And speaking of eating, a headline in the travel section of our local paper recently rather took us aback. It read, "New Orleans: It's the city that diets forgot." That surely must be some kind of record. Our delegation included seven Panhellenic presidents, two university Greek Advisors, one Resident Graduate Counselor, and two national officers. Kay Brada, Director of Extension, was the second national officer.

In the spring *ARROW* we had a story about Sarah Peele Allen, and her activities in the San Francisco area. Now comes an additional bit of information about Sarah. She has been chosen as 1987 San Francisco Secretary of the Year by Professional Secretaries International. 


She and fellow teacher, Carol Sullivan, began their work outside the high school a few years ago when they developed computer software in the language area. They developed a phonics software program to teach students how to spell, then went on to design computer programs for four other textbooks. The new book went on the market in January and has already been adopted by the state of Georgia.

It was the largest inaugural weekend ever held in the state when George Mickelson became the twenty-eighth governor of South Dakota January 10, 1987. Sharing honors with her Republican husband was Linda McCahren Mickelson, South Dakota Alpha.

While she attended the University of South Dakota, Linda was active in many organizations, but she especially recalls her activities with Pi Phi where she served in various offices including president. She was graduated from USD in 1963 with a BA in English.

Linda married George that year and she taught high school English for two years while he finished law school. In 1968, they moved to Brookings, SD, where he established a law practice and she kept books for the flourishing business.

The couple has three children: Mark, attending his parents' alma mater; Amy, a student at the University of Washington; and David, at home.



Linda has been active and served as an officer with P.E.O., D.A.R., Brookings Country Club Women's Association, her church, Woman's Club and the Brookings County Republican Party. She also took part in redecorating the home of the president of South Dakota State in Brookings.

Her interests now include redecorating the Governor's Mansion and acting as hostess for the many events held there.

"It was fun to renew old friendships during the campaign," she said. "Many of our Greek friends formed our basic volunteer organization."

Grace Coolidge to be honored

The University of Vermont and the Calvin Coolidge Memorial Foundation of Plymouth, VT, have recently signed an agreement to develop a joint program to give greater recognition to Grace Anna Goodhue, University of Vermont, Class of 1902; wife of President Calvin Coolidge; one of the University's most famous alumna, and an illustrious member of Pi Beta Phi.

Mrs. Coolidge was born in Burlington, VT on January 3, 1879. She was graduated from Burlington High School in 1897 and the University of Vermont in 1902. She was a charter member of the Vermont Beta Chapter of Pi Beta Phi, and many of the early meetings were held in the attic of her home at 312 Maple Street. Following graduation she went to the Clarke School for the Deaf in Northampton, MA to become a teacher of the deaf. While there she met a fellow Vermonter, Calvin Coolidge, from Plymouth, VT, and they were married in Burlington, VT on October 4, 1905. Grace Goodhue Coolidge continued to consider Northampton her home and lived there with the exception of the period 1921-1929, when the Coolidges lived in Washington during his vice presidency and presidency.

Grace Goodhue Coolidge maintained an active interest in Pi Beta



Phi throughout her life. She stayed in contact with many of her Pi Phi friends through a series of round-robin letters until she died. Her portrait in the China Room of the White House by Howard Chandler Christy was presented to the White House by the Fraternity, as she was the first Pi Phi to become a first lady. Her Fraternity pin was added to the painting by the artist just before it was unveiled. Her likeness in the First Ladies Gown Collection in the Smithsonian's Museum of American History has her Pi Phi pin which she presented to the museum with the dress. Grace Coolidge served many years as Province Vice President

[office later re-named Alumnae Province President] and later as Province President of Alpha Province.

President Coolidge died in 1933 and Mrs. Coolidge on July 8, 1957. They both are buried in the cemetery at Plymouth Notch, Vermont.

To honor Mrs. Coolidge, the University of Vermont has created the *UVM Grace Goodhue Coolidge Fund* to raise funds to support a series of activities related to Grace Coolidge. The President's Dining Room in the Waterman Building will be renamed the Grace Goodhue Coolidge Room. Her portrait will be hung there, and a permanent exhibit of her memorabilia will be placed on display. A picture of her portrait, with explanatory material, will be placed in the entry way of Coolidge Hall on the University's Redstone Campus. Additional events are contemplated including special exhibits, lectures, seminars, etc.

Pi Phis who have a particular interest in Grace Coolidge, and who would like to be a part of this effort to honor her, may assist by sending contributions to the *UVM Grace Goodhue Coolidge Fund*, Grasse Mount, 411 Main Street, Burlington, VT 05401. Gifts in cash or in kind (memorabilia of Grace Coolidge) are needed and will be most gratefully received. All contributions are tax deductible and will be acknowledged by the University. Pi Beta Phi national Fraternity has contributed \$500 to the fund.

