At least one of the 2,500 delegates to the White House Conference on Aging last December was a Pi Phi. Carolyn Reid Sisney, Illinois Theta, was chosen by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, Richard Schweiker, as one of the twenty delegates from Arkansas. In addition to the delegates, the conference, held every ten years, was attended by 1,500 observers and 200 foreign observers. The group was divided into 14 committees, which together made 680 suggestions to benefit the elderly. Carolyn is a professional music teacher and taught music at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., her alma mater, for 28 years prior to her move to Hot Springs, Ark., where she and her husband now live.

This item comes a full year late but cannot be ignored. Anna Smedley Bartram, Pennsylvania Alpha, celebrated her 100th birthday June 6 of last year, so that by the time you receive this, she will have celebrated her 101st birthday. This "young" centenarian is pictured on page 28. Anna was born in Chester County, Pa., was married, and had one son. She taught at Darby Friends School, worked with the American Friends Service Committee, served as a volunteer in the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting office, and worked for twenty-five years with the Paoli Public Library. Her sister, Lauretta Smedley Dutton, was one of the charter members of Pennsylvania Alpha at Swarthmore College. That chapter surrendered its charter in 1934 because of anti-fraternity legislation by college authorities. Loving congratulations are sent to Anna from Pi Phis everywhere.

We loved a letter we received from Geraldine DeBenedetti Senner, Nevada Alpha. She writes, "... [I] have been carefully raising my legacy all these years, and when my daughter, Cassie, graduated from high school in Honolulu in June, 1981, we flew to Gatlinburg to go to Arrowmont summer school together—the last chance at the mother-daughter relationship. It was outstanding. We stayed in the same dorm, took the same class, and had a lovely time. As we say in Hawaii, no ka oi!

"Then on to Reno, Nevada, to the University of Nevada and fall registration. Gerry went to the Pi Phi house to look around and found the 1958 Outstanding Pledge paddle hanging on the living room wall with her name on it. 23 years later, living proof! Well, after all that, what else, Cassie Senner pledged Pi Phi. Mom sent flowers to both daughter and the house, with the message "I know that you've chosen right." Gerry is back in Hawaii now, both mother and daughter are doing fine. Not too many long distance phone calls. Happiness is Pi Beta Phi."

We remember Gerry from the Miami Convention in 1975, when she arrived as a delegate from her Honolulu club loaded down with orchid leis which were presented to all the national officers.

If you carefully read the write-up of the NPC Convention in the last issue of *The ARROW*, you noted that the National Panhellenic Editors Conference presented a public relations package entitled "Going Greek in the Eighties." One-third of the package is a 22x28" full color poster of the badges of each member group. In addition, a slide show of approximately eight minutes, with sound synchronization, carousel, cassette tape, instructions, script, and professionally produced, is available for sale. The third part of the package is a pamphlet designed to accompany the slide show, though it may be used separately. This public relations package was prepared by NPEC to introduce the freshman student to the benefits of "going Greek." The materials are also useful for active and alumnae member education, Greek displays, meeting and convention entertainment, and should be used by member groups, alumnae Panhellenics, campus Panhellenics, and Offices of Greek Affairs. The posters are \$4 each (3 for \$10.75); the pamphlets, \$12.50 for package of 100; the slide show, \$95. We hope that Pi Phi alumnae clubs and active chapters will urge their respective Panhellenics to take advantage of these excellent presentations. ## Morgan Tradition Continues At Colorado State

Just west of the historic oval drive, Colorado State University's yellow stone buildings merge with new red brick buildings. The difference in architecture marks the separation of past and present—Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College and Colorado State University.

The modern additions, which stretch toward the foothills, were erected during William E. Morgan's presidency from 1949 to 1969. He recognized a need for the college's expansion and blended the structures of the new campus with the old.

Among the developments were the majority of dormitories; the student center, which houses many student oriented services; Moby Gym Sports Complex, the scene of numerous CSU sports events, an international gymnastic meet, and even a movie; Hughes Stadium nestled beneath the large "A" on the mountainside and home of Rams football; and the library, later named for Mr. Morgan.

During Morgan's term, the "Aggies" evolved to the CSU Rams, and the student body grew from 3,400 to 15,000, with comparable faculty growth. He also saw a need to expand the Greek system, and consulted his wife, Lila Bryan Morgan, a Pi Phi alumna from Texas Beta. With his encouragement, she explored the possibility of adding a Pi Phi chapter at CSU.

Mrs. Morgan and Grand Treasurer Lolita Snell Prouty made preparations for Grand Council to come to Fort Collins in 1951.

"We worked awfully hard, but had such a good time," Mrs. Morgan remembered. "The national officers visited in 1952 and were interested."

In 1954, newly colonized Colorado Gamma participated in rush for the first time. "We came out all right and pledged a good number of girls against well-established competition. National gave us support in every way. That's what a strong organization with a good reputation, as Pi Phi can do to help individual chapters get started," she boasted.

The first chapter house was on the main street and, in 1964, the present house was built.

The Pi Phi tradition in the Morgan family has continued. Their daughter, Dorcas Morgan Murray, is a Pi Phi from Colorado Alpha, and their granddaughter, Laura Murray, is currently a Colorado Gamma active.

Every student at CSU has gained from the Morgans' contributions. These prominent Fort Collins citizens were helpful in establishing not only Colorado Gamma, but the university itself.

#### Laura Loomer

Laura received her Bachelor of Arts degree, with high distinction, in May, 1981, from the University of Virginia. During the past year she has been House Director for her Virginia Epsilon chapter, a position she served with seriousness and maturity.

Laura's history major indicates her original plan to become a lawyer. It wasn't until her third year in college that she finally admitted to herself that she had no real enthusiasm for the law, and her attraction to medicine surfaced. She realized that it was important to her to maintain fellowship with others.

The field of academic medicine is beginning to open up for women. Laura wants to combine patient care with clinical research and informal instruction of medical students. However, academic medicine is almost totally dominated by men.

