## Dear Editor ...

### Who Would Have Thought . . . ?

Please tell me how I may get in touch with the Pi Phi women who live in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, and had the article in Winter 1976 ARROW . . .

I taught school in Kuala Lumpur May 1914—Feb. 1915. I am about the oldest Pi Phi, having been initiated into Iowa Alpha June 1910 at age 16. I did not graduate until 1916 because of taking time out to spend two years in what was then called Federated Malay States. We were not missionaries altho my father had been a Methodist minister, but he, my mother, and myself . . . went to teach in what was then called the American Mission. Both my parents had been high school and university teachers. We got travel and everything paid, and \$40.00 per month. My mother died in 1915 . . . she is buried in Singapore.

I am to speak at the March meeting of our alumnae club and am so glad I saw this article before doing so. I can't imagine the advancement there must be in the schools. The auditorium of the Methodist Girls School in Kuala Lumpur was named for my mother, Lucy Popham Zimmerman.

It took from March 17th to April 26th to sail by Japanese boat only from San Francisco to Hong Kong, where we trans-shipped to the French mail—stayed 1½ days in Saigon. All this in my time!!! . . .

I have two daughters and one granddaughter who are Iowa Alpha Phis, and four cousins who are Pi Phi elsewhere. Pi Phi has meant so very much to me . . . I hope to go to [Convention] in Minnesota.


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## off the *Arrow hook*

When they were adults and had families, they saw each other once and exchanged information about their children and their children's names. Since that time, we have lost track of each other and I would like to find her again. Perhaps one day we can meet since we have at least one common bond outside of family."

Says Molly, "I always have been proud to be a Pi Phi and knew my affiliation was something special—this experience has certainly reinforced that belief!"

Molly's daughter, an Alpha Chi at Central Michigan, remarked, "How great that this wonderful fraternal spirit I'm enjoying while in college continues after graduation!"

In a recent issue of that weekly picture magazine was a column about and picture of Anna Allen Zapp. We were scooped! Anna is a lost Tennessee Delta Pi Phi we've been trying to find so that we could do an *ARROW* story about her. # Fellowship Winner Designs For Elderly

Combining the fields of planning and architecture and applying the combination to her interest in elderly housing design and special services for the elderly is the goal of Gail Whitney, Ohio Zeta, recipient of the 1977 Pi Beta Phi Fellowship.



Gail was graduated from Miami University in Ohio in 1974 with a Bachelor's Degree in Home Economics. Her chapter activities resulted in her being named Outstanding Pi Phi Freshman and Outstanding Pi Phi Senior, with many offices and honors in between. Master's Degrees in City and Regional Planning and Architecture are currently being pursued at Harvard University in the Graduate School of Design. She is in the third year of a four and a half year program. During 1976-77 she was the recipient of the A.I.A./A.I.A. Foundation Scholarship, awarded each year by the American Institute of Architects to outstanding students in schools of architecture.

According to a former employer, "Gail has a rare combination of intellectual capability and strong personality. She possesses the unique quality of relating her expertise and background to people on all levels in a concise and acceptable fashion. She truly has a gift for working with people—the key to success in any profession—and she is able to provide direction and attain her employment goals, while maintaining good rapport with those persons

with whom she must work to achieve those goals."

Gail has received professional experience in both architecture and city planning. She received professional experience in the latter at the Newark, N.J., Redevelopment and Housing Authority. Her exposure to architecture came during the summer in Dallas, where she worked for a private firm doing commercial and residential architectural work.

Gail is putting herself through graduate school by tutoring architecture and planning in an undergraduate house. She provides academic counseling to freshmen on design related issues. She supports herself through private commissions for her designs for arts and crafts projects.

After graduating from Harvard, Gail intends to apply for a traveling fellowship in order to research in England and the Scandinavian countries where advanced programs for the elderly are now operating.

**Kay Bailey, Texas Alpha, has been named one of the Ten Outstanding Young Women of America for 1976. Kay is a vice-chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board and a former member of the Texas House of Representatives. The Safety Board investigates major accidents and promotes safety in surface, air, rail, marine, and pipeline transportation. The award was presented in November at a luncheon in Washington, D. C.**

Relaxing? Only dreamers could anticipate relaxation for them, as the two girls described are Pi Beta Phi's Traveling Graduate Counselors for 1977-78.

Roxann Goertz, Minnesota Alpha, and Kathy Taylor, Oklahoma Alpha, have been chosen by Grand Council to travel throughout the United States and Canada visiting chapters and sharing with them their knowledge and experiences.

### Roxie Goertz

"Leadership and involvement are two words which describe Roxie's college life," writes a friend. This becomes obvious when reading her list of activities which includes two years as student representative to the University Board of Regents; three years as Student Senator; orientation leader; rush counselor; National Student Lobby area representative; National Student Association Board, and president of her campus political party. Then, of course,

there's Mortar Board, a summer internship program at Georgetown University, and the University Student Service Recognition Award for two years.

One of Roxie's special interests is gymnastics, and she served four years as a judge for the Minnesota State High School League women's gymnastics, and was assistant coach of high school gymnastics.

Roxie's achievements on the Minnesota campus included working as an orientation leader and coordinator of the University Community Program. In the orientation leader position she provided an introduction to the University for approximately 6,000 new students. It was her job to plan programs and be a counselor in the dormitory for those students. As coordinator of University Community Program, Roxann worked with service, college, and community offices to plan a program for about 2,500 new students and their parents.

In applying for the TGC position, Roxie said, "I would love to do more for Pi Phi and meet and work with more of its women. My personal experience with Pi Phi and the friends I have made have been and always will be

invaluable to me, and I would like to continue that experience and share it with others."

"She is an intelligent, competent, and very personable young lady. She is highly self-motivated and is respected by both her peers and those university administrators who have had the opportunity to work with her," wrote one administrator.