Arrowfacts

Prior to 1880, a Pi Beta Phi Constitutional provision stated that members, upon graduation, "shall retain connection with their former chapter." Alumnae chapters were given the name of their parent chapters, followed by *Omega*. A number of these chapters existed, but there are records on just four: Lambda Omega, Des Moines, Iowa; Beta Omega, Fairfield, Iowa; Gamma Omega, Mount Pleasant, Iowa; Delta Omega, Iowa City, Iowa; and a chartered group in Lawrence, KS. These organizations were active locally and at general conventions.

In an early *ARROW*, Anna Ross Clark wrote, "The vows we made were not for a day nor yet for a year, but for all time, and we are just as much Pi Phis today as we were when we were active members of a chapter. We . . . work to live the principles we have sworn to uphold and defend."

Interest in membership after college continued to mount, and a standing committee was appointed to collect addresses, organize Pi Beta Phi clubs, and do general alumnae work. Later, a general alumnae secretary was named to have supervision of alumnae work, and Grand Council began to realize the importance of bringing alumnae into closer touch with active members, and of providing moral and financial support.

Thus, in 1893, Emma Harper Turner, Grand President, proposed, through a circular, the establishment of an alumnae association. Miss Turner felt that an association of older women would give a dignity and weight to the Fraternity beyond that of a mere college society. She believed, too, that women should form *clubs*, with the Fraternity retaining the term, *chapter*, for collegiate use.

"To maintain the Fraternity association of Pi Beta Phi alumnae and to secure their cooperation in the development of the Fraternity," became the object of the new association. Emma Harper Turner served as the first president, and was the "life, heart, and soul" of the group, instilling principles of action and purpose, adhered to by her successors.

Today, our loyal alumnae contribute to Fraternity scholarships and philanthropies, work with community projects, and give vital assistance to our collegians.

Holt House given antique china set

The Alumnae Advisory Committee (AAC) Chairman of Ohio Alpha, Marjorie Wheaton Walker, has donated a Haviland china dinner set to Holt House. The china, made in Limoges, France, dates back to around 1875. She chose this set because it is close to the age of Holt House. The pattern is too old to be identified.

"It's unusual to find that large a set intact," said Marjorie.

Marjorie and her husband, Leo, have operated the Walker Haviland China Matching Service for sixteen years. They deal with people all over the world, identifying and matching Haviland china patterns. Haviland is the largest exporter of fine china and was considered a status symbol in the early 1900s. The china is porcelain, not bone, with a white body achieved by firing at extremely high temperatures.

Marjorie is an Ohio Alpha Pi Phi and has tried to be involved with alumnae clubs wherever she has lived. She has returned to Ohio Alpha again and her guidance and assistance is very much appreciated by the chapter.

When Jean Forstrom Gardner first met her husband, Booth, in 1957, she never suspected that he would some day be governor of Washington State.

"Of course, now that I look back, all the signs were there. A Phi Delta Theta, he was running for vice president of the student body at the University of Washington, and he won. He was always interested in politics, but it never really sank in, or I guess I didn't believe it, or I always thought it would go away and it never did," confided Jean who will have been married to Booth twenty-seven years on July 30.

The Gardners moved into the Executive Mansion in Olympia in January, 1985. Since that time Jean has been winning the hearts of Washington's citizens as she seeks her own niche, establishes her own areas of expertise and stamps them with her own style.

Those who remember Jean from days in the Washington Alpha Pi Phi house at the University of Washington thirty years ago are not surprised that she is one of the most popular first ladies the state has had. While at UW Jean was elected Frosh Day Queen, secretary of the senior class and was a song leader for the Washington Huskies. She was a member of Rally Girls, an organization to promote campus spirit, was Miss University District for the Seattle Seafair celebration and was rush chairman for Washington Alpha. Jean graduated in 1960 with a BA in business administration.

Beauty, grace and intelligence are reflected in Jean's warm personality. While tall and elegant in appearance, beneath the glamour and poise is an earthy, homespun quality that is totally disarming—perhaps a reflection of the early years spent in her birthplace, Roundup, MT. She is a bright, vibrant woman who is unaffected by her status and the imposing grandeur of the Executive Mansion.

Over the years, the role of first lady has changed considerably.

"Isn't it funny how times have changed for women in the past fifteen years?" Jean reflected. "Public women are getting so issue and work oriented. It's no longer just standing

in line and giving teas every day. It's no longer only a social thing. You really have to be involved, and for some reason I wanted to be. I want to make a contribution while I'm here, and I'll feel good about it."