"I think that the pioneering spirit within me is partially responsible for my attraction to this area of medicine!" writes Laura. "I feel that academic medicine would be most challenging because it would offer me the simultaneous opportunities to continue to seek knowledge while teaching students and patients."

One of her history professors at the university notes that Laura's background as a history major "should be considered an asset in weighing her potential as a medical student. In an era of careerism and over-specialization, she offers the kind of broad, humane learning rare among today's young professionals."

Another professor wrote that "not the least of her strengths is her natural gift as leader and organizer. She relishes human interaction, problem-solving, and constant intellectual stimulation, and I am delighted to observe the exhilaration she feels at this point in her life when academic and extracurricular success both have converged to give her direction and motivation."

Thus, once again, two outstanding young Pi Phi sisters are being aided in their academic pursuits by Fellowships from their Fraternity.

## Two Are Selected For Fellowships

Each year Grand Council of Pi Beta Phi selects one or more Fraternity graduates to receive the Pi Beta Phi Fellowship. The award is based on scholastic standing of the applicant, as well as the "all-around development of character with its resultant ability worthy to represent the Fraternity." The recipient must have received her bachelor's degree and the award is available for use in any university.

Two young women have earned the 1982-83 Fellowships in the amount of \$1,500 each—Velma (Vykie) Smoyer, Colorado Gamma, and Laura Loomer, Virginia Epsilon. Vykie will be pursuing a Master of Science degree in Energy Management and Policy at the University of Pennsylvania. Laura has been accepted by the University of Virginia Medical School where she plans to pursue a career in academic medicine.

#### Vykie Smoyer

Vykie earned her Bachelor of Science in geology from Colorado State University in August, 1979. During the ensuing years, she has worked with the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville, Tenn., as an engineering geologist, and the United States Geological

Survey as a geologic field assistant in a minerals exploration and evaluation project in northern Michigan.

These positions helped her define her career objectives and she is personally concerned as well as academically interested in problems in the field of energy management.

Writes Vykie, "The energy problem is multidisciplinary and requires professionals with a broad understanding of the overall industry. My goal is to be one of those professionals."

As a collegian Vykie was selected for membership in Phi Beta Kappa, Xi Sigma Pi and Gamma Sigma Delta Honor societies; was president of the University chapter of Society of Mining Engineers of A.I.M.E.; secretary of the C.S.U. Geology Club, Vice President of Mental Advancement of her Pi Phi chapter; student representative on faculty and various college committees, intramural player, coach, and referee.

A Pi Phi sister who was a chapter vice president along with Vykie, Mary Jo McGinnies, notes that Vykie "was a constant source of support to the other officers." She was dedicated to the chapter scholastic program, and many of the scholastic programs she initiated are still being utilized by the chapter

## Harvard Names 1st Woman Dean

Effective July 1, 1982, Patricia Albjerg Graham, Wisconsin Alpha and Indiana Delta, will become the first woman dean in the 345-year history of Harvard University. She has been named dean of the Graduate School of Education which has 1,000 students and about 75 faculty members, and Patricia feels she is getting some of the credit her mother should have received many years ago.



It was in 1927 when Marguerite Hall Albjerg, Indiana Alpha, arrived at Purdue with a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin. But she couldn't get a regular appointment there. Her husband taught history at the University, retiring in 1963. He died in 1973. Her mother later taught history, government, and sociology at Purdue, and finally worked on the dean of women's staff. She died in 1971.

Pat was raised in the Pi Phi tradition. In addition to her mother, four aunts had been Indiana Alpha sisters. Pat was pledged and initiated at the University of Wisconsin in 1952, but transferred to Purdue her sophomore year and affiliated with Indiana Delta. In 1955, she was graduated with highest distinction with a degree in English. Her husband, Loren, received his degree in chemical engineering.

Following a stint in the navy for Loren, during which time Pat taught high school English, a daughter was born, and Pat had enrolled and completed a master's degree in English and

guidance. Loren received a fellowship at Columbia University to work on a Ph.D. in Russian history. That allowed Pat to take courses there—free. She started teaching in a New York City high school.

"I decided to take a course at Columbia and the one course in American history that was taught when Loren could baby-sit was the history of education," Pat says.

In 1964, they both received Ph.D.s from Columbia.

In 1974, Patricia became a professor of history education at Harvard and dean and eventually vice president of Radcliff. In 1977, President Jimmy Carter named her director of the National Institute of Education, which had a \$100 million annual budget.

"We did a lot of research in improving the teaching of reading and improving teaching generally," she says. "We did some research on how children learn mathematics."

In 1979, she left and returned to Harvard. Her husband is also there.

"I certainly hope that in the next 345 years they'll have a lot more women deans than they have had in the past. One of the things that has happened in the past 15 years is there are more opportunities for women in all the professions than there were 20 or 30 years ago," she says.

Patricia Graham is very happy with her appointment as a dean "I'm very pleased about it," she says. "I certainly hadn't been counting on this."

"I'm sorry my parents aren't alive to help me enjoy it."

Pat received an honorary doctorate from Purdue last year. In December she was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C., and she is writing a book.

# Governor's Pi Phi Wife Cites Mansion Changes

The Dallas Pi Phi alumnae, as well as Texas Beta actives, had a real treat last November! Rita Crocker Clements, Texas Alpha, the wife of Texas Governor William P. Clements, Jr., spoke to the group at the SMU Pi Phi house about the restoration and renovation of the Governor's Mansion in Austin. The Pi Phi Junior Night Alumnae Group arranged this event, and it proved to be an evening of fun and learning. Mrs. Clements made the governor's house seem more like a home with some of her tales of past governors who resided there.

Built in 1856, the mansion in Austin is the fourth oldest governor's mansion in the United States. Thirty-five families have lived there, the first being the Pease family. Mrs. Clements related that Mrs. Pease was skeptical about moving in at all since, at that time, Austin's population was barely 3,000 and cattle literally roamed the streets.

"Mrs. Pease was afraid that indians might kidnap her children," Mrs. Clements said, laughing.