Kathy Taylor is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, and, in the past five years, eight former members of the OU Greek System have gone on to the national staffs of their fraternal organizations. Kathy is one of those people who possesses the ability to insure that her extra-curricular involvement enhances her academic goals and vice-versa. In her Oklahoma Alpha chapter, she was assistant pledge trainer, vice president of mental advancement, and president. On campus she chaired Women's Week, Campus Chest, publicity for

Homecoming and Howdy Week, and numerous other committees. She was the first woman at OU to be named to Omicron Delta Kappa, and was named Big Woman on Campus, as well as being selected for *Who's Who*. One of her journalism professors described her as a "diligent worker who accepts assignments as a challenge and not as a penalty imposed . . . talented, intellectual, personable, honest, and attractive."

Another writes, "While being integrally involved with all the campus activities, Kathy has maintained a [high] overall average. She is always cheerful and cooperative, no matter what the situation. She is a very mature young woman who, I feel, is quite cognizant and competent in regard to individual concerns, as well as internal or external sorority matters."

So Pi Phi wins again—with two outstanding young women who will share their knowledge and love of Fraternity with undergraduates throughout the country.

# Pi Beta Phi Colonizes At Baylor

A new colony with 138 pledges and a 53-year-old history? So it is at Baylor University, Waco, Texas, as the Alpha Omega social club became the Texas Zeta colony of Pi Beta Phi!

Formal pledging was held February 27, 1977, by Nancy Pollock, Grand Corresponding Secretary, assisted by Debbie Kyle, former president of Texas Alpha; Beth Leachman, president of Texas Beta; and Cynde Collins, president of Texas Delta. Additional representatives from these chapters and from Texas Epsilon also participated in the ceremony. Jeanne Tyrrell Eastman, president of the Waco Alumnae Club, was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Walter B. Dossett, Sr., graciously opened her home for the three simultaneous pledging ceremonies. Later in the afternoon the Waco Alumnae Club welcomed the new pledges and guests at a reception. Actives and alumnae alike introduced the former AOs to favorite Pi Phi songs. Special visitors included Katie Heck, Pi Province President; Sue Gibson, Pi North Alumnae Province President; and Cyndi Burris and Cindy Kralis, former graduate counselors.

Working with the colony for several weeks this spring was Joan O'Brien, Oklahoma Beta, one of this year's traveling graduate counselors. In addition, the newly formed alumnae advisory committee is helping the colony with its pledge program and its transition to Pi Beta Phi chapter organization. Mrs. Robert S. Bennett is AAC chairman. Other members are Mrs. Tom Cameron, Mrs. Walter Dossett, Jr., Mrs. Malcolm Duncan, Mrs. Charles Gervig, Mrs. H. H. LeCrone, Mrs. Jean McReynolds, and Mrs. William Turney. Cathy Sorensen, California Zeta, will be resident counselor for the 1977-78 school year.

Installation dates for Texas Zeta have been set for August 11-14, so that the girls can enter their August rush as a fullfledged Pi Phi chapter.

The formation of the colony climaxed a year-and-a-half wait as the six women's clubs at Baylor debated whether to seek affiliation after the university administration removed the ban on national fraternities. Alpha Omega was the oldest club on campus, established in 1924. Its alumnae roster includes over 1500

members in 44 states and 5 foreign countries.

Chapters of Kappa Alpha Theta and Delta Gamma have already been installed. The other clubs affiliated with Kappa Kappa Gamma, Tri-Delt, and Chi Omega.

## Rock Chalk's Best Girl

Nancy Weidensaul, Kansas Alpha junior, won the award for the best female performance at KU's 27th annual Rock Chalk Revue. The Pi Phis, together with Phi Gamma Delta, also won the award for the best original script.



Rock Chalk, which originated as a means of raising school spirit, is presented by fraternities and sororities who volunteer to submit a skit at the beginning of each fall semester. These skits are evaluated and may be chosen as one of four which are performed at Rock Chalk in the spring.

The twenty-minute productions are written, produced, and directed by students.

In the try-out stage, when groups are selected to present the skits, Pi Phi/Phi Gam earned 449 out of a possible 500 points, the highest number of points given this year.

# ACE Scholars Report Progress

From Florida to Oregon come grateful letters from the recipients of the Wisconsin Alpha Alumnae Continuing Education Scholarship.

In 1975 the first winners were announced at the Miami Convention, and Convention '77 in Minneapolis marks the third year of funds available to alumnae members of the Fraternity wishing to further their education. Receiving "progress reports" from those who have benefited from scholarship funds is highly interesting.

An occupational therapist, Jean Brown Binney, Florida Delta '69, writes, "I recently graduated from the University of Florida special education program for physically handicapped children—thanks, in large part, to the generosity of the ACE scholarship. . . . Now, as I begin to seek employment, I feel more confident in my abilities to service these special children and meet their special needs."

While teaching speech and drama in middle school, Jean Baynie Peel, Texas Alpha '48, is taking counseling and psychology courses. She hopes to find a position as a counselor in public schools or social agencies when she has completed requirements. "Without the assistance of the Wisconsin Alpha Scholarship, I doubt that I could fulfill my goal. At the present time, I have a daughter in college and another will enter in two years. My husband was the victim of an aircraft industry lay-off four years ago. . . . I am indeed grateful to Pi Phi for its help. Although Pi Phi has been a source of love and fellowship for many of its alumnae, this is certainly a tangible expression of the concern

that Pi Phi have for their sisters long after 'college days are o'er'."

Since graduating with a masters degree in May, 1976, Jane Griffel Bradbury, Iowa Zeta '58, has been working as assistant administrator of a hospital in Michigan. Jane wrote, "Pi Phi has always believed in the education and personal development of women. There are so many who could benefit from this scholarship program over the years. . . . It has done so much to further my professional and personal growth and I am very grateful. Plus I am always proud to say that my sorority has a scholarship available to "older" women and I was lucky enough to be a recipient."

From Corvallis, Ore., comes from Ellen West Hodges, Oregon Alpha '59, who is "thoroughly engrossed in doctoral studies in adult education and still enjoying the challenge of school very much." Besides enjoying her active seven-year-old daughter Sarah, Ellen is involved in "Pi Phi Friends" with Oregon Beta, plus being president of the Oregon stage chapter of Pacific Northwest Personnel Management Association.

Ellen writes, "As a single parent . . . the scholarship I received . . . has allowed more of my energies to be focused on my studies. I am most grateful for this assistance. My doctorate [will] provide the economic security that has been so important to me; and in this respect, Wisconsin Alpha's generosity has brought me closer to my educational goal. . . . Besides being able to put the money to good use, I found it a tremendous vote of confidence.