First Lady responsibilities

Although the role has indeed changed, responsibilities of the state's first lady are great. Jean regularly puts in ten to twelve hour days.

Approximately one-third of her time is taken by her role as co-chair of the Washington 1989 Centennial Commission and chair of the Commission's "Local Celebrations Committee." Much of Jean's work is centered on overseeing the planning and coordination of celebrations for Washington's statehood, the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution and commemorations of Captains Gray, Vancouver and Wilkes.

Jean is involved also with representing various state government programs and promoting state products. She also directs the activities of the Executive Mansion which includes hosting international dignitaries, cultural events and meetings for public service groups. She estimates that another one-third of her time centers around these Executive Mansion duties and activities.

The remaining one-third is spent representing the Governor or making appearances with him.

Jean also finds time to work with the Council for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect, the Washington State Cancer Drive and the Artist Trust, a statewide effort to serve individual artists at the grass roots level.

As the state's first lady, Jean works closely with the Foundation for the Preservation of the Governor's Man-

sion. The red brick Georgian House which overlooks the southernmost tip of Puget Sound, was nearly torn down in 1969. However, the legislature responded to public pressure and appropriated money for its renovation. The Foundation, a non-political organization, was then formed in 1972 for the purpose of soliciting gifts to furnish and decorate the Executive Mansion in a handsome and historically significant manner. The Foundation is also responsible for maintenance of the furnishings and paintings, most of which date from 1740-1850. It is over this beautifully restored and furnished house that Jean presides so naturally.

Jean was delighted to discover that two long-time members of the Foundation are Washington Beta Pi Phi Betty Jo Bouska Neils of Tacoma and Washington Alpha sister Barbara Clanton Blakeley of Olympia.

Much of the time, life in this formal house requires that the Governor and First Lady assume a more formal style than the casual manner they have always preferred. The public rooms are lovely and Jean opens them for tours every Wednesday in addition to other special tours. However, it is the coziness of the upstairs family sitting room and the intimacy of her second floor study that allow for real relaxation with shoes off and feet up.

One stark contradiction to be found in the elegant surroundings of the Executive Mansion is Jean's ad-

mission that they often get a few unwelcome visitors.

"Every spring we get bats," she said. "I'm not sure where they come from, but I've seen four or five of them since we moved in."

Washington State Patrol cadets are always in attendance at the Executive Mansion. While Jean comes and goes without too much surveillance, the Governor always has a security person with him, whether he's at work or jogging.

public scrutiny, however brief, is essential.

Although their two children are away from home now, Jean and Booth keep in close touch with Gail, 23, a recent graduate of Dartmouth college who is working in Seattle, and Doug, 24, a graduate of Pacific Lutheran University, now in Washington, D.C.

Despite the demanding schedule and the lack of personal time, Jean would not trade her experiences as

With the busy schedules of the Governor and First Lady, and with so many people around them all the time, the Gardners literally have to make appointments to be with each other. After moving from a house surrounded by eleven acres, where Jean admits they could run around in their underwear, it's quite a change to have someone in constant attendance.

"You can't even have a good fight," she quipped with a hearty laugh.

Having learned the value of at least a little time for oneself, Jean attends weekly Bible study sessions and can often be seen walking the shores of Capitol Lake with a Pi Phi friend or two. A time out from

"How could you complain about a lifestyle that has allowed you to meet a Gary Hart, a Ronald Reagan or a Mike Mansfield?" she asked. "I met Prince Charles and Princess Diana at Expo in Vancouver, Canada. It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience that I will never forget."

Jean is the Governor's biggest cheerleader as she boasts that he has good leadership skills. "Booth is a people person. He's got what it takes."

The people of the State of Washington might also be heard to say about Jean Forstrom Gardner, "She's a people person. She's got what it takes."

Centenarian speaks from memories dimmed

It is not often a young woman, a mere quarter of a century old, has the opportunity to visit with a Pi Phi able to boast a century of life. The one thinks she has seen it all, while the other truly has, or very nearly so.

I was that young woman, a lucky Pi Phi who was able to share in some of the Golden Arrow memories of Katherine Berry Clapp, Pennsylvania Beta. To reconstruct these memories with the passion in which they originally occurred cannot be accomplished by mere pencil and paper. A visit with Mrs. Clapp or any other centenarian (as Willard Scott would agree) is the only avenue through which one can truly share the distant past. Perhaps a vicarious recreation of our visit will convey some of Mrs. Clapp's memories along with some of the feelings I experienced while with this Golden Arrow Pi Phi.