Governor James Hogg was elected to office in 1891 and was the first native-born Texan to live in the mansion. His children were known to slide down the banister, especially during the middle of parties. To put a stop to this, Governor Hogg drove nails into the banister.

"We will leave the nail holes there as a part of history," said Mrs. Clements.

Mrs. Clements emphasized that a major objective in restoring and renovating the mansion is to incorporate modern conveniences with history. One of the bedrooms will be named after Governor and Mrs. Pease. Among its furnishings is a four-post wooden bed, found in the State Archives, from the period in which the Peases lived.

Another bedroom will be named in honor of Governor Sam Houston. He and his family were the third occupants of the mansion. Portraits of Governor and Mrs. Houston are being restored and will be hung in the front parlor.

"Every piece in the mansion is absolute museum quality," said Mrs. Clements. "We literally searched all over the country for many of them."



## Another Arrowmont First

In recognition of the interest shown in leather as an art medium, Arrowmont was host to the first national conference on leather and an invitational gallery exhibition "Forms of Leather." The conference provided an opportunity for professional and serious amateur leather workers to join together sharing information concerning techniques, materials and tools and exploring new concepts for design. The exhibition brought together the work of 36 contemporary leather workers in a survey of functional and non-functional objects.

In the past Arrowmont has co-sponsored several workshops with state, regional and national organizations including the American Craft Council, Southern Highland Handicraft Guild, Surface Design Association, National Council for the Education of Ceramic Artists, the American Home Economics Association, the National Art Education Association, and the Tennessee Arts Commission. This national conference on leather, however, was a first, not only because of the medium feature, but because there is no leather organization for which we could receive support in assisting us with any facet of the conference. The conference and accompanying exhibition became a reality and leather conferees are convinced of their need for an organizational structure to give them viability and visibility.




## Fan Fans Exhibit Forms

"The Fan/New Form—New Function" was a competitive national exhibition sponsored by Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts, which was on display December 5-February 6, 1982, in the Arrowmont Gallery. Hundreds of visitors were attracted to the school to see the exhibit, which included work in a variety of media.

The focus of this exhibition was to explore new meanings as related to the fan and to project new forms and functions in any two or three dimensional media, including clay, fabric, fiber, metal, wood and paper. The juror for the exhibition was Thomas Riesing, Associate Professor of Art, Department of Art, University of Tennessee, Knoxville. Riesing, a painter/printmaker who exhibits internationally, selected 124 pieces by 100 artists from 450 entries.

In stating his impressions about the exhibit, Riesing made these comments: "Where the professional presentation of the work greatly facilitated my task, the high quality of the pieces made the selection process very difficult. These (selected) pieces best demonstrated for me that subjected blend of personal vision and the purposeful interpretation of that vision through a chosen medium or mixed media. Having used the fan image in my own work for the last three years, I sincerely enjoyed seeing the many unique interpretations of the fan form. I believe that it is an excellent exhibition."

An Arrowmont purchase award was made to Jan Yager, Providence, Rhode Island, for a copper "Fan Container."

## Fall Conference Is Planned

Arrowmont School and the southeast region of the American Craft Council will sponsor a three day conference at Arrowmont, October 6-9. The conference will offer a varied program of demonstrations, slide lectures, seminars, and panel discussions. Concurrent with the conference will be the juried exhibition "Spotlight '82: Southeast Crafts."

## Spring Classes Are Success

With the exception of one day of snow, the weather was beautiful and warm—just right as a welcome for the many students who attended spring classes at Arrowmont.

Five one week classes featuring weaving, quilting, textile resist, printing techniques, jewelry, metalsmithing, enameling, blacksmithing, clay working, photography, papermaking, and painting were offered. In addition, many production oriented students and several retirees attended.

The curriculum, special programs, and the general environment of the school offered the student the opportunity for personal, technical, and creative growth.

# To My Pi Phi Sisters, With Love . . .

This is a story about legacies and love. Do you have a Pi Phi legacy, or did you, or do you hope to? Then this story about my two daughters is for you.

By the time my first daughter, Cathy, went through rush I had been an active member of three different alum clubs. That year we had moved again, and I was dragging my feet about getting involved again. (You know, going through the agony of all the strange faces again, the serving on telephone or program or Arrowcraft committee again—I mean, it's an effort!)

Of course I wanted Cathy to be a Pi Phi, but I didn't really think about it much at the time. I told her that it would be nice, but "I want you to make your own decision." I made sure a couple Pi Phis wrote letters on her behalf, and I also made sure she had recs to many other groups. After all, the important thing was for her to have a "good rush"—right? Well, she did. She called me every day and it was very exciting and the tension was building. She kept going back to Pi Phi and gave me good reports ("Mom, you should see their beautiful, light blue carpeting!"), and for final parties she went to Pi Phi and Gamma Phi Beta. Then the last phone call came. Gamma Phi Beta.

She said, "I just decided I liked the Gamma Phis better, Mom. You don't really care, do you?"

I said, "No, sweetie, it's okay. It's your decision." And congratulations.

I was not at all prepared for what that decision did to my insides. In private, I cried. Then, after deep introspection, I realized how much of a Pi Phi I really am—how deep the wine and silver blue go into my very bones—and how very much I would have liked to share that dear relationship with my own daughter. I felt very mad at myself for not recognizing my deep attachment and expressing it to Cathy before rush. Surely she would have gone Pi Phi had she only known! But it took her decision against Pi Phi for me to wake up to how strongly I feel about being a Pi Phi! I was thankful that at least I'd learned something about myself, and I threw myself into work with my "new" club with great joy, as if I'd been pledged all over again.

Time went by, and my renewed Pi Phi zeal was rewarded with the marvelous job of delegate to Convention. Then I was elected alumnae province president. More time went by, we moved again, and I was elected Director of Alumnae Activities. And while I was becoming more and more immersed in Pi Phi, my second daughter, Linda, was growing up and getting ready to take off for college . . . and rush.

I allowed myself to hope. Surely this time it would be different . . . since Linda was aware of my devotion to Pi Phi. She knew many of my Pi Phi friends with Pi Phi daughters, and she knew how I felt about that special relationship.

