks To Pledges

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter was written by an unknown chapter president to an unknown chapter. It was passed on to The ARROW by the Grand Vice President of Collegians, Elizabeth Turner Orr, as being worthy of wider readership.)

As a voice of experience and authority, I am probably supposed to tell you what is going to happen to you as a result of four years in Pi Phi. I cannot do that because it would sound as if Pi Phi were a magic formula for changing your life. It is not that at all. I cannot begin to tell any of you what Pi Phi will do for you because each one of you must incorporate it into your own lives.

For some of you, Pi Phi may appear to be a superficial means of forced friendship. I would disagree with that statement. None of you is expected to strike up an immediate friendship with anyone in this group. But we do offer a chance to know some people whom otherwise you might not have known. I think the thing upon which Pi Phi is based is this opportunity for friendship. You were invited to join Pi Phi on the simple basis of: "We would like to be a friend of yours." I don't intimately know every member of this chapter, but working, laughing, and playing with many of them has led to the deepest friendships I know. They have made a difference in my life and that is the most anyone can expect to ask of a group.

For some of you, Pi Phi may connote a label of "sorority" with all the superficiality of giggling girls and flag-waving antics and the idea of selectivity attached as a nasty word. I am always very puzzled by exactly what "sorority" means. We do have some ritualistic ceremonies and "secret goodies" but I cannot honestly say that these recited words are what is holding this group together. They do add to the unity and closeness we have but we do not rely on them to make us the kind of group we are. What we *do* rely on and what we think sorority means is the recognition of each of you as a special individual and the hope that each of us can grow a little by knowing you. We are no more than a group of individuals and just because we have the brand "sorority" does not restrict us in any way. There is *no* reason in the world why we cannot get involved in helping poor children or contributing to campus activities. There is *no* reason why we cannot have picnics and retreats and slumber parties (Deans permitting, that

is!). After all, the group is no more than ourselves and as a group we can be an active force in whatever we choose.

Your ten weeks of pledging should be a time when you can experience all of these feelings and activities. No one is expecting you to suddenly change your life—we don't want that to happen. No one is going to reprimand you for not doing well on a test or not showing up for a meeting. I think the unique thing about Pi Phi is that we feel the importance of responsibility to the chapter, but more important, that you feel that responsibility to yourself because if you do not take advantage of all there is to gain in knowing these people, then *you* have denied yourself an opportunity which is at your fingertips.

I had not intended to sermonize, but I think this is perhaps the most important thing I have had to do as president—to make you feel that the money, the time, and the extra effort are minor in comparison to what you can gain from knowing people like Mary and Janie and anyone in the chapter. We are not asking you to live and eat and breathe Pi Beta Phi. We *are* asking you to look at yourselves and see not only what you can gain by association with it, but also what you can give of yourselves to its success.

When I was in your position as a pledge, I felt lost, embarrassed at not knowing enough names, unsure as to what I was getting into, especially when the president said, "You cannot act alone," and that we were all here to develop "a noble womanhood." I still am uncertain whether that is relevant, but what I did learn initially was that I belonged to a group that really cared about me for myself and expected no more than whatever I wanted to give. I have given for four years now because I am eternally grateful for all that Pi Beta Phi has given to me.





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
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