Some believe that being a vintage Pi Phi and living to be Mrs. Clapp's age is a blessing. Some know that reaching this point in life can be a mixed blessing. And perhaps this is so for Mrs. Clapp. Katherine Berry Clapp has lived a healthy, full life—a blessing. But, as so often occurs with many of our mothers, grandmothers and great grandmothers, long life takes its toll—the mixed blessing. The strain of long life reveals itself through weakness in physical capacities such as hearing and sight, and through the coherent and sometimes not-so-coherent talk of the centenarian.

So it was during our visit. I spoke: loud, slow, clear and often repeated. Mrs. Clapp responded: looks of concentration, pauses for reflecting on her thoughts, temporary drifts into an abundance of overwhelming memories, final tentative selection of what was to be said. This was the atmosphere.

The emotion I felt, renewed appreciation for history, wisdom revealed to me, simple, romantic feelings for life, the charge I received—this was not hindered by the difficulty Mrs. Clapp had in hearing or at times in collecting and communicating her thoughts. In fact, as she paused to organize and compose herself, I found myself daydreaming about the living history before me . . . what was it like to be a Pi Phi some eighty-odd years ago? Maybe a song could tap into the reserves of memories and awaken the experience of a young Katherine Berry.

I started to sing . . . "When I was a student at college. . . ." Without prodding, a full voiced Pi Phi duet was under way, singing "Ring ching ching." I was soon left behind as Mrs. Clapp took off in complete pleasure. I learned verses popular at Bucknell in 1906 that were not present in my Michigan Alpha experiences of the early 1980s.

If the song was a powerful tool in sparking some memories, perhaps a meaningful Bible verse would have the



same effect. After locating that special verse from initiation, I passed the Bible to Mrs. Clapp so that she, with the aid of a magnifying glass the size of her hand, could read it. As she read, I recited. No response. This verse did not carry the same power that the song had. I was disappointed. Mrs. Clapp sensed my disappointment from this failed effort with the Bible verse. As if to compensate, she promptly, and with conviction, recited one of her favorite verses. It did help. It did comfort me.

Our visit continued, but now we spoke of the years after Katherine Berry's college experience. Though she had left Bucknell, the Greek life did not leave her. Katherine Berry married William Marsh Clapp, a Delta Tau Delta from Wabash, in 1912. Later years brought her back to active involvement as a Pi Phi alum in the Akron, OH club. At that time she was garden editor with the *Akron Beacon Journal*. She wrote articles three times a week, plus a special column with pictures for the Sunday issue. Some of her articles were published in *Better Homes and Gardens*, *House Beautiful* and numerous other magazines. She continued writing her column well into her eightieth year. These articles have been compiled as references and are at the Akron Public Library where a garden has been named in her honor.

Slowly the visit brought us around to today. What is it like to be a 100-year-old Pi Phi? Well, a ritual activity for Mrs. Clapp is to read the morning paper. Along the way she marks certain articles which she believes her daughter should read. It is not unusual to find Mrs. Clapp reading *Oliver Twist* or some other classic during the wee hours of the night. Maintaining an awareness and involvement in her community is obviously limited. But civic duty is important to her. She is adamant about voting, as she has been for the past seventy-nine years.

Our visit drew to a close. One hundred years condensed into forty-five minutes? Certainly not. My wine and blue is still vibrant. Hers has faded.

Sixteen travel from Far East

International was the feeling in the air at Arrowmont during a week in March when sixteen Japanese art students were on campus taking classes. These textile students from the Seka Art School in Kyoto came to Arrowmont with Shuiji Asada, their professor, to learn American craft skills unavailable to them in Japan and to be exposed to arts and crafts in this country. Purpose of the trip was not just to learn a skill but, more importantly, to develop concepts they could take back to Japan and incorporate into their own textile design work.

Asada notes, "The history and tradition in Japan of more than a thousand years is pressure to prevent them from creating new things. In the U.S., history is just forming and new ideas are encouraged. I am very interested in American ideas."

Asada, an internationally recognized textile designer, is transforming old Japanese textiles into contemporary ideas and taking American ones to Japan. While in the U.S. he attended the Surface Design Conference in Kansas City.

Eight of the students studied metal smithing and jewelry design with David Logan, professor of art at East Tennessee State University. Others studied basketry with Bryant Holstenbeck, studio artist from Durham, NC.

Glen Kaufman, professor of art at the University of Georgia and a past Arrowmont faculty member, arranged the student visit while in Kyoto.

Many friendships were formed and cultural exchanges took place between students and faculty. After leaving Arrowmont, the Japanese students toured the Smoky Mountains and visited historical sites around the U.S.