Cathy, in the meantime, expressed to both of us her contradicting feeling about not wanting Linda to be a Pi Phi ("two against one!"), but understanding what it would mean to me and wanting me to have that pleasure with Linda. Funny, but now that I think back I realize that the possibility that Linda might go Gamma Phi was never mentioned!

Linda didn't rush until second semester. By that time she had made friends with several Pi Phis, had repeatedly told me how beautiful the Pi Phi house is and how nice all the Pi Phis are. When she came home for Christmas she was so excited about the prospect of rush she could hardly wait. I heard her mention that the top groups seemed so similar that she was sure she'd be happy with any of them and that she might as well go Pi Phi "because of Mom." Her main reaction to her first semester grades (3.94!) was what a help that would be in rush.

At that point, a week before rush, I tried to low-key Pi Phi. I decided that if she didn't know by then how much I wanted her to be a Pi Phi, she never would! And besides I wanted it to be her decision—I really did! I didn't want her to feel pressured—I really didn't!

I did try to lay a couple of ground rules. I had learned that in most chapters invitation of a legacy to final party means automatic placement on the top of the first bid list, so I thought that it was only fair to the chapter (as well as to me!) if Linda was going to cut Pi Phi that she do it before final party. I also told her that I didn't want her calling me every day during rush the way Cathy had. I knew I was going to be under enough tension without that!

I was busy counting my chickens before the eggs were laid. When I hugged her goodbye at the airport, my main thoughts were joy that the next time I was with her she would be a Pi Phi pledge and regret that I just couldn't swing flying out for her pledging. I had collected a few little Pi Phi things to send her—angel stationery, a bookmark, my old arrow bracelet—and they waited in my bottom drawer. I mentally composed a telegram.

At the same time, I was mindful of Annette Mills' letter on legacies in which she emphasized that we now have too many legacies to pledge them all, and the important thing is to "think Greek." So in addition to the 7 Pi Phi friends who had written letters for Linda, I made sure that she had recs from all the other groups. Linda was not only a legacy to Pi Phi and Gamma Phi, but also to Delta Gamma and Alpha Xi Delta, through her two grandmothers (both deceased). I felt confident that she, like Cathy, would have a good rush.

It began, and she did call me everyday. "I really want to share this with you, Mom—it's so exciting!" How could I refuse? She mainly talked about Pi Phi.

It wasn't until the day of the final parties (Pi Phi and DG) that she called and said, "Mom, will you still love me if I don't pledge Pi Phi?" It wasn't until then she told me how much she liked the DGs.

I did *not* want Linda to pledge Pi Phi because I wanted her to. I desperately wanted her to choose Pi Phi because of Pi Phi—and because she decided to share that bond with me. But at eighteen, who thinks in terms of a lifetime? She said, "I know the DGs like me for me." No way could I persuade her that so did the Pi Phis.

My first reaction was that Linda had suddenly rebelled against me. And inside I screamed for her to choose any other way but this. But outwardly I couldn't talk much because of the heart in my mouth. And because at this point, as at so many other acute moments in mothering, I felt that whatever I said would be wrong. Of course I told her that I would love her no matter what she did. I told her that it was her decision.

The next night was bid night. Linda first choice: Delta Gamma. The phone call was one of those memories I'd rather forget—I didn't react with poise and grace. I cried. If a vice squeezed my heart the first time around with Cathy, this time a hammer-lock took hold of my soul.

Why am I sharing this agony with you? Because if we're so insistent about sharing the joy of our Pi Phi bond together, then we must also share the anguish. And for all of us with legacies, we must share the painful disappointment when those legacies do *not* become Pi Phis. Many of you know what I feel. Many of your daughters have rejected Pi Phi too. And many of your daughters have been rejected by Pi Phi. Why? Is it something we, as mothers, have done wrong?

I had lots of feedback in those first few days when I couldn't think, just feel. My husband sent me a basket of wine and blue flowers with a card saying "Hang in there!" The first night when I woke up in the wee hours and ached all over, he held me while I cried it out. Reacting to my pain, he was furious at Linda.

My closest friend since birth (a Kappa!) said, "Good for Linda!" She thought the decision was a step towards independence and maturity, a sign of strength to be able to go her own path, "do her own thing." She doesn't always tell me what I want to hear—but she helped me on the road to understanding, and wisely chided me out of self-pity. She made me realize how large my Pi Phi presence is—and how overwhelming to an eighteen year old who's trying to grow up.

A good Pi Phi friend, who has a Pi Phi daughter, confided that it took her daughter a year to believe that her chapter liked her for her and not her mother. Other Pi Phi mothers have told me the same—but their daughters had chosen Pi Phi anyway. Does that mean Linda is "stronger"—or "weaker?" Does that mean our mother-daughter relationship is less close? Did I just botch the whole thing, not expressing my own desire enough to Cathy and expressing it too much to Linda?

Or did she just like the DGs better than the Pi Phis? Was it just that simple? No inner rebellion, no striving for independence from me, no deep psychological meanings? Linda says that's all it is. She tells me now that she would have cut Pi Phi sooner, but "I kept trying to like them best." If that's so, and if that's happening on many campuses, then aren't our chapters measuring up? Or is it just that

there are "different strokes for different folks?"

Many of my sympathizers have said, "Be thankful she chose such a strong national group." Yes, I am thankful. If Pi Phi had to lose her, we lost her to one of the best!

But I'm sorry Pi Phi lost her—lost both my daughters. We need them, and hundreds like them. If it was my fault in some way, I'm sorry, Pi Phi, I'm sorry.

Now that more time has passed, and I can think as well as feel, I realize that Linda made the kind of decision I've taught her to make. She did what she believed was right for her. She wrote me a lovely, articulate letter on pledge day, attempting to explain her emotions and decision. In the vernacular of today, she said Pi Phi just didn't "fill my space like it did yours." She ended the letter with, "I love you eternally and am so glad that I have such a devoted Greek to follow after. Believe in me . . . Linda."

Well, I do believe in her.