"In this day and age of women entering the labor force in growing numbers, the C.E. Scholarship is a profound statement by Pi Phi . . . of the importance of assisting us to ready ourselves for new careers or upgrading ourselves in former fields. . . . I think it is to Pi Phi's credit that the Alumnae Continuing Education Scholarship has been established, and I can only hope that in the years to come this award and others like it will continue to be offered to deserving Pi Phi's."

## UVM First Lady Recalls Pi Phi Tie

If there were a simple term synonymous with wife of the president of a university, gracious hostess would probably be it.

Ina Fitzhenry-Coor, Missouri Beta, new first lady of the University of Vermont, is that, and a great deal more. As the wife of the 21st president of UVM, she is acutely aware of what that role entails. She is also a mother and a professional psychologist with a half-time joint appointment in the departments of psychology and psychiatry.

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Married to husband Lattie halfway through her Master's degree, Ina went on for her doctoral degree from Washington University in St. Louis. That degree is in developmental psychology, and her strongest interest is in the social development of children.

The Coor children, two sons, ages 11 and 5, and a 10-month-old daughter, are undoubtedly the youngest inhabitants Englesby House, the presidential residence, has ever known. A nursery and a family room were created from what formerly were the solarium and the basement.

Ina's ties with UVM are ties shared by many alumnae: her membership in Mortar Board as well as Pi Beta Phi.

"When my husband was to be interviewed for the first time, I remembered Grace Goodhue Coolidge. She was a graduate of UVM." Ina Fitzhenry had had to memorize that



information for her pledgship in Pi Beta Phi, which was also the sorority of President Coolidge's wife.

Dr. Fitzhenry-Coor is in the vanguard of women who combine a professional career with the very highly structured role of wife of a college or university president.

"To juggle marriage, career, and highly defined role as president's wife is not an easy thing. It really isn't.

"I do engage in a number of roles, and I am highly committed to all of them. It's complex, my work in psychology, my family, meeting people, and representing the University. Being president's wife, in quotes, seems quite different from standing in a classroom lecturing undergraduates, but it all comes together.

"We're really energetic people," she concludes. "We thought it was possible so we tackled it."

# From Pi Phi Pens

Not often do we have the privilege of discovering a book about a Pi Phi Grand President, written by a second Pi Phi, and reviewed by a third. May Lansfield Keller, Grand President from 1908 to 1918, presided at the 1910 Convention when the decision to establish a Settlement School was passed. Pauline Turnbull's book, reviewed here by a successor to Dr. Keller as Dean of Westhampton College, University of Richmond, Virginia, is a valuable addition to Pi Beta Phi historical archives. *May Lansfield Keller: Life and Letters*, by Pauline Turnbull, New York Alpha. Reviewed by Dr. Stephanie Mitchell Bennett, New Mexico Alpha.

When in August, 1976, I moved to Richmond, Va., to assume my new duties as Dean of Westhampton College, I borrowed a copy of Pauline Turnbull's book. Although I began to read the book out of a dual sense of duty and obligation, I soon found myself engrossed in a book that is remarkable for many reasons. Miss Turnbull's work is not only a tribute to one of America's great educators, it is also an important statement for women's education and the Fraternity spirit and values cherished by Pi Beta Phi.

Miss Turnbull's book is divided into three sections: the first, a biographical essay; the second, selected letters from Dr. Keller's scholarly life; the third, letters which for the first time reveal Miss Keller's love affair for a childhood sweetheart. The balance of selected materials gives testimony to Dr. Keller's ability, throughout her life, to recognize and maintain appropriate priorities. May Keller emerges as a woman of indomitable will, firm commitment, and intellectual brilliance, capable of eliciting both respect and love from her associates and friends.

Raised in Baltimore and educated at the Woman's College of Baltimore, later renamed Goucher College, Miss Keller first pursued graduate study at the University of Chicago. After a male professor queried her about why she didn't marry instead of attending graduate school, she withdrew from the University of Chicago and continued her studies in Germany where she earned her doctorate. When she returned to the United States in 1904, she had developed the character which was to distinguish her for the next sixty years. In her were

combined the graciousness of the southern heritage and the mental toughness and resiliency of the finest education available. She was educated well beyond the extent of most of her contemporaries. While she did not actively participate in the women's movement of the early twentieth century, she exemplified the independence, competence, and achievement for which other women were striving.

Miss Turnbull's portrait of Dr. Keller reveals a woman dedicated to academic excellence; a woman who insisted that the graduates of "her college" could gain admission to the finest professional and graduate schools in the country; a woman who maintained high moral standards herself and inculcated them in her students; a woman capable of intense per-

sonal emotion and loyalty, who never allowed her personal feelings to intrude upon her professional life. May Keller combined qualities well worth emulating: she was intellectually curious, a devotee of the fine arts, an ardent reader and scholar, a committed participant in the civic life of her community. Yet she was a woman so certain of her competence and identity that she could participate in a student sponsored basketball tournament or act in a Shakespearian farce without fear of losing her dignity. Throughout her life, which spanned two world wars and perhaps the greatest period of change experienced in American intellectual and moral history, her sense of self-identity not only gave definition to an outstanding educational institution, it also formed the character of generations of young college women.

Perhaps what is most fascinating in reading this book is the series of insights it offers for those of us concerned and involved with women's education in the 1970s. What startles us is that despite seeming progress, we are still facing many of the same problems and obstacles faced by Dr. Keller between 1914 and 1946.

Certainly *May Lansfield Keller: Life and Letters* is worthy of praise as an essay of friendship as well as for the insights about Dr. Keller and education. But the volume is much more; it is also a testament to its author and her unique place in the life of May Keller and the history of Westhampton College.

Pauline Turnbull met May Keller at the installation of the Pi Beta Phi chapter at

Syracuse University; she joined her at Westhampton College in 1916. She shared with Dr. Keller a love of art, music, history, and travel. Miss Turnbull's dedication to teaching and learning are equal to those of her mentor; her presence, even today, on the Westhampton campus generates respect and admiration—tinged with not a little awe for her accomplishments. Like May Keller, Pauline Turnbull stands as a model of what women can accomplish; her integrity, loyalty, scholarship, and lively sense of humor set her apart as a woman of great stature.