85 pieces chosen for exhibit

Last fall Arrowmont hosted a national juried exhibition, "Space: New Form/New Function" that brought national recognition and acclaim to the school. Focus of the exhibition was an exploration of a variety of concepts as related to space: concrete, atmospheric, architectural, illusionary, psychological, interstellar and pictorial.

316 entries were submitted with a total of 799 pieces, represented in slides, from twenty-eight states. The juror, Ken Holder, painter and professor of art at Illinois State University, chose eighty-five pieces for exhibition in the Arrowmont gallery.

Holder expressed his reaction to the jurying process, saying, "I could write several volumes about the quality of entries and the enormous task of jurying this highly competitive show. It has been a pleasure and pain in heavy doses; pleasure in see-

ing so much interesting artwork and pain trying to tailor it to fit gallery space.

"I began with the intentions of just selecting the most exciting show possible, regardless of media. The most difficult cuts at the end were based finally upon which works I felt addressed the space theme best. The result was a very exciting exhibit with a wide diversity of media and styles."

Juror's Awards of Excellence and merit awards were indicated for eleven artists. Major awards went to Michael Aurbach of Nashville, TN, mixed media; Alan Goldsmith, Bos-cobel, WI, oil on canvas; and Steven Tucker, Philadelphia, PA, fiber construction.

An Arrowmont purchase award went to Michael Bailot, Santa Barbara, CA, for a basket that has become part of the Arrowmont permanent collection.

Basketry art has fascination

Lucinda Trabue, Tennessee Beta, a member of the Arrowmont Board of Governors, was on the Arrowmont campus in March cultivating her creative juices and partaking in a week of personal renewal and growth in Bryant Holsenbeck's basketry class. Lucinda, a public relations director for an advertising agency in Nashville, has been developing her basket making skills for a couple of years, taking classes at Arrowmont and working on her own.

She became interested in basketry while taking a class with Holsenbeck two years ago at Arrowmont. It was Bryant's unique and personal approach to basketry which really started Lucinda's addition to this means of creative expression. Holsenbeck is original in her approach to the basket making process. Hers are spontaneously and impulsively made; they retain their basket form but are whimsical and full of enthusiastic expression. They are constructed of almost anything that can be woven in any form or fashion. It was this first basket class which broke Lucinda free.


After her discovery of Arrowmont in 1981, Lucinda took a class every year, exploring new media. "But," she said, "I have found my interest with basketry."

In just two short years she is teaching workshops, one to the Nashville Alumnae Club, and selling her baskets. She is even adding an addition to her house for a basket studio.

Lucinda insists that you don't have to be a professional artist or pursue an artistic career to attend a class at Arrowmont. It's just a hands-on learning experience.

Six Japanese students were in her basketry class, none of whom spoke English. They made incredibly beautiful baskets just from watching the instructor.

The experience of being at Arrowmont for a week is a creative one, and Lucinda encourages all Pi Phis to attend a class.

Talented artists bring specialties to Arrowmont

Arrowmont faculty consists of an exceptionally diverse group of artists and craftsmen from studio settings and universities throughout the country. Each faculty member has an approach to teaching that is unique to his/her creative discipline and offers a wide scope of experiences to students.

Each year new instructors are added. This spring John McGuire taught a Nantucket basketry class. McGuire, a self-taught basket maker, became interested in baskets twenty-two years ago as a collector and historian. While in graduate school in Boston and unable to finish his sculpture thesis on welded iron due to an allergic reaction to the metal, McGuire started making baskets. He has written a book, *Old New England Splint Baskets and How to Make Them*. He teaches workshops all over the U.S. and is resident basketmaker at Hancock Shaker Village in Pittsfield, MA. McGuire's class was an intense experience using traditional materials and techniques, and everyone finished his own Nantucket basket.

Since the late '60s, Cynthia Bringle has taught many ceramic sessions at Arrowmont. Bringle, a potter from Penland, NC, is a self-supporting craftsman whose line of production pottery sells throughout the country. Her twenty-five years of experience in ceramics makes her a knowledgeable, acute instructor.

Teapots were the focus of her spring workshop at

Arrowmont, with students making new forms, handles and spouts. With most of the students being professional potters, this class was useful, practical and productive.

Next fall Cynthia will be curating an exhibit for the main gallery at Arrowmont entitled "The Dripless Spout: Innovative Teapots."

Kathy Woell, also a returning faculty member, is a production weaver from Deer Isle, Maine. Woell's woven coats, jackets and vests are designed and constructed in her studio home. The business has grown since she first started weaving and making garments in the early '70s. She now employs weavers and seamstresses while she does the designing and pattern making. Her class at Arrowmont not only emphasized weaving construction techniques, but the business aspects of being a studio craftsman and marketing products. Her students, some beginning and some advanced level weavers, all wove the material and constructed a garment in the week session.