I'll probably always feel a little sad that Cathy and Linda aren't Pi Phis too, but now that the hurt has passed, I harbor no sense of rejection, no resentments, no guilts. I am very thankful that my daughters have found meaningful sisterhoods that help to complement and fulfill their lives, just as I find in Pi Beta Phi. Our separate experiences in the greek world do not diminish our relationship.

But I'll always feel sorrow that Cathy and Linda aren't Pi Phis too.

Now that I've "seen the elephant," as the pioneer used to say, I'd like to pass along a few words of advice! First, if your legacy rejects Pi Phi, don't expect her to do so before final party. If she's trying to please you, she'll try to the bitter end.

Second, don't ask your daughter not to call—there is no way you can be spared the daily excitement, joy, tension, agony. So prepare yourself!

Third, it really is wise to remember that all of our chapters are very different—not only from each other today, but also each one is different from what it was when you were in college. Since I've become a director and am privileged to visit chapters, I know their variety in strengths and in spirit. In my opinion, 329 alum clubs nationwide are far more similar in makeup and spirit than are the 116 chapters. If we remember this variety and ever-changing conditions and competition on campuses, perhaps we will be understanding when our daughters do not choose Pi Phi. Perhaps we will hurt less when it happens. At the same time, let us remember that we must continue to help our chapters to be in the front ranks so that many of our daughters *will* choose Pi Phi!

Finally, I think it's important that we continue to encourage our legacies to follow our Pi Phi tradition. Yes, their Pi Phi heritage is one of our Fraternity's strengths. The continuing thread of family relationships lends depth and durability to our flexible Pi Phi tapestry. For those of us whose thread is broken, for whatever reason and at whomever choosing, we must heal the wound and not let it rip our cloth. We are still Pi Phis no matter what our daughters do. We can still find the fulfillment and joy with our sisters, even if they are not also our daughters.

Our daughters will always be our daughters, with that special bond of love. And our Pi Phi sisters will always be our sisters . . . with that special bond of love.

# Counselor Job Aids Adjustment

Karen Harragan, New York Delta, has been a Cornell Orientation Counselor for the past two semesters, meeting with incoming freshmen and transfers to make their adjustment to school easier. Working with these new students can take many forms—a talk over lunch or dessert, student olympics, dances, camping or hiking, or even sundae building contests! O.C.s take their "kids" on library and campus tours, speak with them in groups, and give a personal approach to assimilation to a strange environment. # Through Chapter Service Projects

Pi Beta Phi's own philanthropies benefited from the efforts of several chapters within recent months.

MONTANA ALPHA held its second annual "Catch a Cupid" dating game at Montana State in February. Bachelors and bachelorettes from dorms, fraternities, and sororities were contestants, hosted by Dr. Don Collins, a biology professor. Linda Bon was the Pi Phi contestant who won a perfect date and prizes donated by Bozeman merchants. Admission was \$1.00, and all the proceeds went to Arrowmont. V. P. Moral Cathy Lane organized the successful effort.

A whole-house effort by KANSAS ALPHA in a car wash raised money for Pi Phi philanthropies. The chapter also took first place for participation at Delta Gamma's Anchor Splash; first for Phi Delta Theta's work for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis. The chapter held a picnic dinner for handicapped children and co-sponsored, with Phi Gamma Delta, a Christmas party for underprivileged children in the Lawrence community.

GEORGIA ALPHA's Kidnap Social raised money for Pi Phi philanthropies. The chapter kidnapped presidents of the 26 fraternities and 16 sororities on the University of Georgia campus, as well as others from various campus clubs. They were taken to a local nightclub where a popular band was playing. Anyone could come and hear the band for a donation at the door, and it cost each organization \$15 to get their president back.

Every Sunday night, NEW YORK DELTA bakes up a storm. Cookie sales have become a weekly tradition. In about two hours, the Cornell chapter can make and sell ten dozen cookies and earn plenty of money for Arrowmont or Arrow in the Arctic.

The 1981 pledge class at VERMONT BETA held a "Tuck-In" as a fund raiser for Arrow in the Arctic. People from UVM signed up themselves or their friends to be tucked in one night by two pledges. They tucked in people all over the campus, in dorms, Greek houses, and off-campus housing. They were even asked to tuck in the president of the University. The pledges arrived with a choice of bedtime stories, a treat of cookies or candy, and a little cut-out Teddy bear!

The wind was cold and the temperature stood at 2 below, but that didn't stop a group of Pi Phis and Alpha Phi Omegas at Birmingham-Southern from taking part in a street party for United Cerebral Palsy. After an evening of fund raising, the group appeared on the local telethon at 2:30 a.m. to present their donation of \$515.75. Six ALABAMA ALPHAs participated.

Many COLORADO GAMMAS were directly responsible for \$11,000 raised for Easter Seals during a 24-hour dance-a-thon held in March. Kelley MacKay was one of the coordinators for the event at Colorado State University.

As their service project, the IOWA BETAs, along with the Lambda Chi Alphas of Simpson College, sponsored "The Party That Won't Quit," i.e., a Muscular Dystrophy Dance-a-thon. Approximately \$1,500 was raised.



Carol Heins was one of the Tennessee Deltas who helped Memphis State with its annual Alumni Phone-a-thon. The Phone-a-thon lasted for two weeks, and during their night to help, the Pi Phis raised approximately \$500 for the fund.

Beth Timmerman, SOUTH CAROLINA BETA, entered the Dance-a-Thon for Muscular Dystrophy, sponsored by Pi Kappa Alpha at Clemson. Beth and her partner, a cousin who has M.D., won a plaque and a 10-speed bicycle for the most money raised.

Pi Phi and Lambda Chi worked together again at Syracuse raising money of M.D. to go towards the annual university Dance Marathon. They have raised money through bake sales, carnation sales, a party at the campus Mason Jar, delivering pizzas, and a pancake breakfast. NEW YORK ALPHA Cindy Billone was in charge of the events.

FLORIDA EPSILON sold singing valentines the week before Valentine's Day, with all the proceeds going to the American Heart Association.