This fine book is more than a tribute to Dr. Keller. It is a tribute to the many women who formed Westhampton College, among them the numerous Pi Phis whom Dr. Keller brought to the campus to share their expertise and talents with "her students:" Caroline Lutz, a Pi Phi from Goucher who taught English at Westhampton for thirty-five years, and Lucy Bartholomew, professor of French, as well as Miss Turnbull.

No Pi Phi can read this book without feeling pride in the accomplishments of Dr. Keller who guided not only Westhampton College, but also the national Fraternity, as Grand President; who gave of her energies and intellect for the benefit of young women.

*Dr. Stephanie Mitchell Bennett assumed responsibilities as Dean of Westhampton College in August, 1976. She holds B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of New Mexico, and a Ph.D. degree in American Civilization from the University of Iowa. She has received a Ford Foundation Fellowship, a research fellowship from the Earhart Foundation, and a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Fellowship. In 1974 she was named Michigan's Outstanding Young Woman. She holds many professional memberships.*

*Stephanie Mitchell was initiated into New Mexico Alpha where she received both the Chapter Service Award and the Amy B. Onken Award. During the seven years she lived in Michigan, Dr. Bennett was a member of Michigan Delta's AAC, serving as its chairman for three years, and a member of the Michigan Delta House Corporation. She is currently a member of the Richmond [Va.] Alumnae Club.*

*Her husband, Dr. Arthur J. Bennett, is chairman of the general department of Ferris State College in Michigan, and they are parents of an eight-year-old son, Brendan.*

#### California Delta



# *Retirement Marks End of An Era*

Marian G. Heard, Director of Arrowmont since its inception, head of the Settlement School craft program for more than 30 years, and professor in the Department of Crafts, Interior Design and Housing, College of Home Economics, at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tenn., since 1936, will retire August 31 from both of those posts.

For Arrowmont and Pi Beta Phi, Miss Heard's retirement marks the end of an era in which Arrowmont saw both its beginning and development take place under her direction. She has guided the activities of the summer craft workshop program since its inception in 1945.

Under Miss Heard's guidance, a realistic working relationship has developed between the University of Tennessee and Pi Beta Phi whereby Arrowmont students can earn UT credit for their work in the crafts school. It was through her vision and leadership that the Arrowmont School is internationally famous today. The school reaches out not only to educators, craftspersons, and students from all over the world, but it has made a significant contribution to the economy and educational advancement of the Gatlinburg area.

Miss Heard has been an inspiring teacher to her students through her sincere interest in them and through her personal philosophy. She has the understanding of and the ability to relate to people of all age groups and backgrounds. She is able to communicate to others how the crafts world can enrich their lives, and she has a genuine compassion for people everywhere.

Having distinguished herself in the fields of art, crafts and interior design, her many professional affiliations and awards attest to the esteem in which she is held throughout the academic circles.

The Trustees of Teachers College, Columbia University, awarded her a Distinguished Service Medal in 1976 in recognition of her outstanding contributions to art, education, and public service. At the University of Tennessee she was honored as the Alumni Distinguished Professor in 1971. And in 1974, she was the recipient of the Tennessee Women Award.

In addition to the dual career from which she is retiring, Miss Heard in recent years has served as chairman of the Tennessee Crafts

Advisory Committee of the Tennessee Arts Commission, chairman of the Tennessee Craft Workshop and Conference, program chairman for the Environmental Craft Workshop and Conference, and co-chairman of the National Art Education Workshop in Crafts.

Among her many accomplishments in a most active career were the introduction of crafts in the curriculum at UT; the organization and direction of the Craft Education Program for the Southern Highland Handicraft Guild; planning and establishment of the first Craftsman's Fair; the direction of a craft survey of 11 southern states for the Rockefeller Foundation which resulted in grants being awarded to UT and the Southern Highland Handicraft Guild. The Ford Foundation sent her to Pakistan to help set up a crafts program at the college level and to help build an organization for the craftsmen of Pakistan.

She has held offices in the following organizations: Pi Beta Phi (Miss Heard was initiated into membership at the Miami convention in 1954 and is a member of Tennessee Gamma), Phi Kappa Phi, American Crafts Council, American Home Economics Association, National Art Education Association.

American Association of University Professors, World Crafts Council, Southern Highland Handicraft Guild, Piedmont Southeast Crafts Council, Southeastern Art Education Association.

Tennessee Artist-Craftsman's Association, Southeast Section of American Crafts Council, East Tennessee Art Education Association, the Board of Trustees of the National Crafts Council, and Arrowmont Board of Governors.

A graduate of Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., where she earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Ceramic Design, Miss Heard furthered her formal education at Columbia University Teachers College, New York City, N.Y., where she received a Master of Arts degree in Fine and Applied Arts.

Her retirement in her home in Knoxville most certainly will be a busy one.

She is a Pi Phi—and all of us who wear the Arrow are indebted to Marian G. Heard for the lifetime of service she has given in our behalf.

## *Ray Pierotti Is Named Director of Arrowmont*

Grand Council of Pi Beta Phi has appointed Mr. Ray Pierotti as new Director of Arrowmont School of Crafts effective September 1. Arrowmont's new director was academic advisor, The Experiment in International Living, Putney, Vt., and taught French Language and Literature at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah, while completing his master's.

A graduate of the University of Utah where he earned Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees, he also received a Certificate de la Langue Francaise from the University of Paris where he studied from 1958 to 1960.

His honorary appointments include: Board of Directors, Citizens for Artists Housing, New York City; Board of Directors, International Art Registry, Ltd.; Board of Directors, the Participation Project Foundation, Inc.; Advisory Board, Mary Duke Biddle Gallery for the Blind and Sighted, Raleigh, N.C.; Vice President, New York chapter of the University of Utah Alumni Association; past president of the New York Experiment in International Living Alumni Association.

Treasurer of the Board of Directors, Les Amis du Traiteaux de Paris (French theatrical troupe, touring non-French speaking countries under the auspices of the French Bureau of Cultural Affairs); chairman of the National Arts Competition, Camp Fire Girls, Inc., 1973 through 1976; National Endowment for the Arts and New York State Council on the Arts grant to research museum and community relations in Italy, France, Germany, and England the spring of 1971.