All three instructors taught a practical and useful trade in one week and encouraged their students to continue to market and/or exhibit their craft.

Date rape is a hot topic on many campuses, but often it is not one that people are willing to recognize in their own communities. Because a major study on acquaintance rape at Cornell University concluded that the problem is prevalent, New York Delta was forced, along with every woman in the Cornell community, to face this issue head on. In December, Denice Cassaro (residence life) and Roz Kenworthy (university health services) conducted a workshop at the chapter house to enlighten Pi Phis on the subject. The importance of educating men was not overlooked, and twenty-three brothers from Sigma Nu were also present.

After an introduction by Roz Kenworthy in which she defined acquaintance rape and cited frightening statistics about its frequency, the workshop began. The casual "this could only happen to other people" tone of the evening quickly evaporated as Denice Cassaro read the first fictional scenario. This told the story of Karl, a student who assumed her attitude against premarital sex was insincere because of the way she dressed, who forced himself upon his girlfriend.

Participants broke into four groups, two of women and two of men, to discuss the situation and answer some basic questions.

Is it rape?

How do you think Karl is feeling right now? His girlfriend?

What could have been done to avoid this situation?

What should be done now?

The entire group reconvened and an interesting discussion followed. On the whole, men were more likely to understand why Karl thought that his girlfriend was "really asking for it." Sisters disagreed vehemently with many of the assertions that the male groups made and brought up points that they had failed to consider, such as the possibility of pregnancy. Suddenly, a strange and wonderful thing happened—the men were really listening! They asked compassionate questions and sincerely attempted to relate the answers to their own experiences.

Denice began to read a second scenario, in which a woman attempted to seduce a man. The same questions were asked, and the responses from the sexes were more similar.

A heated discussion evolved over the issue of power. Most men can use physical force successfully against women and this was not an issue in the second scenario. Still, the men made a powerful argument for the mental pressure that could have been involved.

The evening closed with a discussion of less specific issues and both Pi Phis and Sigma Nus took pains to be honest and learn from each other. Some of the guys even began to say "woman" instead of "girl!"

The mayor is a lady and a busy Pi Phi too

The Westchester, NY and Southern Fairfield County, CT Alumnae Clubs held a joint Founders' Day luncheon April 23 at the Woodway Country Club in Darien, CT and their speaker was "one of our own," Sheila Smith Stein, Minnesota Alpha.



The popular, vivacious, and many-faceted Sheila was sworn in April 6 as the mayor of Bronxville, NY, a suburb north of New York City, having already served two terms as a Trustee of the Village. Politics has long been an interest for Sheila, who was involved in earlier campaigns of George Bush, whom she describes as "a close friend."

Following her original career as a teacher in Minnesota schools, Sheila moved to Houston, where she was Director of Women's Banking and vice president of the River Oaks Bank.

Married to Dr. Ralph Bowen, in the early '60s she accompanied her physician husband to a post in East Africa. There he undertook a surgical fellowship with two other plastic surgeons, operating the Flying Doctor Service in Africa. The founder had a long-standing relationship with Albert Schweitzer, and once a year his surgical team flew the

12,000 miles from Nairobi to spend six weeks on site at Lambarene, operating on the lepers who needed plastic surgery. Sheila and Dr. Bowen lived in Kenya during an exciting time, the year of its independence. Their first child was born there. These African experiences were the subject of her Founders' Day message.

Dr. Bowen died in 1968. Sheila later married Dr. Martin F. Stein, Jr., now Medical Director of St. Joseph's Hospital in Yonkers, NY. "Starting Over" was the theme of an earlier Founders' Day message, in which she described the happy-hectic process of melding three families—his (2), hers (3), and theirs, baby Maggie, now 10 years old.

Having by then moved to Bronxville, Sheila became a member and later chairman of the high school council, a director of Eastchester's Family Consultation Service, and founder and president of the Bronxville Youth Council. In 1983, former Mayor William Bell appointed her to the zoning board of appeals.

After her 1984 election as trustee, Sheila became active in the village's parking task force and later that same year received the Concordia College President's Medal for excellence in educational service to the community. In May of this year she was further honored when Concordia College extended an invitation to deliver the major commencement address.

"I was so delighted," she reflected, "but I couldn't believe they'd ask me—I thought they'd want someone *famous!*"

For unassuming Sheila, who considers her life very ordinary, it's all in a day's work. This may explain why she is so well loved by all who know her—and such a tribute to Pi Phi!

Children's author wins John Newberry Medal

Patricia Pritzkau MacLachlan, Connecticut Alpha, is winner of the 66th John Newberry Medal for her novel, *Sarah, Plain and Tall*. The medal is awarded for "the most distinguished contribution to literature for children published in the United States."