ONTARIO ALPHA Pi Phis were also involved with the Heart Fund. They sold roses at local theatres and restaurants to raise money to be used to finance medical research. That chapter also raised \$150 for a free clinic near the University of Toronto by baking goodies for a lunch hour bake sale.

"Games People Play" was the theme for ILLINOIS IOTA's annual Heart Fund efforts. The Illinois State Pi Phis and Alpha Kappa Lambdas organized competition in such activities as the electronic Pac Man game, the baseball throw, and the traditional kissing contest. Trophies were awarded for participation and local merchants gave donations.

The chapter also won third place in a variety show sponsored by Chi Omega, with all proceeds going to St. Jude's Hospital in Bloomington, Ill.

The Panhellenic Council at the University of Georgia held its annual fashion show spring quarter to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Each year the activity raises about \$5,000. Lisa Garrard, GEORGIA ALPHA, was fashion coordinator this year, and Terri Grimes and Susan Howell were models.

During a day filled with fun and play, TEXAS GAMMA's and Phi Delta Theta held their first blood drive at Texas Tech. Over fifty pints of blood were collected.

To raise money for their philanthropic projects, OREGON GAMMA, at Willamette University, sold M&Ms to the campus community and people at home for spring break.

OHIO ALPHAs fall pledges took the afternoon off during winter quarter at Ohio University to play "Mother, May I?" and musical chairs. They volunteered their time for the Athens shelter for battered women and entertained the children who usually go to a day care center.

NEW MEXICO BETA, along with all the Greek organizations on the New Mexico State campus, participated in the annual Alumnae Association phonathon. A total of \$15,538 was raised for scholarships and research projects. The chapter received an award for getting the most money pledged, with 213 pledges totalling \$3,848.

A check for \$800 went to New Mexico Beta's local philanthropy, Garcia Foster Home, as a result of the trampolinathon, held with Sigma Chi.

Several Pi Phis from INDIANA ETA participated in a community-wide "Focus on Health," sponsored by a local television station in Fort Wayne. The Pi Phi participated as runners, guides, and health screeners.

IOWA ZETAs paddled their way to second place in the annual Delta Gamma Anchor Splash, benefiting the Foundation for the Blind. They participated in a variety of contests and games, with a series of swimming events ending the week-long event at the University of Iowa.

TENNESSEE DELTA participated in the annual Bowl for Millions in February. United Way and Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Memphis sponsored the community-wide bowling tournament. The Pi Phi team raised \$75 for the cause.

Working with the Special Olympics provided a rewarding experience for CALIFORNIA BETAs. Along with Chi Phis at U.C. Berkeley, they spent an afternoon in February with those special people, swimming, playing basketball, arm wrestling, weight lifting, arts and crafts, and tumbling.

ILLINOIS ALPHA Pi Phis, along with Theta Chis, sponsored an all-campus dance as a money raiser for the new gym fund at Monmouth College. \$250 was presented to the college as a result of the activity.

MICHIGAN DELTA helps support the Big Brother/Big Sister program in Albion. For the past two years, they have presented their own version of "The Gong Show" to raise money for this organization. Students from Albion College participate in the event, before a panel of three judges.

On a Sunday in February, the Pi Phis of WEST VIRGINIA ALPHA were involved in a community fund raiser for the Emergency Medical Service in Morgantown. The Pi Phi represented a local business in a water polo game against local radio celebrities. Needless to say, the Pi Phi won.

As one of their newest service projects, KENTUCKY ALPHA visited Norton Children's Hospital in Louisville. The University of Louisville Pi Phi plan to supervise the

children's playroom there several times a month.

The University of Southern California CALIFORNIA GAMMAs paired with the Kappa Alpha Psi, Chi Phi, and Phi Psi to win Greek Week. This is a week full of activities to raise money for Troy Camp for under-privileged children.

Many are the ways of sharing and caring. When patients at the Convalescent home in Hattiesburg, Miss., say, "The children are coming today," chances are they are referring to members of MISSISSIPPI ALPHA who have adopted the nursing home as a new philanthropic project.

## Olympic Swimmer Is In Retirement

North Carolina Beta Nancy Hogshhead is a 1980 Olympic swimmer from Jacksonville, Florida. During her thirteen years as a swimmer, she has represented the United States in international competition nineteen times in thirteen foreign countries, including Egypt, Greece, Germany, Russia, Israel, Holland, and Taiwan. She has held several American and world records in the butterfly and individual medley events.

In 1977, Nancy was the only American ranked first in the world in an international event, the 200 butterfly. She received the Nathan Mallison Award for being Florida's outstanding amateur athlete, and was nominated for the Sullivan Award. She was undefeated in high school competition, breaking four national high school records.

In 1980, Nancy made the Olympic team in two events, the 400 individual medley and the 200 butterfly. Since the team didn't compete in Moscow, they toured Washington, D.C., China, and Hong Kong.

Currently, Nancy has retired from her swimming career to pursue other interests—academics, sailing, and Pi Phi!

## Vocalist Earns Honors In Competition

Nancy Elliott, Wisconsin Gamma, a spring graduate of Lawrence University, received top honors last winter in her field of vocal performance. Nancy was the second place winner of the Wisconsin Federation of Music Club's Women's Voice Competition at Alverno College in Milwaukee in February. # Casey Herschler Is Friend and Inspiration

From a cattle ranch in Arizona to the governor's mansion in Wyoming is no skip and a jump. But that long leap was the one taken by Kathleen Colter Herschler, Colorado Alpha, who has been Wyoming's First Lady for six years.

Casey, as she is known to nearly everyone, had her sights set on working in the fashion world during her college days at the University of Colorado, and did earn a degree in fashion merchandising. Instead, she decided to marry, raise a family, and work with her husband to build his successful political career.

She doted on high-fashion shoes in those earlier days. "But," she says matter-of-factly, "I can't wear them now anyway."

Instead, leg braces, canes, and a wheelchair have been frequent companions in Casey's 34-year struggle to overcome the effects of multiple sclerosis. In all that time, her physical condition has never been an obstacle in her drive to conquer life's frontiers.