Mr. Pierotti, who has combined an active painting career with his administrative appointments, has had one-man exhibitions at the Springville National Annual Exhibition, Springville, Utah; University of Boise Art Gallery, Boise, Idaho; Minneapolis Museum of Art, Minneapolis, Minn.; Kansas Art Institute, Kans.; Miller Galleries, Cincinnati, Ohio; Hunter Art Museum, Chattanooga, Tenn.; South Carolina Museum of Art, Columbia, S.C.; Kipsbay Gallery and Sawdust Gallery, New York City; University of Utah, Salt Lake City.

Mr. Pierotti has had numerous magazine articles and musical compositions published.



# "You Must Be Proud To Be A Pi Phi"

This comment did not come from another sorority woman or from anyone associated with the fraternity system. These were the words of an Arrowmont student who knew nothing of Pi Beta Phi except that we owned the craft school she was attending.

Last July I was enrolled in a beginning jewelry class at Arrowmont and was attempting to be just another student. Purposely, I had asked Marian Heard, Director of Arrowmont, not to introduce me as a Board of Governors member. I wanted to be a student like everyone else, to be a part of my class, and to be able to listen to their comments, good and bad, about Arrowmont. I did not even tell my newly found friends who worked at the same table with me that I was a Pi Phi.

My "cover was blown," however, through an innocent series of greetings by Janie, one of our hard working maids, and Ernie, one of our ever smiling maintenance men, and other BOG members present that week who insisted on taking my picture while I was in class. Fellow students knew this was my first time to take a course at Arrowmont, so one asked how I knew so many people. I told her that I some-

times came to meetings in Gatlinburg. Then she asked if I was a Pi Phi, and I answered in the affirmative. She put down the piece of jewelry on which she was working, thought a minute, and said, "You must be very proud to be a Pi Phi." I replied that, yes, I always had been, but that I was especially so that week.

I have one regret about attending Arrowmont—that I did not go sooner. Others had told me about the feeling of oneness of the students, about the total dedication of the instructors, about the "Arrowmont Experience." I have heard convention speakers talk of the "Arrowmont Experience," Marian Heard describe it, but there is no way to put a feeling like that into words—there is no substitute for BEING there and BEING a part of it.

As a hospital pharmacist I normally spend my days filling prescriptions, not filing metals. I am living proof that someone with no art background and no craft experience can go to Arrowmont. (My instructor would corroborate this, if needed.) I would not say it was easy; it was just as I had been told. I was in class from morning till night. I was in class though because I wanted to be. To "get away from it all," I usually take skiing vacations but my week at Arrowmont served the same purpose. The commitment and involvement you feel toward your class and your project totally engulfs you for the days you are there.

# Cooper Bequest Benefits Arrowmont

"In Pasadena, Edith enjoyed gardening, housekeeping, being able to entertain friends, belonging to the Shakespeare Club, and being a member of Pi Beta Phi Alumnae Club. . . ."

With these words, Edith I. Cooper's sister Edna partially explained the love for her Fraternity that prompted Edith to bequest \$100,000 to Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts.

Both Edith and Edna, and an older sister Carrie, were members of Indiana Gamma. Edith served as president of her chapter and was delegate to the Berkeley Convention in 1915. In college, she majored in English Literature, and taught three years in Indiana before joining Edna in 1919 in Sheridan, Wyoming. From that time on, the two sisters lived together and shared their experiences.

Miss Edith enjoyed the western life very much, according to her sister. Her life revolved around the friendly people, the good school in which she taught, and weekend trips to nearby mountains, sometimes on horseback into more remote areas. She particularly loved the spring when lovely flowers covered the hillsides.

In 1924 she moved to Long Beach, Calif., and taught in Los Angeles. In 1941 Edith and Edna bought a home in Pasadena where they

lived until 1963. During that time they were both loyal, active members of the Pasadena Alumnae Club. Even after they moved to a retirement home in Pomona, Calif., they continued to be dues paying members of the club, and were listed in its roster. Miss Edna called them "a wonderful group of women whose friendship has continued, even from a distance."

During her active life, Edith particularly enjoyed traveling, having spent several summers in the Pacific Northwest, as well as journeying to Alaska, Hawaii, through the Panama Canal to New York with side excursions along the way, and two trips to Europe.

Edith passed away March 5, 1975.

Over the years, and especially after her retirement, Edith enjoyed careful study of business trends and investments. She was quite conservative, according to Edna, and liked to know the history of stock, its appeal to public acceptance, the popularity of its product, etc.

The principal of her gift to Arrowmont will be invested, with the income from the investments being used as a constant memorial to Edith I. Cooper's love for Pi Beta Phi.

In acknowledging the gift, Grand President Elizabeth Orr stated, ". . . though we sometimes feel progress has been slow [at Arrowmont,] it has not been when you realize Pi Phi is the only sorority having a solely financed philanthropy. Our alumnae have made this possible and sometime in the future we hope to realize our dream of a year-round school. The Edith Cooper bequest brings this dream ever closer to reality."

## Tribute To A Friend

Mildred Ozias was the youngest daughter of the first principal of Minneapolis West High School. After studying at the University of Minnesota, where she was a member of Minnesota Alpha, she continued her education in Europe. Her major interest was music, as she was a gifted singer.

While in Berlin, Mildred met a fellow American, Dr. Bern de Vries, a young practicing orthodontist and student. After her return to Minneapolis, Mildred sang professionally for ten years. Prior to her marriage to Dr. de Vries, "Mid" was unaccustomed to sports or an outdoor life, but she was introduced to hunting and fishing by her young husband. She

enjoyed participation in these activities, becoming an ardent fisherman and a proficient shot.

Mildred de Vries loved life and kept in close touch with friends. Her commitment to Pi Beta Phi remained strong, true, and active throughout her life. When she died in 1970, the loss was felt by many who had known and loved this talented and colorful lady.