Patricia spoke at a recent Cape Cod Alumnae Club's meeting. With all the celebrity fallout of a Newberry Award, she remains an unpretentious, enthusiastic lady who makes the writing of prize-winning novels seem easy and make believe seem real.

There have been many reviews of *Sarah, Plain and Tall*. I like the one by Eden Ross Lipson, Editor of The Book Review:

"The 58-page book, poignant and affecting even to weary adults, is the simplest of love stories expressed in the simplest prose. A young girl living somewhere on the prairie with her widowed father and little brother toward the end of the 19th century tells how Sarah, a mail-order bride from Maine, came into their lives."

Patty has lived for twenty years in a 200-year-old house in Northampton, MA and she summers in Orleans on Cape Cod. She began to write in her mid-30s after her children were in school. She says that without the unfailing support of her husband, Robert, a psychologist, there would have been no Newberry Medal for her. Through all the rejection slips at the beginning, his constant advice to "keep writing" was crucial to her career.

Characters and stories in her books all came from memories of her childhood. An only child herself, she said, "Looking back, I see that I write books about brothers and sisters, about what makes up a family, what works and what is nurturing."

Her experience in the field of social work and as a teacher of young children helped mold her style. Patty says she also eavesdrops a lot, talks to everyone, especially on planes, and listens carefully to her own children, John, Jamie and Emily.

Other books by Patricia are *Moon, Stars, Frogs and Friends*, *The Sick Day*, *Tomorrow's Wizard*, *Arthur, for the Very First Time*, *Cassie Binigar*, *Unclaimed Treasures*, *Seven Kisses in a Row* and *Through Grandpa's Eyes*.

Each spring she teaches a popular introductory course on children's literature at Smith College for the local five-college consortium. She also goes into many classrooms, mostly in Massachusetts, and works with children, which "takes more energy than anything."

Patty is a delightful speaker. The same warmth and humor that are in her writing comes through to her listeners. She fielded questions from the Cape Cod alums and, when asked about future books, Patty said she has the *beginnings* of about twenty-eight in her head.

"The variety of students we entertain makes the show more exciting," Oster said.

The hour long production consists of two skits and a slide show. Benefits of the program are numerous.

"The skits get the students involved and that helps them remember the animals a little bit more, and adds to the spontaneity of the program," Oster said.

Oster and Owen are provided with a state car and are paid \$500.00 a month.

"The money sure helps and it's fun getting paid to do something you enjoy," Oster said.

And Suzanne does enjoy acting. Since being at OSU, she has participated in six shows, but her acting career did not begin in college.

"I've been doing some sort of entertainment since the age of five. I've always been a performer whether it be dancing or singing," Oster said.

Suzanne, who lives in Atherton, CA, plans to transfer to UCLA next fall, so why did she pick OSU?

"At first my major was physical therapy and OSU has an excellent school for physical therapy. When I got here, I auditioned for a show on campus, got the part and I've been stuck in overdrive ever since," Oster explained.

This vivacious, bubbly and energetic woman brings to life Mrs. Fish and her surroundings with such an ease one would not think it was acting. Suzanne credits her success to her learning experience at OSU and her family.

"I've learned so much here, I would not trade it for the world. I'm thankful for all the shows I participated in. My family has also been the support system that I can count on," Oster said.

“Blackbird” flies with personal items of six

Six California Iota Pi Phis each had the honor of having a personal belonging fly in the world's fastest, highest flying aircraft, the SR-71 "Blackbird."

This opportunity arose for the chapter when alumna initiate Lisa Merlo Pappas, wife of SR-71 pilot Major Terry Pappas, offered the chance to tour Beale Air Force Base in Marysville, CA, home of the SR-71.

Merlo also informed that as part of the personalized tour, six people, chosen by the group, could have a personal item fly in the SR-71. This is a tremendous honor.

Selected by majority vote, Andrea Austin, Kathy Hall, Kathleen Hatfield (RGC), Carrie Miller, Madeline Smith and Sherry Tellam handed in jewelry items of personal value.

Thirty-one girls, including Lisa and her Pi Phi mother, Betty Henkel Merlo, treasurer of California Iota House Corporation, toured Beale AFB.

At Beale they visited the training branch, the base museum, hangars of the SR-71s and the Officer's Club.

Employees at Beale were extraordinarily accommodating to the Pi Phis. They explained functioning of the SR-71s and Beale's other operations.

Many questions about the SR-71 were answered but some couldn't be. California Iotas' curiosity about exactly how fast the SR-71 flies, how many SR-71s exist or whether or not any SR-71s have been shot at or destroyed was answered with, "I'm sorry, that's classified information."