"It's been a good character builder," she says of the disease.

Casey truly embodies the spirit of the West. In the 1920s, she worked a 1,600-head cattle ranch in Arizona with her parents and two brothers. Then, in the early 1940s, Casey went to the University of Colorado, where she met her husband Ed. After World War II, they settled on and worked his family ranch in southwest Wyoming. When political aspirations came to the forefront, Casey became a reliable campaigner for her husband. She loves the political life and takes in stride even the most difficult aspects of being in the public eye.

In an article printed in *Choice* magazine, Casey told of an incident which occurred after the first inaugural ball in 1975. The host of a Cheyenne-based television talk show described her as having arrived on the governor's arm so drunk she could barely stand.

"I wanted to straighten that out fast," Casey said.

On the air, she told the embarrassed host that she had multiple sclerosis and that people should take care in making judgements about others.

People fascinate her and she is particularly interested in getting to know those people who seem withdrawn into an "invisible shell." Nearly everyone in Cheyenne seems to know and love her.

Riding horses is one of the few things that multiple sclerosis has prevented Casey from doing. She also would have liked to have a larger family. The disease struck her when the Herschler's daughter, Sue, was two years old and their son, Jim, six weeks.

But today Sue's three children keep grandmother busy whenever she gets a chance to visit them on the family ranch.

The Herschlers love of the outdoors is evident in the governor's mansion. Nearly every room on the ground floor opens to an outdoor patio. Casey has her breakfast coffee at the kitchen table looking out on a garden of bright flowers.

Landscapes and paintings of weather-worn faces hang throughout the spacious home. Casey's golf cart, labeled with her name, sits ready on the back patio. Ed golfs on the

course just beyond the back fence. Casey rides.

Friendliness and honesty are the qualities both Ed and Casey strive for in themselves.

"How else could a Democrat be elected to two terms in a Republican state?" she asks with a grin.

Plaques and certificates cover her office walls, many given in appreciation of her service to others. (See "Wyoming's First Lady Honored On Her Day," *The ARROW*, Winter, 1980) Casey has appeared at fundraisers for everything from Scouts to animals.

And, of course, she is a crusader in the fight against multiple sclerosis.

The disease makes it difficult for her to move around easily. She hates to have people feel sorry for her, however, and spends a great deal of her time trying to cheer others. Her life has been full and she has accomplished the things she set out to do.

Her adventurous spirit cannot be dimmed.

"I'm sure I could find other herds of buffalo to whip," she reflects thoughtfully.

## Daytonian Works To Preserve Local History

One of the members of the Dayton (Ohio) Alumnae Club is Martha Hibbert Boice. As chairman of the landmark committee of Centerville Historical Society, she was largely responsible for the writing of *A Sense of Place*, relating the history surrounding the 98 historical homes of Centerville and Washington Township.

In 1971, Martha applied to the National Register to establish Centerville-Washington Township as an historical district. After a year of work, this goal was accomplished.

Martha and her committee started out with an 1875 map, one of many produced throughout the nation to celebrate America's 100th birthday. They divided the map into four quadrants and the city of Centerville, and a member of the committee took responsibility for each of the five areas. A photographer was hired to record the homes as they are today. To date the homes, deeds were studied to establish the chain or ownership. Tax records were studied to check valuation from year to year since often it could be determined when a home was built on a parcel of land by a big change in the tax bill. Research was done on the early owners or famous people who lived in the early dwellings. Living relatives were asked for family albums, diaries, and tales—anything which would relay what went on in and around the homes. On visits to the homes, architectural details from basement to attic were studied to help determine the age of the home.

Martha's project this summer is to reproduce an herb and root garden like one grown by an early settler. The settler was a doctor of botanical medicine, and there was a bill in his estate packet for his garden supplies. Martha deciphered the bill and converted the names of the plants from their early names to their current ones.

Thus Martha continues her quest to preserve the local past.

# Golden Arrow Honored By Tennis Association

Marion Vaughan Glover, Massachusetts Alpha, became the third Phoenix recipient of a United States Tennis Association commemorative gold stick pin last summer in recognition of the eleven years she has been community-service chairman of the Southwestern Tennis Association.

Gordon Jorgensen, USTA official, presented the award to Marion as part of the organization's 100th anniversary. He praised her efforts in developing junior tennis among minority groups, particularly American Indians.

It is a tribute to Marion's adaptability that, at almost 80 years of age, she has turned her social service interests into helping American Indians, certainly one of the most deprived groups in the United States, and united her social service interests with the tennis interests of her husband.

Marion has a bachelor's degree from Boston University, a master's degree in psychiatric social work from Smith College, and a fierce determination to contribute to a better world.

"As a retired social worker," she said, "and with my family background (her father taught theology at Boston University for 25 years), I felt that tennis facilities in the valley were being used exclusively by high schools and the general public without considering the potential for creative living among elementary schools and high schools whose students had never been exposed to the sportsmanship of the game.

"An ounce of preventive social advantages prevents tons of social problems."

Twelve years ago Marion decided she was tired of acting as social chairman of the SWTA. Her husband, Jeff, had been SWTA president from 1955 to 1961, and Marion frequently was host for visiting delegates.

In 1970 she was asked to be in charge of a tournament for Phoenix Parks and Recreation. At that first tournament, she passed out donated used rackets and clothing. An anonymous sponsor provided \$200 for balls and trophies.

"I remember one black girl played barefoot on the court," Marion said. "We got her shoes."

Marion and her husband are both lifetime USTA members. Jeff, who runs the tennis pro shop at Paradise Valley Country Club, has played in tournaments all his life. Now a card-carrying "Super Senior," he was ranked seventh in the nation in men's 80 singles in 1980 and sixth in doubles.

"Some players are trophy-status mad," Marion said. "Jeff plays tennis for the fun of it. That's why our marriage has lasted for 49 years."

Marion is a social player who prefers to play with her grandchildren and contribute to tennis behind the scenes.