## A Rebuttal . . .

Dear Editor:

I wish to rebut and take strong exception to the bulk of Mrs. Lamb's article on "The Volunteer Professional" in the winter 1976 *ARROW*. I would like to say on the outset that men and women most certainly do have a responsibility to their community in offering volunteer services. I, myself, have been on numerous boards—Pi Phi Jr. Alumnae Club being only one of them. I have planned and run a booth for the local Children's Fair each summer for several years to benefit the nursery school. I put many hours in for the League of Women Voters in helping to keep the public aware of county, state, and national issues that affect their quality of life and that of their children. I am also active in the Chicago Junior League. I have also worked on the past two presidential campaigns.

I would first like to direct myself to Mrs. Lamb's . . . remarks about the women's movement. Wherever did she get the idea that we are out to convince every woman or even every man for that matter that he/she must be an oil executive to be "fulfilled?" Secondly, I have been in the working world for nine years and have seen only several "clenched teeth and doubled fists." Mostly, it was in political campaigns (where I was in a volunteer capacity and so was the person with the clenched teeth!)

Of course there are alternatives! There are more alternatives now than ever before. The reason? Because Feminists like myself believe in freedom of choice, pure and simple, and have been fighting for these alternatives for so long. We are not telling Mrs. Lamb what to do with her life. If Mrs. Lamb wants to be an oil company executive and can do a good job she should be able to aspire to it. If she prefers to sit in a sink with a can of comet all day, then she should do it! This is really what the women's movement is all about. *Choice*, pure and simple. I would truly like to know why Mrs. Lamb feels for some reason that there is a dictate that says she's a slob if she doesn't earn a living. Is that really what they believe in Indiana? Astounding.

The most ludicrous part of Mrs. Lamb's article concerned the statement that because a wife and husband both pursue careers the next door neighbors would be forced out into the work force, too. The neighbors on the right both work and don't make what my husband does alone. That doesn't mean they plan on taking extra jobs at night to "keep up." The people in the next block have one breadwinner and she makes more than my husband and me put together. That certainly does not mean I would turn my part time business into a full time one just to "keep up." When you think of it, Mrs. Lamb's supposition is almost too ridiculous to discuss.

Finally, I think most people would agree that devoting time and attention to growing and developing children is important. But certainly not to the exclusion of everything and everybody else. Twenty-four hour mothers and/or fathers do not automatically qualify for Parent-of-the-Year Awards. Please excuse the tired old cliché "Quality is better than quantity," but it does apply so well here. Being a working parent either part time or full time or a twenty-four hour "at home" parent does not make one a good or bad parent in itself. I know far too many twenty-four hour "at home" parents that don't have the time of day for their kids and too many superb working parents to be able to put either kind of parent automatically in a particular category. Across the board you will find bad parents in both categories and working really has nothing to do with it.

So, yes, Mrs. Lamb is right. Volunteer work is definitely a responsibility that one has to his/her community, but one must let the individual decide when, where, and how much. Don't blame the women's movement for the ails of society. I get a little tired of that when all we are trying to do is bring freedom of choice to all.

# Alumnae Up-Date Has Good Response

One of the most gratifying aspects of the replies to the recent Alumnae Up-Date questionnaire (ARROW, Winter '76) was the number received from Golden Arrow members of the Fraternity. These women, with their wealth of experience in Pi Beta Phi, expressed clearly their feelings on the alumnae picture; the friendships; the fine association with other members; the philanthropic endeavors; and the continuing links with today's collegians.

Many recent graduates also responded. Most stated that their Fraternity experience had meant so much during their undergraduate years, that they wanted to return to Pi Phi at least a bit of what had been given them during their college years. Thus, from brand new alumnae to those long steeped in Fraternity traditions, our membership indicated their feelings concerning the status of our alumnae department, particularly as to their own involvement with alumnae clubs.

Most replies indicated paid membership in a chartered alumnae club, or the desire to be such. Whenever possible, club presidents were informed of those living near a club area, and stating a wish to be a club member. Names of those individuals requesting information on the chartering of clubs or pockets were sent to alumnae province presidents of the particular province areas. While it was impossible to answer each query, information was forwarded to the proper officer in every instance, including sending names of those expressing interest in province or national offices to the nominating committee.

Some questionnaires were answered on an individual basis. In the event a member had a question concerning procedures or current policies, it was felt a personal reply was necessary, particularly to correct misinformation.

Over 95% of the replies were in a favorable and complimentary vein. Here again, where each complaint could not be answered individually, steps will be taken to correct ineffi-

ciences, and to overcome poor programming and/or "wrong meeting times," in so far as alumnae clubs may be expected to cooperate.

It is evident, with so many of our alumnae employed, that it is important that clubs plan a series of staggered meeting times, in order to accommodate more fully as many desiring a closer affiliation as is possible. There is no reason clubs may not form one or more sub-groups, with a chairman to report to the club president after each group meeting. Here, particularly, business or professional women would welcome a noon-time, or late afternoon, meeting among those with common interests and needs. This type of group need not be limited to the working woman, and could easily be a part of the established club. Certainly, such a group could be chartered in itself, if the members were able to fulfill requirements of a chartered alumnae club. This subject was dealt with at Convention, and delegates were able to discuss the merits of additional groups within the framework of our alumnae clubs.

Many expressed a desire to receive both a club and a chapter newsletter. Clubs have long been urged to keep members informed of activities, but they must know of an individual's interest in order to include her on a mailing list. A number of chapters have resumed publication of a newsletter, and others should be encouraged by their own members to print items of interest to all.

Sincere thanks is extended to each Pi Phi who took time to answer our query. The Grand Vice President of Alumnae is always open to constructive suggestions, and will continue to welcome thoughts and ideas which would be of benefit to the alumnae department of Pi Beta Phi.

## *A History*

Shining through the fabric of the history of Pi Beta Phi is the facade of a gracious, white dwelling that to all of us who wear the arrow, symbolizes a house of heritage. And when we enter that house, we step backward in time to our beginnings.

The house was purchased in 1853 by Jacob Holt, known by the honorary title of "Major," who came west from New York to survey his land holdings in an attempt to find a suitable place to settle. The Major kept a record of his adventures of this period and his accounts on the Civil War and the Reconstruction shed important light on the views and attitudes of a liberal person of that time. The house itself relays to the observer the American way of life in the early days of our nation.