What can be known about the SR-71 is that its primary function is strategic reconnaissance, otherwise known as spying. It supports national intelligence requirements on an almost daily basis. Its aircrews operate from overseas as well as from the aircraft's home at Beale.

The SR-71 can fly more than 2,000 MPH (Mach 3+), above 80,000 feet and more than 2,000 miles at Mach 3. It flies around the world with aerial refueling and is capable of surveying over 100,000 square miles each hour.

The SR-71 has set numerous speed and altitude records, all of which hold firm today.

Major Pappas said the speed of the SR-71 is comparable to a bullet coming out of a rifle. Its take-off speed is 200 MPH.

At the end of the Beale AFB tour, California Iota's President Debbie Bateman was presented a 17" x 21" photograph of an SR-71, autographed by each SR-71 aircrew member.

The girls then went out to the runway and watched an SR-71 take off, circle around and fly directly overhead—a truly body-shaking experience.

Plans underway for parents' fun



- Send to Central Office the name and address of newly elected Chapter Membership Chairman on postcard provided in spring.
- Send the Membership/Panhellenic Rush Report, prepared jointly with the Panhellenic Delegate, to the Director of Membership and Rush and the NPC Delegate within ten days of each formal rush. Copy to Province President.
- May 10—Send report of Pledge-Initiation Statistics to Grand Vice President of Membership. Copies to Director of Membership and Rush and Director of Pledge Development.

PANHELLENIC DELEGATE:

- As available—send copy of Panhellenic Rush Booklet to NPC Delegate.
- Send the Membership/Panhellenic Rush Report, prepared jointly with the Membership Chairman, to the Director of Membership and Rush and the NPC Delegate within ten days of each formal rush. Copy to Province President.

VICE PRESIDENT OF MORAL ADVANCEMENT:

Within one month after installation (deadline: May 1), send a report listing and explaining chapter goals in all areas of Moral Advancement (including philanthropies) for the coming year to the Director of Undergraduate Activities. Also send written program for Fraternity heritage. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.

One month before term of office expires, send overall evaluation of achievements in all areas of Moral Advancement (including philanthropies) to Director of Undergraduate Activities. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.

Within first 2 weeks of each term—Conduct Member Interest Survey of *personal* and *chapter* needs and goals. (Will determine special interest groups and activities for each term.) Send to Executive Council for chapter action and for inclusion in monthly letter to Province President.

February 15—Final date for Active Evaluation. Whenever total number for active chapter is complete send to Province Coordinator for Fraternity Excellence with Form 305 and list of signatures. Evaluations must be received by the Province Coordinator by the February 15 deadline.

NOTE: Fraternity Heritage Interest Group should first review each essay for ideas of immediate value and use to chapter and submit a written summary to Executive Council and AAC *before* sending all evaluations on to Province Coordinator. A copy of the summary is to be included with the active evaluations to be sent to the Province Coordinator.

April 15—Music Report, send to National Music Chairman.

April 30—Send entry for May L. Keller Award to Chairman, Arrowmont Board of Governors.

VICE PRESIDENT OF SOCIAL ADVANCEMENT:

Within one month after installation (deadline: May 1), send a report listing and explaining chapter goals in all areas of Social Advancement for the coming year to the Director of Pledge Development. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.

Send Major Formal Rush Evaluation within 2 weeks of close of rush to Director of Membership and Rush. Copy to Province President and AAC Chairman.

Send List of Pledges with parents' names & addresses within ten days of pledging to Central Office, Province President, and Province Coordinator.

Within one month after pledging, send to parents of pledges: letter from VP Social (previously approved by Province President), letter from Grand Treasurer, and Pi Beta Phi brochure, with financial page completed in consultation with chapter treasurer.

Send Pledge Tests 3 weeks before initiation to Province Coordinator for Fraternity Excellence with Form #205.

NOTE: The Fraternity Orientation Interest Group, *meeting with the AAC*, is to review each pledge's written evaluation and compile pertinent information *before* sending all evaluations on to the Province Coordinator.

Send Pledge Program Evaluation Report to Director of Pledge Development within 10 days after major initiation. Deadline for year: May 1. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.

VICE PRESIDENT OF MENTAL ADVANCEMENT:

1. *Goals and Evaluation*

Within one month after installation (deadline: May 1), send a report listing and explaining chapter goals in all areas of Mental Advancement for the coming year to the Director of Academic Standards. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.

One month before term of office expires, send overall evaluation of achievements in all areas of Mental Advancement to Director of Academic Standards. Copies to Province President and AAC Chairman.