She was an active supporter of the project to install four tennis courts at the Phoenix Indian High School in 1976. She has arranged to have medallions for the PIHS varsity presented annually at the school's sports banquet. In a further effort to stimulate interest in tennis at the Indian school, Marion bought material and a pattern to make a tennis dress in a home economics class.

During her years as a Pi Phi active at Boston University, Marian held a number of chapter offices and was a Convention delegate. She remains active with the alumnae group in Phoenix and attended many of the meetings and functions during the Convention in Phoenix in 1979.

The author of this book has been important to Pi Beta Phi for many years, serving as ARROW Editor, 1921-28, Acting Director of Settlement School in its early years, and National Historian, 1934-38. She also has the distinction of being State Historian for two states—Wyoming and Colorado.

Her book consists of vignettes of famous people with whom she has had a direct or indirect association, with special emphasis on those from the West. More than 130 people are spotlighted, including the Unsinkable Molly Brown, Buffalo Bill, Calamity Jane, as well as presidents and first ladies, authors and actors, people of interest from all walks of life.

Her portraits of many are based on personal experience. With others she relies on letters or associations with the children, grandchildren, or mutual acquaintances of her subjects to provide insight into their characters. Agnes Spring has met many famous people: she's had lunch with Mari Sandoz, talked with Mamie Eisenhower, helped Ralph Edwards research one of his shows, corresponded with William Randolph Hearst, received an award from the National Cowboy Hall of Fame presented by Walter Brennan.

There are numerous references to Pi Phi in the book. The author studied journalism at Columbia on a Pi Beta Phi Fellowship, and her many contributions to the Fraternity are mentioned throughout the book. Also, several of her subjects are Pi Phis, including Carrie Chapman Catt and Grace Coolidge.

Altogether, it's an interesting book by an interesting lady!

In the process of developing her program she covers many of the financial problems we all need help on: budgeting or, as Paula prefers to say, developing an expense plan; choosing a bank; buying on credit; selecting insurance; deciding on investments; making a will.

The book is filled with charts, checklists and exercises. It also contains many helpful definitions of financial terms.

## Barbara Bachman Exhibits Aerobics At World's Fair

It's entirely possible that Pi Phi attending the World's Fair in Knoxville, Tenn., the month (June) will have an opportunity to see Action Aerobics Inc. in the Creative Human Energy section. Those who have that opportunity should say hello to Barbara Atkinson Bachman, Nebraska Beta.

Barbara lives in Brentwood, Tenn., and she teaches in the elementary school in Mt. Juliet, Tenn. It was there that she started teaching informal aerobic classes in late 1980. Over 125 women attended the first class. Due to the large demand generated there, Barbara decided to incorporate in January, 1981, and expand the program statewide.

One year later, Action Aerobic classes can be taken in 20 Tennessee cities plus 15 others located in Indiana and Kentucky. Over 2,000 students, all women, participate in the dance-fitness program.

"We plan to enter five more states in the southeast and hope to have a total membership of 5,000 in 100 cities in 1982," said Barbara. "After what we did in 1981, our goals are not so unrealistic."

Aerobic dancing is a popular form of exercise consisting of easy-to-learn choreographed dance moves performed to music. It strengthens the heart, lungs, circulatory system, and respiratory system in addition to toning muscles and increasing flexibility and coordination. Many have coupled aerobic dancing with proper diet for successful weight control.

Barbara was contacted by the Creative Human Energy section of the World's Fair last year about participating in the sports and fitness programs being exhibited at the fair.

In November, she learned that her program had been chosen. Since the theme of the fair is energy, it includes not only the energy that moves industry but the energy that generated human movement, creativity, and artistic expression.

"The officials chose Energy Dance Aerobics as a dynamic form of that individual expressive energy that is so central to the theme of the fair," explained Barbara.

"We were selected because the officials felt we were the most complete aerobics program that applied."

Barbara has been an active member of the Nashville Alumnae Club since she moved there from Phoenix in 1980. She has been membership chairman, Arrowcraft chairman, and in charge of Entrance and Security for the club's tremendous Christmas Village annual project.

## N.Y. Deltas Are All EARS

EARS is a student run organization at Cornell standing for "empathy assistance referral service." Lisa Rapetti, Marisa Albanese, Karen Parfitt, Mary Tynan, and Sarah Garlan are New York Deltas who are members of this group. EARS provides anonymous counseling to students facing academic, emotional, or social problems. The counselors receive many weeks of training to become effective listeners, and learning how to give support and references to students facing a wide variety of problems including drug and alcohol abuse, severe depression, unwanted pregnancy, or roommate problems. The service maintains 24 hour phone lines to EARS counselors.

Karen says she has given advice to many distraught students. She says, "It's funny the degree of difference in severity of problems the students are concerned about. Depression is one of the biggest caller difficulties. Usually, a test goes badly, or there are family or boyfriend-girlfriend problems. After a while, it becomes much easier to speak with these callers, simply because of the experience gained through repetition."

Giving advice is not the underlying goal of this group.

Marisa says, "We just listen, repeat what is said, and ask questions to help the person sort things through in their own mind. Usually, this helps them a great deal."

Lisa is an EARS counselor because she enjoys people. "It's great to help people feel better in their environment. I like to think it's my small contribution on campus."

Sarah spends a great deal of time in the EARS office. "It's rewarding in many ways. At school, people tend to become so self-centered, that I enjoy expending my energy in a giving mode."

## Festival Sparks Weekend Fun



The next day Betsy was standing in the starting gate with bib #1 on. "I was pretty nervous," she says. She skied with heart, soul, and every muscle in her body. She started off with a pack of skiers behind her and ended up 37th out of 38, "a pretty disappointed kid."

Betsy says, "As I look back now, and as my coach told me then, it was the

greatest experience in the world, and if I make it to the '84 or '88 Olympics I'll be ready." The rest of the two weeks in the Olympic village was like a dream to Betsy and especially exciting was meeting athletes from all over the world.

Understanding the difficulties of being handicapped was a step towards a greater comprehension of the problems faced by senior citizens.



With the help from the chapter, Dani was able to donate the river trip to the chapter as a door prize.



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