Monmouth College was founded in 1856, a time when women were militantly demanding equal rights with men. The fact that women were admitted with equal academic privileges was an important factor in the movement that led to the creation of the first fraternal organization for college women.

With the outbreak of the Civil War, much of the enrollment of Monmouth College was lost, until the number totaled only 48. Post-war enrollment brought many back to school, however, including Ada Bruen and Libbie Brook. They were considered fortunate to find living quarters in the home of Major Holt. Only two years had passed since the end of the war, and those terrible years lingered in the memories of all.

Monmouth is not only the birthplace of Pi

Beta Phi, but also of Kappa Kappa Gamma. These foundations occurred only a few short years after the end of the war, and the rise of sororities closely paralleled the women's rights movement that had begun in the 1840s and which had reached a high pitch of agitation by the outbreak of the war.

Under the guidance of Monmouth College president, Dr. David A. Wallace, Ada and Libbie and ten other friends first formed an organization called "The Lantern Brigade." It is believed that Dr. Wallace then inspired the Founders to establish the first Greek-letter fraternity for women. The first meeting was held in the southwest bedroom at Holt house where the name, constitution, and other topics of primary importance were discussed.

Unfortunately, after Ada and Libbie left college, little was heard of Holt House. The Major and his last surviving daughter died and the house was abandoned and neglected.

It was at the Asheville Convention of 1938 that the purchase of the property was proposed and through the efforts of Mr. Hugh Moffet, it was bought for the Fraternity for the sum of \$1100 at a delinquent tax auction.

Plans for restoration and furnishing were approved at the Pasadena Convention of 1940, with the details left to Grand Council. The Holt House Committee was established and met for the first time in October, 1940. The first chairman, Lorette Chapman Terrell, and Grand Council Advisor Amy Burnham Onken deserve much of the credit for getting the house ready for the formal opening in October, 1941.

The desire of every member of the Fraternity to give the fullest measure of support to Pi Beta Phi's World War II project, the Physiotherapy Scholarship Fund—a desire which was concurred in by the Holt House Committee—resulted in the curtailment of many long-planned expenditures. The distribution of publicity and the purchase of additional furnishings were postponed. For six years the committee administered what was little more than a subsistence budget.

In a letter before the Swampscott Convention of 1946, President Grier of Monmouth College, the son of Founder Ada Bruen Grier, expressed the appreciation of the college and the community for all that Pi Beta Phi was doing in maintaining Holt House.

Today Holt House continues to serve Monmouth and remains a fitting tribute to our heritage.

## Jennie's Arrow Is Proud Possession

Jennie Horne Turnbull was initiated as one of our Founders with a pin that has since built itself an even greater heritage. The pin was worn by Jennie's granddaughter, Kay Turnbull Campbell, during her initiation in 1931, at Monmouth College. Marjorie Turnbull Fritz was initiated on the pin at Monmouth College in 1932. Eleanor Turnbull Sassano, another sister, was initiated with the same pin in 1941, also at Monmouth. Jennie's fourth descendant to be initiated on this pin was her great granddaughter, Marjorie Lee Fritz, the daughter of Marjorie Turnbull Fritz. Marjorie Lee Fritz was initiated in 1963 at Monmouth, but died of cancer her sophomore year at college.

After resting fourteen years, the pin was removed and sent in secret to Lubbock, Texas. Then, on February 26, 1977, the Texas Gamma chapter of Pi Beta Phi initiated Susan Drew Hutcheson with her great great grandmother's pin at Texas Tech University. The initial surprise grew to a kind of wonderment among Susie's pledge class that with them was the pin that one of our Founders had worn so many years ago. However, all the Texas Gammas shared the feeling of a continuing heritage in Pi Phi that this physical link with the past brought.

According to Susie, Jennie Horne Turnbull had two daughters who were both Pi Phis at Illinois Alpha, one of whom, Susie Turnbull Crowe, was Susie's namesake. Jennie was married to a minister for fifty-nine years and lived the last years of her life in Philadelphia. She was an enthusiastic supporter of the Settlement School and was also active in her local alumnae club.

Susie, a freshman at Texas Tech, said her grandmother has a trunk full of items that belonged to Jennie, including many Pi Phi things. Susie fully intends to explore the trunk while in Greenwich, Conn. this summer.

Could Jennie Horne Turnbull have ever imagined that her great great granddaughter would become a part of what developed from the bonds of friendship she shared with eleven other girls so many years ago?

About twenty TEXAS EPSILONS helped hostess a breakfast given by the American Heart Association in Dallas and were named 1977 Sweethearts by the Association. The chapter also collected approximately \$200 in the Association's door-to-door campaign.

Working through the International Book Exchange, KENTUCKY BETA and U.K. Sigma Nus co-sponsored a book drive and collected unused books for all types. These books are distributed all over the world to countries where books are scarce.

Tennis shoes, two pairs of socks, foot powder, and foot massages are ingredients in the recipe for success, according to Terri Torseth, WASHINGTON BETA, and her SAE partner, Scott Borth, in the ATO dance marathon. Terri and Scott danced for 52 hours and raised \$1,001.49, to help push the ATOs over

their goal of \$11,000 for the Epilepsy Foundation of America.

CALIFORNIA GAMMAS are the proud sponsors of a Girl Scout troop in a nearby Los Angeles Spanish speaking community. The weekly program is supplemented by field trips to the mountains, beach, state capital, cultural events, and frequent dinners at the Pi Phi house.

Up and down. Up and down. For one hundred hours, INDIANA DELTAS and the men of Sigma Chi jumped on a trampoline to raise money for Settlement School. Sponsors pledged money to each participant and paid according to the length of time jumped. Jumping began on Wednesday evening and continued day and night until Sunday afternoon.

OHIO ETA's bowling team came through with flying colors in the Muscular Dystrophy Bowling Tournament sponsored by Lambda Chi. Team members scored a total of 1682 points to claim first prize in the Greek division, as well as the highest scoring in the tourney. Forty teams participated.

For an unusual philanthropy, CALIFORNIA DELTAS helped the handicapped in their search for suitable apartments by measuring doorways, corridors, and stairwells of buildings in a nearby community. It was a useful way for the chapter to spend a Sunday afternoon.

Winter pledges of GEORGIA ALPHA conducted a Dial-A-Heart on Valentine's Day, making telephone calls for the sisters and relaying Valentine messages. The charge was 25¢ per call, and the proceeds were used for a Valentine's party for children in a local hospital.

Panhellenic sponsored a student production of *Godspell* last spring, and Ruthanne Richardson, CALIFORNIA ZETA, and sister Pi Phi Ann Behr were active in the presentation. Funds raised went to the Child Abuse Learning Mediation Center in Santa Barbara.

# A Feather In Women's Lib Headdress

'Twas homecoming at the University of Illinois in October, 1943, and the "Fighting Illini" were busy on another front—World War II. Coach Ray Eliot still tells of leading his football team on the field by hand due to their youth, inexperience, and fright. The band director had finally managed to locate enough musicians to field a musical group and the crowd of around 5,000 was dwarfed in a facility seating 68,000.

Another problem was finding a Chief Illiniwek to perform the traditional Indian dance at half-time. The position had always been filled by male students who had attained the rank of Eagle Scout and had learned Indian dances.

Idelle Stith, Illinois Zeta senior from Fairfax, Okla., stepped into the moccasins, donned the headdress and 40-pound costume made by Western Indians, and danced her way the length of the football field prior to smoking the peace pipe in the customary ceremony. Idelle had spent most of her life on the Osage reservation, was an authentic Indian princess of one thirty-second native blood with the name of Munk-a-Hop, meaning "eldest child."

In the years following her stint as Princess (she was not allowed the title of Chief) Illiniwek—some students referred to her as Illiniwench—attempts were made to erase her name from the Chief's war bonnet, and thus forget that a woman had performed the sacred rite.

However, in the fall of 1976, a fiftieth anniversary of the chief's dance was celebrated at the University of Illinois and all past chiefs were invited to attend and perform. Idelle—now Mrs. Richard Brooks of Montgomery, Ala., and a hostess for a television talk show entitled "Guest Room"—returned for the festivities and was assured by the other returning chiefs that her name had been returned to the headdress and the title of "Chief" was now hers.

In an interview at that time she stated that "Even though I was the Illiniwek long before women's lib, I wanted to do well then so they wouldn't say a woman couldn't do it." She did it and long may her feathers wave.

## sights and sounds

**BASIC REQUIREMENTS** of education, which have been in disfavor on most campuses for a decade, are reported on the upswing. Total freedom of choice of courses has produced too many "uneducated graduates," and many institutions are reassessing the curriculum and reinstating the neglected requirements once thought necessary to one's core of knowledge.

**A STUDENT'S ANXIETY** often interferes with his ability to do well. Northern Illinois University offers a four-week, two hours each week, anxiety-reduction workshop to teach students how to meet anxiety and reduce tensions.

**JOGGERS** at UCLA have organized into the university's first non-intercollegiate track club with membership open to faculty, staff, and students interested in running.

**CROWD LITTER CONTROL** is reported at Penn State where a football crowd was supplied with litterbags, and the after-mess was significantly reduced.

**STUDENT UNIONS** were surveyed recently by an Oregon graduate student who reports that 22% of those contacted had opened a campus pub, and another 12% planned to soon.

**GRADUATE SCHOOL** enrollments are down slightly for the first time in five years, according to a report released by the Council of Graduate Schools in the United States. Though private schools reported a one per cent increase in first time enrollments in graduate programs, public universities offset this with a five per cent decline.

**SKATEBOARDS** are back but not just for the hotrodders of elementary school. At least one

campus security unit reports its policemen on the beat using them.

**COMMUNITY IMPACT** is of increasing importance to many urban institutions, a fact reflected in many ways through alumni publications. Few handle this as completely as the University of Alberta's weekly *Folio* which outlines not only cultural and athletic events but lists job vacancies, volunteer opportunities, scholarships and fellowships, research grants, and even surplus equipment available for sale.

**CONSUMER LIBERATION** should be a field receiving academic attention, according to Dr. John Burton, University of Utah's consumer affairs specialist. In urging the adoption of such programs he says, "We spend a lot of time educating people how to earn money but very little time in teaching them how to spend it."

**WRITING TESTS** are being added to the College Entrance Examination Board's testing program for college-bound high school students. Reflecting a national concern for the deterioration of writing ability, CEEB testing will now include a 20-minute essay section as part of the English composition examination and the permanent adoption of its Test of Standard English Writing which has been used on a trial basis for the past three years.

**A FEW DOLLARS NOW** is sometimes the most basic financial need of a college student. The Associated Students of Michigan State recognize this short term financial stress and provide a loan program which allows any MSU student to borrow up to \$30 and repay it without interest charge in three weeks.

**OPERA IS BOOMING** on American campuses

says the Central Opera Service, the research office of the Metropolitan Opera Association. Half of the 845 opera companies in the United States are campus based, and one-third of all opera performances are by students.

**COOKING IN ONE'S ROOM** has always been a challenge to the college student, and now a Virginia coed has published *The International Students' Guide to Cooking Without Getting Caught*. Necessary equipment includes a thermos, a pot for boiling water, and an iron—the latter to grill a cheese sandwich. In support of student cooking, American University has opened an AU Food Co-op where first semester sales passed last year's total gross of \$22,000. The small co-op handles 400 items and is staffed by student volunteers.

**BEAUTY CONTESTS** are returning to the college scene. Though they are often called "sexist" by protesting campus groups, none have yet been halted but rather enjoyed as they were intended to be.

**FOOD WASTE** continues to receive considerable attention from student groups. The

anti-waste program at Lawrence University included a weigh-in of food returned on plates, and the director reported that waste totaled something around \$40,000 each year, including \$600 in unused paper napkins.

**UPDATE ON CAMPUS PETS:** This column has previously noted pets as a campus problem which has grown to unwieldy proportions. Middlebury has improved the situation with a campus dogcatcher, and at William and Mary a local volunteer has helped solve the problem of stray cats.

**READING COMPREHENSION** and a center for its study at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana has received three million dollars from the National Institute of Education. Instead of the conventional idea of comprehension (books in sociological or literature courses), the study will emphasize the need of all human beings to comprehend any written message from a recipe to a novel.
